COUNCILLORS' NOTES

NO THREAT TO SHIRLEY HEATH AND ADDINGTON HILLS

Recently there has been a classic example of how a small group of people can create a large amount of worry and concern in a very short space of time about an issue that was simply never going to happen.

The subject? The Addington Golf Club's plans to build a driving range and associated works on Shirley Heath and Addington Hills.

Let's start by making it very clear that this plan was NEVER going to happen.

No-one at the Council or indeed any elected politician in Croydon has ever backed it for a second. As the Council owns the land that means it wasn't going to happen.

Let me run through where this all came from.

About a year ago, The Addington Golf Club contacted the Council and the Executive Mayor. They wanted to discuss their plans for the Club and how they saw an opportunity to make the Club bigger and more attractive as a major golf venue. They are a business and coming up with ideas for improvements and growth are exactly what you would expect and want from them.

These types of meetings take place between lots of local businesses and the Mayor and Council on a regular basis. The Mayor's door is always open for anyone's plans to improve Croydon and rightly so. However, the Club's plans involved using land that is currently public green space. In a Borough with a population the size of Croydon's and after Covid made us all much more appreciative of the amazing and varied parks, woodlands and heaths we enjoy, a proposal of this nature was unlikely to win public favour and never likely to be approved and the Club were told this. The Addington Golf Club chose to try and move forward with their scheme by engaging with local residents' associations and went public with their plan. This was poorly judged and subsequent events have clearly demonstrated that the initial feedback they were given on likely public opinion was accurate. Local residents want their green spaces protected.



MP Chris Philp's Report Member of Parliament for Croydon South

Facial Recognition catches nearly 100 criminals in Croydon

Nearly 100 arrests of wanted criminals have recently been made in Croydon Town Centre using new Live Facial Recognition (LFR) technology, following my request for a LFR trial here.

LFR starts with a "watchlist" of images of wanted criminals. A Police camera and advanced facial recognition software sees if anyone walking past matches. If there is a match, officers intervene to confirm identity and arrest if needed. The matching software is now incredibly accurate. Images of passers-by not on the wanted list are immediately and automatically deleted.

LFR has been deployed in Croydon Town Centre on a number of occasions since December and almost 100 wanted people have been arrested. This includes a man wanted for two rapes dating back to 2017 who had not been found – until he walked past the LFR camera. Other arrests were made for people wanted for firearms and knife offences, GBH, theft, robbery, assault, fraud and drug dealing. They would not otherwise have been caught.

The accuracy rate is better than 1/6000 and the only false positive in Croydon during these LFR operations was the twin brother of the wanted man.

I was really keen to see this new technology at work in Croydon and I pushed the Metropolitan Police to try this in Croydon Town Centre.

I am very pleased that these dangerous people have been taken off the street. There are further deployments planned and I now want this technology rolled out nationally. LFR means many more wanted criminals can be caught.

In a separate operation, local Police have targeted gangs robbing schoolage children of mobile phones in Croydon Town Centre, South Croydon and Purley and they have made over 10 arrests. Reports of street robbery for phones have now dropped, but constant vigilance is needed and this is certainly something which I am keeping a very close eye on.



Good Time for Gardening – May

Why do we bother gardening, apart from the fact it keeps our gardens neat and tidy? Here are some of the benefits:



~ Being outside for just 20 minutes per day, observing the changes in the garden or area connects you with the changes in the seasons and can reduce anxieties.

