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Minutes of the Selsdon Residents Association AGM 29th March 2023

- 1. There were 69 people present, of whom 13 were SRA committee members
- **2.** Apologies for absence and welcome by Sheila Childs (SC). Apologies: Ernie Sweeney, & it is believed that our councillors were attending a meeting

3. Birch

The meeting began with a presentation from Birch Selsdon, who had taken over the Selsdon Park Hotel complex, opening this very day. We met their general manager Ashley Cole, safety & security manager Steve Swain + front of house manager Clarence Marshall. Ashley thanked Linda Morris (LM) for the invitation to our AGM, & began by outlining a lot of their features, which show on their website birchcommunity.com/Selsdon – the restaurants overseen by award-winning chef Lee Westcott, the rewilding of the 200-acre site by Sebastian Cox, the pottery & art studio with paintings for sale, the wellness centre with its large gym + 4 treatment rooms, & the lido from the summer onwards. There would be livestock in the fields – cattle, pigs, donkeys, sheep etc. surrounded by a 3ft 6" stock fence.

Two restaurants Vervain & Elodie would operate beside the Angelica bar (exclusively for members) + Meadow bar, which non-residents would be able to visit. Exclusive members' groups would run beside more external offerings, since their target market was everyone. The former golf shop would be rebranded 'Birchlings', & hopefully offer a qualified childminding service in due course. External community groups would also be welcome on the site. The main entrance would remain solely on Addington Road with electric gates, whilst the Old Farleigh Road gate would allow for emergency vehicle access. SC wished the venture well & hoped it would be good for Selsdon, a sentiment equally shared by the Birch staff members present

4. The minutes of the last AGM on 6th July 2022 were then proposed by lan Leggatt (IL) & seconded by Sara Bashford

5. Police

We were delighted to have PS Martyn Patrick, PC Callum Karn & PC Oliver Marples join our meeting. PS Patrick outlined the present police set-up with Andy Brittain as Borough Commander, Mitchell Carr as Superintendent & Imran Ashgar as Chief Inspector. In the Selsdon & Addington Village area, officers were having cycle training, & were majoring on tackling vehicle crime + burglary. We were advised to properly lock UPVC front-doors, & it was hoped to hold a local catalytic converter marking day soon. In Selsdon & Forestdale, tackling anti-social behaviour was a priority, & we were urged to report this via the Met Police website or Crimestoppers. Vehicle thefts were another issue we were urged to report. The area mailboxes we advertise were more for advice than reporting crimes, & it was hoped to reconvene ward panel meetings quarterly from 12th April

6. 2022 Annual Report

This had been printed in the gazette and shown on the website – no questions received – proposed by Chris Jones (CJ) & seconded by Janet Sharp (JSh). SC took the opportunity to thank:-

The Triangle team for weeding & maintaining the area outside Sainsburys The Selsdon Baptist Church for allowing us free use of their room for our meetings

Andrew Baxter for organising the litter picks

Jeff Bayton for reviewing our accounts

The Planning Committee for alerting us of planning applications affecting the local area

Her committee for their work over the past year

The Julian Huxley for providing the wine for the AGM, & free tea/coffee after the litter picks

7. Treasurer's Report

A copy of the accounts for 2022 had been circulated in the gazette. Iris Jones (IJ) as Treasurer provided an update -

2022 income up by nearly £1000, although actual gazette subscriptions were down by £78. Out of 4000 addresses delivered to, only 670 paid their £5 requested amount. Residents' donations towards the Christmas lights were up £300+, with traders' nearly £400 up. Collection boxes towards the lights also raised £292, along with £202 from Easyfunding Expenditure was a similar figure to last year, up by £780 due mainly to checks of the catenary wires for the lights costing £540. We received no requests for donations, & managed the flower displays on Addington Road via our volunteers. So overall we made a £1970 loss, slightly less than last year

Jeff Bayton was thanked for reviewing the accounts, as were the people whose letter boxes are used for subscriptions

SC commented that, as the SRA was not registered as a charity. Sainsbury's wouldn't let us hold our annual collection morning in November, which normally nets £200+, but savings had been made as the Baptist Church continued to provide a room for our committee meetings free of charge, we had cut back on the times the Christmas lights were lit up & we didn't have helium-filled balloons at the Lights launch evening. Phil Roberts (PR) asked that the SRA try to make more economic cutbacks, & felt there should be a push to boost the image of the association. Sara Bashford helpfully responded that we did take part in an annual event in September with the Friends of Selsdon Woods, & had visible exercises going on like the litter picks, & we had the informative monthly gazette, which many districts didn't have the benefit of, so she gave a vote of thanks to the committee for all they currently do Obviously, the SRA will continue to seek funds from residents towards the lights, but perhaps we also need to request their help towards any future requests for donations we might receive from community groups in the absence of council funding now. Ideas from the AGM audience for the future would be well-received too.

