COUNCILLORS' NOTES FROM ROBERT WARD

SELSDON 100 YEARS

An Exhibition to celebrate 100 years of the modern Selsdon ran from 4th April to 2nd May in the Selsdon Library. It was supported by the UK Government Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF), the Mayor of London and Croydon Council as well as the Selsdon Residents' Association. It coincided with the installation of notice boards and street signs which were financed from money delegated to Croydon Council from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund.

WASTE AND RECYCLING COLLECTION

The new contract for waste and recycling collection commenced on 1st April. There are enhancements to the previous contract and the Council will now, unlike in the past, be actively managing the contract. There

To help in the Council's contract management of the provider, residents are asked to use the Council's website to report missed collections, bins not returned correctly and waste spillage.

GRASS CUTTING

Croydon Council has started a new season of grass cutting that will see our highway verges, housing land, parks and open spaces cut regularly until October. Grass is scheduled to be cut every six weeks along the highways, open spaces and parks, and every five weeks on Council housing land. Digital mapping of Council-owned parks and green spaces has enabled real-time reporting so the service can better plan the schedule.

To support pollinators and wildlife, the Council will work with Friends of Groups to leave selected environmental areas within parks uncut throughout the year. Highway verges will all be maintained, except for some grass verges, such as where the rare Lizard Orchid flowered last year.

MP Natasha Irons' Report Member of Parliament for Croydon East

Dear Selsdon,

This month the nation marks the 80th anniversary of VE Day with four days of celebrations including a flypast with the Red Arrows and a service at Westminster Abbey. I hope that many of you will have had the opportunity to get involved with a street party or event near you.

This is an opportunity to remember and reflect on the contribution of the veteran community in Croydon - and in March, I had the privilege of hosting a service in Westminster Abbey to commemorate the life and work of New Addington veteran Mike Lyons. Mike dedicated over 30 years to the New Addington branch of the Royal British Legion and created the Final Roll Call Campaign, ensuring that WWI soldiers who returned home suffering from PTSD - and were excluded from official memorials received the military recognition they deserved.

To continue Mike's work, we've launched the **Croydon Cares for Veterans** campaign to raise funds for two charities that support Croydon's veteran community: SSAFA Croydon and the Royal British Legion New Addington branch. I was delighted to join representatives from school councils and parliaments from Forestdale, Courtwood, The Quest and Red Gates

Primary Schools to discuss their concerns and hopes for Selsdon. Some of the issues that were raised covered the need for more litter bins, uneven pavements which create trip hazards and the need to improve pedestrian safety across Featherbed Lane. I have written on behalf of the pupils to Croydon Council to see what can be done to address the issues raised and will keep the schools updated on the response.

In Parliament, you may have seen that an extraordinary session was held on Saturday 12th April to introduce emergency legislation allowing the Government to direct the workforce and order the raw materials needed to keep British Steel's blast furnaces running. British Steel is a vital asset to the UK that supplies 90% of Network Rail's rail steel requirement as well as being the UK's major supplier of construction sections. The blast furnaces in Scunthorpe are the last in the country, and if they were allowed to close, the UK would be the only G20 nation unable to make primary steel. With the owners of British Steel announcing their intention to close the site, the Government had to act quickly to secure this important national asset.

Update from our Local Police

This month, the team has been faced with many obstructions due to the new training still occurring which is being given out to all officers. Despite this, the team has still managed to focus on tackling issues within the ward such as the rise in anti-social behaviour (ASB) relating to the use of dirt bikes on the golf courses. We are still urging all residents to report these incidents to police as soon as they are witnessed to help us in tackling this issue.

When officers were given intelligence of drug dealing happening between teenagers within Selsdon, they were able to identify the suspects through the descriptions given and all the youths were detained for a search. This resulted in the seizure of cannabis and a knife. The areas involved are still being regularly patrolled by the team. If anyone expects there is similar activity and a crime is taking place, please call 999 with all the details, however, if it is not an emergency, please call 101 (please note that SNT are not always on shift).