- Gardening is a gentle outdoor workout and builds activity levels. Shovelling compost, mowing the lawn, raking and bagging leaves are the top three calorie-burning garden activities.
- Taking cuttings, handling seeds or pricking out small plants stimulate fine motor skills, boost hand/eye co-ordination and can offset damage from weakened nerve endings or stiff finger joints.
- Growing your own veg and fruit gives produce that is free from pesticides and also means enjoying produce when the nutrients are highest.
- Gardening boosts your immune system with nutritious food and your digestive system through ingesting healthy soil bacteria on your hands and the produce.
- The physical activity gives a rush of endorphins, lifting your mood; being in the sunshine gives vitamin D, helping brain function, bone strength and blood pressure. Planting for the coming season give reasons to look ahead.
- Increased oxygen intake is good for the lungs and boosts serotonin which aids wellbeing. Even going out after rain is beneficial as the negative ions in the damp air help to lift the mood.
- Gardening is a skill to learn and so it challenges you. Visiting other gardens extends knowledge and encourages you to try new things in your own garden.
- If you volunteer with a community or hospital garden or at a National Trust or RHS property you can overcome loneliness. Mood and levels of happiness increase when connecting with others.

Having listed the above benefits of gardening, don't be surprised if your GP directs you to some outside activities rather than to the pharmacy.

Again, Ted Frith's journals set me on a path. I am grateful to CW and BT for providing me with the original Costains brochure from which much of the above is taken verbatim.

The brief specification above, of the building materials used by Costains, may seem basic to our modern standards. The concrete bed over the whole of the house footprint was certainly a bonus to the home owner, compared to a dirt floor. It would also have made construction of the house simpler for Costains. The proposal that Crittalls Steel Windows 'will stand all tests of time' has been proven to be completely fallacious. The traditional material for water pipes was lead so copper was definitely an improvement. It was traditional for home owners to have to pay to get their road 'made up' and adopted by the Local Authority, indeed some of the earlier Selsdon sites by Costains were blighted by this factor where homeowners were faced with unexpected bills to make up their roadway and were charged on a £s per foot of frontage basis. The concept of fully fitted carpets as we know it was virtually unknown. Linoleum (Lino) was a durable and relatively inexpensive material popular from the late 1800s onwards until the mid-20th Century. Floors could be covered in strips of woven carpet stitched together, or sheet Lino cut to fit and laid over the floor or around a central rug. A more cost effective total flooring solution was to stain or varnish the floorboards but just around a feature piece of carpet, rug or linoleum.

The NHS website has a 'Live well' section of their website regarding tools for healthy living, e.g. exercise, weight, stopping smoking etc. For example, a large number of people have tried their 'Couch to 50K' app. In the 'Better Health' section it also focuses on mental well-being. In both online sections they provide very practical help – not just written advice.

If your health could be better, please consider having a look and see if any of this may help. Some of the specialised advice and programmes cover areas such as:

- General aches and pains
- chronic pain,
- low mood, depression
- lack of energy,
- breathlessness.
- addiction issues,
- sexual health concerns,
- weight problems,
- anxiety, stress, trauma,
- low self-confidence,
- sleep problems,
- AND MANY MORE.



Regular Self Body checking – this is for EVERYONE - know what is normal for you or the person you care for. (This may change for women during the menstrual cycle – plot what is normal for you). Checking for new or unusual lumps, changes of shape/colour/texture of body parts, moles etc. Checking any worrying changes to pee or poo.

The NHS provides regular physical checks and vaccinations to identify/ prevent common illnesses and health problems (See NHS website or last month's Gazette article.)

Social care -If you or someone you know needs help with day-to-day

living because of illness, infirmity or disability there is information available on the website about support and benefits.

If things have already gone beyond self-help and reached emergency level - speak to your GP, emergency services or call free to The Samaritans on 116 123.

music, knitting, photography, gardening, puzzles, scrapbooking, board games and socialising. With apparently 20% of the population not having a hobby.



reign, the colour printing process known as chromolithography was invented. This led to the production of "ready- made" scraps in bright colours, some embossed, and sold in sheets. Victorian scraps were a popular pastime for both children and adults who

Ten years earlier in 1827, Joseph Niepce took the first photograph – it required an 8-hour exposure!

Fortunately, by 1837, Louis Daguerre had developed a faster method of making photos common place. By the 1850s a form of photography called carte de visite (visit card) started to spread across Europe. The small photos were printed in sheets of 8 and ultimately led to the creation of the first true scrapbooks. Today many of us use our mobile phone for taking photos and sadly, photo albums seem to only be for weddings.