SC thanked IJ for her hard work, & acceptance of the accounts was proposed by Richard Harlow and seconded by Ian Leggatt. The room voted in favour with none against.

8. The Gazette

Chris Jones (CJ), the editor since April 2020, gave an update and thanked the following –

Frederick, Cedric and Sunflower Sid for their gardening tips Ian Leggatt (IL) for his local history articles especially about the development of the shops in Selsdon, & the Bird Estate Jessica Blake for her history articles on the Queen's coronation, keeping warm in winter & a Christmas tale

Janet Sharp (JSh) & Su Yates (SY) for their informative local articles The Gazette is self-financing, so we are asked to please tell organisations we use if you got their details from The Gazette. It is delivered to 4000 homes. CJ again asked for people to consider contributing photos, problems, poems, local news and good news items.

SC added that the Gazette continues to make a slight loss (£1173 for the year), so needs more advertisers to help balance the books PR made a plea for more help distributing the gazette especially on the Bird Estate

9. Christmas Lights

LM announced the Christmas lights switch-on will be on Friday 24th November 2023, probably with Father Christmas again switching on the lights down the high street to re-create the magic of years gone by. Thankfully the 2022 electricity cost wasn't as much as first feared, but we owned the Selsdon lighting banners at either end of the display, & had to pay for their upkeep. She thanked the local Rotary for providing Father Christmas on his sleigh and stewards, & the Baptist church for their free drinks + mince pies

10. Annual Subscription

There was no proposal to put up subscriptions. They would stay at £5 per household for 2023/24, although extra donations would be welcomed. This was proposed by SC & supported by the meeting

11. Election of Officers and Members

SC advised the meeting of the recent passing of Ray Rowsell & Dick Adamson, both past chairmen & stalwarts of the association in a number of roles. Pam Holden had agreed to accept the title of SRA president, & she addressed the audience.

LM thanked SC for her 10 years as Chair since Paul Shaw's tenure ended – she was happy to continue for another year, so LM proposed her, & all in attendance agreed

SC thanked the room for her vote, welcomed any ideas or thoughts from

those attending, & pointed out that the association would be 100 years old in 2026, which we would hope to mark. She then dealt with the other committee positions

Vice Chair – Linda Morris - Proposed by SC. The room voted in favour with none against

Treasurer – Iris Jones - Proposed by SC. The room voted in favour with none against

Secretary – Trevor Stotten - Proposed by SC. The room voted in favour with none against

The Committee agreed to stand again, bar Arthur Wilson, and was proposed en bloc by Sara Bashford & seconded by Kathy Leggatt. The room voted in favour with none against. There, therefore, remained one post on the committee to be filled

12. Adoption of Accounts

Thanks were given to Jeff Bayton for auditing the accounts. He was happy to continue, & was proposed by Eric Shaw + seconded by Jenny Stawman. The room voted in favour with none against

13. Any Other Business

The point was made from the floor by Richard Morley-Smith that it was disgusting that only around 15% of gazette recipients actually paid for their subscriptions. Surely a full page strongly-worded article should be put in a future edition asking more households to contribute at least their £5, with hopefully more, towards the Christmas lights + if we are to be able to afford donations to community groups.

It was also suggested that there should be more letter boxes for residents to drop off donations, & that gazette deliverers might encourage the householders they deliver to, to subscribe

There being no further business the meeting concluded at 9.35pm, with a short time left for refreshments & informal chat.

SRA ANNUAL REPORT 2023

The Selsdon Residents' Association (SRA) was formed in 1926, and so by the end of 2023 was **98 years old!**

The SRA's aim is to advance and protect the interests of the residents of Selsdon. It is run by volunteers on goodwill and funds raised by subscription and donations. Our membership covers about 4,000 households. The map of the roads covered is on our website www.selsdon-residents.co.uk.

The SRA Committee

The annually-elected Committee meets once a month as a committee to discuss Selsdon issues, and respond and take action where necessary. It acts as a point of contact for external bodies, can potentially add collective weight to any individual resident's concerns about the area, and is a useful 'watching eye'. The committee also plans special events and community improvements. Individual representatives will also attend council, police, transport and other meetings throughout the year on our behalf. SRA news is passed to the community via public noticeboards (by the library and on the high street), social media and The Selsdon Gazette.