During one of the regular patrols of the area to prevent ASB and the use of drugs, following intelligence received to that effect, police came across a young male who decided to run away from officers. The officers took chase after the male and found him hiding under a car. This male was searched which resulted in cannabis being seized and the male being arrested.

We have continued to carry out school visits with a recent visit to Forestdale Primary School where we talked to the children in year 5 and in year 6, about how to stay safe. The children engaged with the officer really well and both sessions were a success and enjoyed by all the children.



Our "Cuppa with a Copper" events are still happening monthly and we would love to meet you, so please come along to these to meet your local policing team. We are hand delivering letters to specific streets but everyone is invited

to attend these events. We hope these letters will make the invitation more personal to encourage residents to come along. Details of these events can be found on the Met Police website for each ward.

Bluebell *(Hyacinthoides non-scripta)* is a bulbous perennial plant that belongs to the *Liliaceae* (Lily) family. Commonly called Fairy flowers, English Bluebells, Wood bells, and Wild hyacinth, bluebells are one of the most easy-to-recognize protected woodland flowers in the world. 70 percent of all common bluebells are found in Britain.

The flowers are mostly blue, but may vary from white to light blue,

lavender and pink. Every spring, underground bulbs produce a magnificent display of bluebells in forests and throughout the countryside along hedgerows, marshes and meadows. Early blooming bluebells attract a broad range of insects, including woodland butterflies, bees, and hoverflies.

Bluebells have been said to summon fairies. A bluebell could be "rung" like a regular bell, and the fairies would come running to greet you. Concerning bluebells, however, fairy lore has some rather strict warnings. It is suggested that you walk with care and maintain your composure in a bluebell forest, lest you become disoriented by the intoxicating fragrance and become lost.



Fairy lore cautions against picking bluebells. Since the plant is poisonous, it would be wise to heed this advice. In fact, the bulbs can be easily mistaken for wild garlic; so, the warning that you might never leave if you ate anything within the wood might also be worth considering.

Bluebells have historically been used for a number of practical purposes. Their toxic sap was formerly employed to bind the pages of books and prevent insects from snacking on them. The sticky glue was also used to fasten feathers to arrows. Bluebell bulbs were crushed to create starch for the ruffs of collars and sleeves worn by the Elizabethans during the Tudor period. Because of their toxicity, bluebells have had limited use in contemporary medicine until recently. It was revealed that their bulbs contain diuretic (increases urination) and <u>styptic</u> (helps to stop bleeding) components. Research into how these flowers may be able to help fight HIV and cancer is still in its early stages. In the Middle Ages, Bluebells were thought to cure leprosy, consumption, snake and spider bites.

NEW SIGNPOSTS, BLUE PLAQUES AND MAPS FOR SELSDON


April has seen several new 'Wayfinder' signs, blue plaques and maps appear in Selsdon. The one below, seen outside the Village Club, shows all the green spaces in Selsdon, which we can all enjoy. There is a similar one on the Selsdon Triangle by the Selsdon Clock.





Signposts showing directions and approximate walking times to local green spaces, local footpaths, the high street and community spaces, have been placed at the Selsdon Triangle, Ashen Vale/Addington Road and Selsdon Park Road/Addington Road.

Blue Plaques have also appeared on many of our shops along the High Street, celebrating those traders at the start of the Selsdon shopping area.



The maps, signposts, blue plaques, and a soon to be installed new bench on the Selsdon Triangle have been financed by the UK Shared Prosperity Fund awarded to Croydon Council to improve some of Croydon's district centres. Other centres sharing this fund are London Road (West Croydon), Purley, Thornton Heath and New Addington. The organisations involved in how Selsdon's share of the fund was spent included the Ward Councillors, Forestdale Residents' Association, Selsdon Residents' Association, Friends of Selsdon Wood and Friends of Littleheath Wood. The ideas implemented were in line with the Selsdon Community Plan.

The Origin and Early Days of The Selsdon Residents' Association (from the journals of Ted Frith)

One must first consider what happened to require the formation of a Residents' Association. In January 1925 Richard Costain and Sons, the builders applied for Planning Permission to build in Selsdon and were, on March 5th 1925, given approval by Coulsdon and Purley Urban District Council for 146 houses. Costains were anticipating a subsidy of £100 per house but the Council agreed to provide £75 per house.