The collecting of cigarette cards was first invented in the US in 1871. Cigarette cards strengthened the cigarette packet and were given away free to encourage smokers to buy more packets to complete their collections. They hit their heyday in the 1930s but WWII and paper shortages halted their production and they never really regained that popularity.

Friends of Selsdon Wood Working to conserve our wood

Here is a summary of the Annual Report from the Friends of Selsdon Wood about the work that they have carried out in the last year.

Maintenance of Selsdon Wood

Work has included:

- a. Clearing fallen trees Many tree and branch falls across paths and seats were cleared throughout the year. One fall in Great Field was too dangerous for the Friends of Selsdon Wood to tackle, so it was reported to the Council Tree Officer and cleared quickly by Council operatives.
- b. Maintenance of the Butterfly Bank In July and November many of the perimeter stakes were replaced. In Autumn the area was tidied by the removal of dead vegetation with the help of the Outreach Team (see below).
- c. Removal of Invasive Species Invasive Laurel was cut down on many Work Sessions and also on visits from The Conservation Volunteers. The cut material was placed in trees above ground level to prevent the possibility of re-rooting and left there to die back. In October Holly was removed at the junction of West Gorse and Farleigh Border.
- d. Outreach Support Work We met with Oliver Connolly, Director of Grow Wild Outreach a support service that supports people with disabilities and mental health needs to help them contribute and take part in local environmental projects. They support people from Croydon Monday to Friday and would like to support Selsdon Wood in any way possible. The group visited the wood on several occasions and were shown how to clear Laurel, Bracken & Brambles. They also helped clear away arisings cut back by our team and helped to clear the Linden Glade pool as part of the renovation.
- e. Clearance around Name Boards, Seats and Benches Clearance of encroaching vegetation was carried out in the summer months around many of the field perimeters.
- f. Replacement of rotten Guide Posts The guide post at the junction of Broad Walk and Beech Grove was replaced in June and the marker post in the car park for the start of the Red walk and the end of the Green was repaired and replaced with a Metpost in February 2024.
- g. **Replacement of Rotten Seats and Benches** In September the old seat in the car park dedicated to Miss Margaret Horn was renovated

- and in September the Croydon National Trust bench in Great Field by the Centenary Plantation, was repainted.
- h. **Installation of New Benches** Two new dedicated benches were installed in October in Field 3 and 2 further benches, were installed in Addington Border and Langford's Way in December.
- i. Creation and installation of Nesting Boxes and a Leaflet Dispenser – A Bird Nesting Box, built by one of the Friends, was erected in Vale Border in June. Last year several of the plastic leaflet dispensers were destroyed by vandals. In response, a wooden dispenser was built out of an old nest box and installed it at the Courtwood Lane entrance.
- j. Work on the Bird Feeding Station in the Jubilee Plantation In January 2022 a Bird Feeding Station was set up in our wood in dedication to David Malins, a very active founder member of FSW who died in 2021. The feeders have been regularly replenished ever since they were installed by some of the Friends. In November Jubilee Pond was dredged, taking out a lot of leaves and branches, which were then raked away, and the vegetation between the pond and the fence was trimmed.
- Clearance of the Centenary Plantation Several winter Work Sessions involved clearance work in the Centenary Plantation by removal of Brambles and dead wood
- Removal of Old Fencing and plastic sheeting close to David's Crook – Fencing and plastic sheeting, possibly left over from a past Autumn Fair, were found in the wood close to David's Crook. This was removed in January and taken to the car park where it was broken up and left for collection by the Council.
- m. **Litter Picking** Several Friends now do this on a regular basis as part of their daily walks. The FSW dog poo bin at the top of Field 1 is also emptied by the Friends on alternate days