AGM 2023

The 2023 AGM was held at St. John's Church Hall on Wednesday 29th March 2023.

SRA 2023 Activities:

- a) Floral displays were again displayed in the troughs attached to the railings outside the shops opposite Wetherspoons. To save costs, these were planted and watered by members of the Committee especially during the spells of hot weather. The large planters (repainted twice by a caring resident) near Iceland were also tended by members of the Committee. Such jobs will be ongoing, so volunteers to help with this, when the weather improves, are welcomed please.
- b) The SRA annual fun afternoon was held alongside the Friends of Selsdon Woods on their Selsdon Wood Open Day on Sunday 3rd September the games were organised by the Sanderstead & Selsdon Rotary the SRA had a stall accepting subscriptions there were also refreshments, guided walks and other stalls organised by the FSW. The weather was fine, and there was a good turn-out.
- c) There was patriotic bunting for the Coronation on the railings and the Triangle and clock in the summer. Remembrance Poppies returned to the High Street railings and clock in November. The Selsdon clock area was also decorated in October to publicise Baby Loss Awareness Week, and again, for Christmas to complement the lights on Addington Road.
- d) The Selsdon Triangle (the planting of the upper section yew trees, beds, shrubs and the clock area) are, with Council permission in view of Council funding shortages, now being maintained by a group of Selsdon volunteers. You may have noticed some work being undertaken to tidy and

add to the plants in the area.

- e) Subscriptions and donations are still collected in cash or by cheques each year via a network of local drop-off 'letterboxes' thanks to all the volunteers offering these points and to our Treasurer, Iris Jones for dealing with the cash and cheques no mean feat now we have no local bank! However, the SRA now also supports online banking which is a great help. The details available via our website.
- f) The SRA organise and fundraise for the eye-catching and unique Selsdon Christmas Lights. We think these are the best in Croydon, but they come at a price! The costs include not just the lights themselves but the maintenance, storage, placement, the health and safety permissions, the electricity and the cost of the Community Event for the PA system etc. This is funded by goodwill donations of residents, charitable groups and some traders. To aid this (and capitalise on all the modern-day online purchasing) the SRA are members of 'Easyfundraising' so that, if residents choose to shop online, they can raise a donation with their usual retailers, at no cost to them, by using the well-trusted 'Easyfundraising' app or website. Our cause name is 'SelsdonChristmaslights'. Non-residents are also welcome to use this when buying online, but we have also made it possible for anyone who loves the lights to help by donating using online banking details available via our website too.
- g) Community Christmas Event on Friday 24th November This year, the electricity company switched all the lights on 'en bloc' centrally at 5pm, but Father Christmas still proceeded down Addington Road in his Rotary Club sleigh, before settling into his grotto outside Iceland to speak to the waiting children, the majority of whom seemed to still fervently believe in him! It was the turn of the Greenvale Primary School choir to sing the carols outside the Village Club. Again, we decided to continue in the spirit of trying to be more environmentally friendly and not have helium balloons, but Paul Meakin did hand out some of their own. It was great to see so many people turn up our special thanks go to the choir, Rotary, Village Club and all the volunteers (churches, schools and local groups), who helped with their time or with donations.

The Committee took the decision to ask for the Christmas lights to be turned off at 11pm each night instead of midnight, & again to ask that January 1st be the last day instead of 6th January, in an effort to use less electricity and thus reduce the costs as much as possible.

Please let us have your feedback on the event as a whole.

- h) The Committee were able to hold meetings in person in Selsdon Baptist Church's meeting room. They have waived the hire fee for which we are once more very grateful.
- i) During the year the SRA Committee stay in contact with the local Police teams inviting them to attend meetings where possible and attending ward panel meetings when they are held. The SRA membership is now largely split over two Police wards Selsdon & Addington Village and Selsdon Vale & Forestdale. We are grateful to them for any reports they provide to the committee and the Gazette. The main crimes during the year were again thefts from vehicles, notably catalytic converters. We are still thankfully a low crime area.
- j) We are fortunate that we can easily get outside to walk or run for exercise. We have placed some ideas of local areas to visit on our website. We hope you have been enjoying some of these, and welcome suggestions of others to add to the list.
- k) The SRA continues to pay for access to an online planning app (updated weekly) designed to summarise the Council Planning site to aid our residents seeing for themselves and in good time what relevant local planning applications have been made. Find the link from the 'About the SRA' page of our website, or from http://www.localplanningapps.co.uk/croydon/sra/anupdate/planningtable.html. Keep checking this and, if you can see a problem with an application, make your suggestions/objections known in good time. Sensible changes to plans will save a lot of grief later! The SRA have a Planning Sub-Committee (chaired by Ian Leggatt) to try and review the increasing number of planning applications, and understand the legislation and documentation. Back garden developments and intensification (with no provision for parking) is an ongoing issue for our Planning Sub-Committee. Please keep your ears to the ground, and let us know if anything occurs of concern with regard to development in your area.