By September 1925 the first houses were built and occupied. These were situated in the vicinity of the junction of Addington and Selsdon Roads (now Upper Selsdon Road) and comprised the area of Byron and Queenhill, (Upper) Selsdon and Farley Roads. The new occupiers were virtually landlocked. No nearby shops, the nearest being in Sanderstead, no medical facilities, no transport links to the nearest train station to get to work in London, problems with receiving post, and no educational or leisure facilities. There were concerns over the Rateable Value of the dwellings, potential costs to have the roads made up and street lighting.

On 2nd January 1926, 50 owner / occupiers of the new houses met in a Sanderstead church hall, hosted by the Rector of Sanderstead, to "discuss several matters of interest to the residents and particularly with regard to the rateable assessment and travelling facilities". A Mr Low, who had convened the meeting together with Mr T Fisher, agreed to act as pro-tem Chairman. Several further issues of interest to the new inhabitants were

also agreed and their need debated - postal facilities, education facilities and a recreation ground. Mr J W K Nichols proposed that a body should be formed to represent the new community – 'Association of Owner-Occupiers of the Selsdon Garden Village' and a temporary committee of seven residents was formed with a mandate to pursue the first two issues and to draft a Constitution for the group.

Things moved swiftly back in the 1920s. On the 6th February 1926, 70 residents agreed the Constitution of the new group. Chairman, Vice Chair, Treasurer, Secretary and Committee members were appointed.

The following month at the March committee meeting, it was reported that membership stood at 117 and the cost for households was agreed at 1/- (One Shilling {24/- to the \pounds }). It was further agreed to form a Tennis Club and to raise funds to buy land offered by Costains for the Tennis Courts. In September 1926 it was narrowly agreed to rename the association 'The Selsdon and Croham Heights Residents' Association' and then in 1927 the Association was renamed 'The Croham Heights and Selsdon District

Residents Association'. Moving forward to January 1931, the membership stood at 865 while by January 1935, at the AGM, membership was confirmed at 1203. 1936 saw a leap to 1,630 and an impressive 1,750 household memberships were recorded in 1946.

With the storm clouds looming in Europe in May 1939, The Residents' Association discussed its future policy. It was summarised thus:

Increase in the facilities for the youth Greater co-operation between bodies functioning in the area. Getting people to look after the children of parents on *ARP duties Furthering the interests of residents as shoppers Foster the interest of ladies in the SRA Secure the enlargement of bodies promoting sport Procure matter for the Selsdon Gazette and try for an Editor Foster Social activities.

Not so different from the aims of the SRA now.

As ever I am grateful for the journals of Ted Frith for this brief history of the SRA early days. He does not write regarding the dropping of 'Croham Heights' or 'District' from the Association's title. When one considers the membership numbers in 1935 (1203) when 'modern' Selsdon was only 10 years old and the membership recorded at our most recent AGM of 817 when we now represent over 4,000 households something is awry. *ARP = Air Raid Precaution

100 YEARS OF SELSDON EXHIBITION AT THE LIBRARY

This year marks the 100-year anniversary of Selsdon, with planning permission given for the first houses in March 1925. An exhibition was held at Selsdon Library to celebrate this milestone during April with the Executive Mayor, Jason Perry, opening the display on Friday 4 April.



Here one of the contributors to the exhibition, our very own Ian Leggatt, takes the Mayor through the display.

In 1925 Selsdon was a small hamlet comprising a mansion (about to be converted into a hotel) with associated lodges and cottages, a farmhouse flanked on either side with small cottages and a couple of largish Edwardian houses. It was surrounded by fields and woods and crossed by two narrow lanes. A Liverpool firm of builders, Richard Costain & Sons, had come south to seek fame and fortune around London. Their first venture was an estate of up market housing in Kingswood, but then enticed by a government subsidy of £75 per house, they embarked upon the Selsdon Garden Village estate of cheaper houses that the middle classes and better paid manual workers could afford to



buy and own. Selsdon was one of the first such estates on the fringes of London, but was different in that building started on a greenfield site two or more miles from the nearest suburbia, moving down later to join up with South Croydon. The first houses were occupied in September 1925. The exhibition of photos taken over the past 100 years covered the development of Selsdon.