Sustainable conservation and restoration work

- a. **Repair of Muddy Paths** This project was revived this year starting with the purchase of two electric trolleys with tipper function. These can easily be loaded with gravel or shingle (250 kg load max) and driven to where needed. Several bags of ballast were purchased, and a start was made laying several trolley-loads at the muddy spot in Farleigh Border. Channels were also cut to allow some drainage.
- b. **Renovation of the Linden Glade Pond** Work was carried out throughout the year commencing with clearance of mud and removal of edging stones in preparation for laying of a fibreglass liner. In

September, FSW paid a contractor, Fab Fencing, to erect a sturdy fence around the pool with a locked gate. A path was cleared around the outside of the fence so that the public could view the pool from around the full perimeter. The soil in the area inside the fence was turned over and a few appropriate plants added. The surroundings of the memorial stone were cleared.

c. Removal of Fence at the Yew Tree Way entrance - The fence at the Yew Tree Way entrance has been broken for some time and lay on the ground looking untidy and neglected. This fence served very little purpose and a complete replacement would have been expensive, so FSW paid to have it removed. The area now looks much better.

Education of all volunteers in the principles and practices of nature conservation and the encouragement of public interest

- a. All the scheduled walks have been well attended and the presenters have provisionally agreed to come back next year when we plan to run a similar programme. Reports of all walks are published on the website.
- b. To support users of the wood, especially newcomers, three main leaflets (Membership Application, General Information, Red & Green Walks) and a pocket-sized map are produced. All are available to download from the Friends' website. Dispensing boxes for the maps at some main entrances are kept stocked by committee members. A QR version of the information booklet is available and the QR code is posted on all the dispensing boxes and also at minor entrances which do not have the dispensers.
- c. As in previous years our annual calendar is produced.
- d. The FSW website is regularly updated and provides a rich source of information about the wood. This year the website has been restyled to make it mobile responsive and legally compliant. In addition, there is a FSW Facebook group which now has over a thousand members. This is a rich resource for the sharing of information about the wood, especially interesting sightings.
- e. **Open Day 2023** Open Day was held, as usual, on the first Sunday in September.
- f. FSW members continue to receive an illustrated newsletter each month, circulated via email.
- g. In the 2023 Photo Competition there were 20 entrants who submitted over 80 photographs. From these, a shortlist of 45 were selected and printed for display on the FSW Open Day when the public were invited to participate in a secret ballot to select the winners.

Here a concerned resident sent in a copy of the letter that he sent to our local MP, Chris Philp, together with Chris's reply. The moral of this tale is that you should contact the authorities with your worries, however, you will need patience.

24 November 2023 Dear Chris Philp MP,

Vehicle excessive speeding [40 to 80mph] up and down the Old Farleigh Road is getting worse and especially between Sandpiper Rd and Beech Way.

The Speed Monitor outside 123 Old Farleigh Road CR2 8QH has not been working for months, similarly, the triangle speed monitor sign near Beech Way. I have noticed that other speed monitor signs are not working for months in Old Farleigh Road and indeed elsewhere in the borough.

It seems to me bordering on criminal that apparently Croydon Council do not maintain speed monitor signs to ensure they ALL work 24/7!

I am a frequent user of the Kersey Drive junction with Old Farleigh Road which, due to the speeding traffic along this road, is dangerous when emerging from Kersey Drive, either turning right of left.

Please would you investigate this urgent matter and get the Old Farleigh Road speed monitors back in service together asap with a commitment from the Council to ensure all speed monitors in the borough are working 24/7.

The Council approved the suggestion and the Surveyor is to obtain the views of the Ministry of Transport."

A FORGOTTEN DAY

That cruel twist of fate laid waste your mind. It stole your treasured words, robbed you of speech, but even in its shadow you could find small, passing pleasures that it could not reach.

And, finally the gardens – at their best with flowers fresh and bright and newly bloomed. Then on this rustic gate you leaned to rest at peace until the mem'ries were consumed.

Nature Notes from Ted Forsyth - Grassland

Not surprisingly, grassland tends to be covered in grass! However, this usually involves many different grass species with different species favouring conditions ranging from alkaline to acidic.