Local developments - The development plans for the derelict site at Bailey's/Selsdon Garage seem to continue with no clear end in sight, but plans have been updated recently, as there is a new company leading the project.

The Selsdon Park Estate was sold in 2021. The new owners, Birch Hotels, renovated the building and worked on the grounds to create a new type of leisure venue on the site. Their aim was to open in March 2023, but they advised us at our AGM at the end of that month that a soft opening was preferred shortly after, &, although the lido opened during the summer, the whole complex had to close down in November due to financial liquidity issues within the group.

The Selsdon Gazette and Social Media -

The Selsdon Gazette is a non-profit publication delivered to the door (thanks to all our volunteers, particularly Phil Roberts for still taking on the central distribution role) of about 4000 households in Selsdon. Gazette printing costs are hoped to be covered by the advertising (thanks to Advertising Manager Carlo Rappa, Gazette editor Chris Jones & Gazette Treasurer Jenny Bradley – Carlo has now stepped down from his role, so Chris & Jenny, especially, are looking for a volunteer to take up the reins please). We would like to give thanks to our advertisers for sticking with us, but we do need more to ensure we break even at least. It is essential that we get new advertisers on board, so please ask anyone you know who might be interested. As well as household deliveries, Gazette editions are available online via our website. 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COUNCILLORS' NOTES

COMMUNITY WARM SPACES

Libraries, leisure centres, community and faith organisations are offering warm spaces to support people in Croydon this winter. The venues are free to anyone who wants to either sit, talk or socialise somewhere warm and welcoming. Locations and their opening times can be found on the council website. People are encouraged to check these details before attending.

Anyone who needs financial assistance in the cold weather can find information on the council's website. There is also helpful guidance in Croydon's winter health and wellbeing newsletter to support residents to keep warm and well.

CROYDON LOVES YOU

Croydon Loves You is a new wellbeing programme supporting projects such as Little Manhattan walks and reminiscence events; Thinking of You, Always; Barton's oral history project through Pollocks Toy Museum; and Wild in the City. The Council is now encouraging Croydon's faith, community, and voluntary organisations to run creative events and projects for local people which either focus on or help support wellbeing.

Projects do not need to be complicated or large-scale. They should bring communities together, combat isolation, and celebrate the many good things and good people our borough is home to. Projects must take place between 1st February and 29th March 2024 and can be for sums in the range of £200 to £1,200. Details are on the council website.

MONKS HILL MEN'S SHED

St Francis Church in Monks Hill is launching its Men's Shed on Saturday 17th February. Men's Shed is a national movement of repair shops, targeted at men who otherwise would be hard to engage with. The shed, will offer the opportunity to repair small household items, gain friendship, and help to eliminate the throwaway society. 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

A Good Time for Gardening – February

The Language/Symbolism of Flowers

The language of flowers has been recognised for centuries. It plays a large role in the works of William Shakespeare, as well as myths and folklore from many diverse cultures.

Learning the special symbolism of flowers became a popular pastime during the 1880s. Flowers were used to deliver messages that couldn't be spoken aloud. Many Victorian homes had guidebooks for interpreting the language of these blooms. Flowers could be used to answer questions without a word being uttered. A 'yes' answer came if flowers were handed over using the right hand; if the left was used, the answer was 'no.' If given a rose, this declared devotion. However, a yellow carnation expressed 'disdain.'

When marrying Prince William, Katherine Middleton's all white wedding bouquet was deeply symbolic. The lily of the valley represented trustworthiness and purity, sweet william (gallantry), hyacinths (loveliness), myrtle (love in marriage) and ivy (continuity). This selection of flowers revealed the hope of a loving everlasting marriage.

A groom's buttonhole reflects the flowers in the wedding bouquet and stems from the Medieval tradition of a knight wearing his lady's colours to declare his love.