Many of our food crops, though modified by hundreds or thousands of years of farming, are essentially grasses. There can be extreme forms like bamboo and rice but they still belong to the grass family. We have no enormous areas like the prairies of North America, nor the savannahs of East Africa, nor do we have the relatively predictable seasonal rains and the consequent movement of large numbers of grazing animals. However, what we are most concerned about in relation to Selsdon Wood is chalk grassland. One reason that grasses are so successful is that they can recover after being grazed to ground level. In Selsdon Wood the main grazing is done by Roe Deer, and they are mainly browsers which feed on the lower leaves of trees and saplings. Rabbits do a marvellous job

of keeping grass short but the effect of myxomatosis and the presence of many foxes and badgers means that there are few, if any, rabbits left in the wood. Many years ago there used to be a small group of rabbits, including some black ones, which could be found, opposite the Courtwood Lane entrance, in what is now a golf course.

The grass areas are relatively small and are bordered by bushes and trees which provide some shelter from harsh weather conditions and must affect the composition of the grassland. Many species of flowering plants are found in the area. In spring Dandelion and Buttercup appear in profusion while later Pyramidal orchids can be numerous



but Common Spotted orchids are rather few in number, and Bee orchids are not found every year. All plants are affected by what is happening underground. As orchids have minute seeds containing little in the way of nutrients, they must form a close association with underground fungi if they are to succeed. No fungi, no orchids.

Many of us can put a name to at least a few plants when in flower, but probably there are fewer people who can confidently identify plants before the flower appears. I defy anyone, other than an expert, to identify a Grass Vetchling when it is not displaying its bright reddish flower at the top (see photo on left). The change from non-flowering to flowering is more subtle in grasses as there is no drastic colour change.



A field guide for flowers will usually include some species of grass and there are several worth starting with in the process of learning to identify grasses. The most obvious one is Cocksfoot – named for the resemblance to the foot of a cockerel when the top of the flowering grass is turned upside down. Timothy Grass is reasonably distinctive as the flowering head forms a vertical cylindrical spike but there is a similar, though smaller species, Meadow Foxtail, which might cause initial confusion. Yorkshire Fog can cover large areas and the soft flowering heads have an almost fluffy appearance. Another which should be mentioned, if only for its

name, is Crested Dog's-tail – the flowering head is a tight arrangement rather like a miniature ladder of individual flowers along a small stem.

Unlike the names for orchids, which give some idea of the shape or

pattern to expect (Pyramidal, Common Spotted, etc), grass names seem almost random and mostly give no indication of what to expect. Learn to identify some of the common ones mentioned above then dive into the technicalities if you want to learn more.

GARDENS MATTER

FEELING GUILTY ABOUT MOWING YOUR LAWN?

More and more gardeners are being encouraged to love the idea of an imperfect and wild looking lawn, especially with the high profile "No Mow May" campaigns of recent years. However, the fact is that shorter grass can also provide a great habitat as long as it's managed in a nature-friendly way.

Firstly, it's vital to avoid using moss killers, artificial fertilisers and weedkillers – often combined into "weed & amp; feed" products. Without these, your lawn will be allowed to become a rich tapestry of grasses, mosses & amp; lichens along with low growing wildflowers such as clovers, speedwells and selfheal.



During the mowing season, if you mow fortnightly rather than weekly it allows the low growing plants to flower and provide food for bees, hoverflies and butterflies. Bumble bees are particularly fond of the nectar from clover. It's not just about the green bits either. Bare patches in a sunny lawn can offer good conditions for ground nesting solitary bees.

If you do decide to reduce your mowing regime more drastically, it's still beneficial to create some paths of shorter grass through longer areas of lawn. Not only are they aesthetically pleasing but also provide places for insects to sun themselves, especially valuable to newly emerged butterflies.

So, your lawn mower may not have to be consigned to the environmentally unfriendly category after all.