Now we know why bright red roses are so prevalent in bouquets given on Valentine's Day.

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


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Costains 3rd Selsdon Housing Development. International Style.

We saw, dear reader, back in the December 2023 and January 2024 Gazettes that Costains built 4 types of 'upmarket' houses in Arundel and Norfolk Avenues between March 1932 and the end of 1934. These 4 styles were available with 6 differing specifications. They were "firmly in the English Vernacular style". While Costains were busy building and selling these houses they had desires to continue their extension of suburbia and were eyeing up the opportunities along the Addington Road. The Broadway shops had been constructed in 1926 and 1927. Selsdon Parade followed soon after and the retail infill continued down to the Sanctuary Tea Rooms, now the site of the Village Club. The Footpath from Foxearth Road was a natural break in the retail spread and construction of the Baptist Church on the other side of the pathway had, in November 1927, been completed.

Plot 107, opposite Selsdon Park Farm, was an orchard around which Selsdon Crescent now sits. The Footpath, left, running from Addington Road up to Littleheath Woods. The Sanctuary Tea Rooms at its junction with Addington Road. The Farm and most of the cottages along Addington Road have disappeared.

Only 240 / 242 remain in view. No 184 is hidden in plain sight behind Bairstow Eves' frontage.

The terrain of the land adjacent to and downhill of the Baptist church was challenging: the land sloping steeply down from the back gardens of the houses in Foxearth to the Addington Road. In preparation for their 3rd housing development in June 1933, Costains received permission to construct an elevated footpath on Addington Road starting at the Baptist Church site boundary. This would allow relatively flat pedestrian access to the beginning of the proposed development site. In September and October 1933 planning permission was granted for 60 houses and two

new streets which were to be Selsdon Crescent and The Rise. The Crescent was laid out around an old orchard which was opposite Selsdon Park Farm, now Aldi.

In Costains' earlier two phases, their houses were designed very much to traditional styles. For their 3rd venture they opted to try a more modern and somewhat innovative approach with a new look termed 'International Style'. This was influenced by 'Art Deco' and 'Modernist' styling and featured cubes and rectangles with accentuated horizontal lines, occasional brick panels and white render.



The Daimler Garage, built in 1931, in Herbrand Street London, in the 'Modernist' Style and, perhaps, a model for the appearance of our 60 Costain houses.

Below, an excellent illustration from the Selsdon and Croham, Living History Local Guide No 6, which can be found at the Library.



The house types were named 'Rosewood' and featured the new Crittall steel windows. To break up the dominant appearance of the houses looming above the Addington Road and to reduce the Terrace look, the houses were laid out in discrete units of 2, 4 or 6 from the Baptist Church down to and across the Foxearth Road junction with Addington Road. Not many of the houses still contain their original elements. As time has passed, the Crittall windows have been replaced with UPVC, the feature brick panels painted over, rendering renewed, pebbledashed, or repainted. The occasional porch has been added.



A recent photo of a rarity: pretty much untouched and unaltered but demonstrating the original 'International' style with those Modernist and Art Deco influences.

The Rosewood house layout proved popular: these sold for some £600. So popular that Costains retained the design in their next development.......

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

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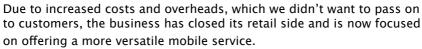

Nature Notes from Ted Forsyth – Trees

In the Friends' coppice area of Selsdon Wood, we cut the old hazel stools almost to ground level and leave them to regrow. The gaps in between different stools are then planted with hazel whips so that all stems tend to grow vertically rather than sideways and, as a result, produce a crop in 7 to 10 years of long straight stems.

Apart from the Friends of Selsdon Wood there are two other groups involved in the wood (plus the Council's Tree Officer and his staff). Rob Sowter coppices on behalf of the Council mainly in The Wend and, as part payment, for the work he sells the cut material as bean poles, pea sticks, tree stakes, etc. A bigger group is composed of contractors brought in for specific work either to take out diseased or damaged trees or to remove some mature trees to create glades and to let in more light to encourage the ground flora. In this case, replanting is done with oak whips so that there will be trees of various ages rather than woodland all of one age.

While some of the tree trunks may be removed for possible sale, many will be left to decay for the benefit of invertebrates and fungi, and the birds and animals which feed upon them. In addition, the Friends have planted 20 different species in the Jubilee Plantation, including, birch, rowan, wild service, wild cherry, blackthorn, hawthorn, wild rose, guilder rose, spindle, elder. This is intended to provide a nesting and feeding area for birds as it matures.