Local Councillor, Robert Ward, has led the project for putting on the exhibition with help from the Selsdon Residents' Association and the Media students at the local John Ruskin College under the guidance of Tracy Carrington. Here follows a quote from one of the contributors, Ian Leggatt, very proud to be a Selsdonian.

"I have lived in and around Selsdon for most of my adult life and have

THE GROWING SEASON

This is my favourite time of year. It is so great to see the daffodils in bloom and the forsythia glowing in the sunshine. One walk we enjoy especially in the spring, is to climb to the top of Croham Hurst and look over the valley beneath us, and see all the little patches of yellow dotted around below us, as far as we can see.

Two or so years ago, a van came down our road and the driver and his mate planted lots of blossom trees. Last year the blossoms looked frail, but this year the trees have grown used to their new "homes" and they are really thriving. It looked like this fifty years ago before they



removed the trees, but now we have returned to pink and white blossom down several of the roads around here, and we love it.

They also use the water as their toilet, which is a nuisance as I have to keep clearing the droppings out again!

Yet bluebells' heady scent denies the triumph of pragmatic gloom, with promises of dreams come true and in this peaceful, fragrant combe I sense a presence dear to me, I feel a hand take mine in his and then I know the day will come when we can share our perfect bliss.

Nature Notes from Ted Forsyth – Slime Moulds

Some Friends of Selsdon Wood members always have a camera available when they enter Selsdon Wood and are the source of photographs appearing on the FSW calendar and elsewhere. While most of the pictures involve largish subjects including landscape, animals and birds, it may be that someone is seriously considering concentrating on macro photography. Modern cameras usually have a macro setting which will allow close-up views of small subjects like fungi, but what I have in mind are Slime Moulds. The most commonly encountered slime mould is probably Fuligo septica - the Dog Vomit Slime Mould - when it appears in its bright yellow form before it turns black and breaks up to release spores. There are a few other species which are large enough to be seen with the naked eye, and we have managed to record some in Selsdon Wood, but there is a vast array of much smaller species which would probably require a separate macro lens, a camera capable of focus stacking, a microscope, and possibly suitable software to manipulate the pictures in the stack so that every part of the minute subject is in focus.

A slime mould goes through several forms during its life cycle. From the spore it will become a mobile single-celled individual, probably invisible to the naked eye, which moves around on moist vegetation, including logs, feeding on bacteria, dead vegetation, etc. When food runs out many individuals congregate in a cluster known as a plasmodium, and this is the stage when we are most likely to note its presence. Slime moulds do

not have a simple male/female arrangement but instead have hundreds of mating types so that within the plasmodium certain combinations occur to produce spores (which will not be identical). A spherical spore packet (sporangium) then develops at the top of a thin stalk and this is the stage we would like to photograph.

You cannot take photographs if you have no subject so the next step is to find some moulds. Encountering a plasmodium is a random event but it definitely helps if you know where to look – the orange spherical blobs of Wolf's Milk slime mould appear on twigs and logs and, like all moulds, change colour as they develop spores; the golf-ball-sized white False Puffball will be found on a tree trunk; the yellow Fuligo septica on grass or logs.

Finding the stalked spore packets involves more work but almost any moist surface is a possible area to look. Dead leaves under a Holly tree might be a good place to start. Transporting a twig or piece of bark to a suitable place at home and watching to see what develops is another possibility.

Searching for Slime Moulds online produced one site from Wildlife Watch which displayed several pictures of the plasmodium state but by far the best site, with hundreds of pictures particularly of the minute stalked spore packets is the Facebook group Slime Mold Identification and Appreciation Group. Note that the spelling of Mold is frequently used. The site is worth looking at even if you have no intention of going any farther with this topic.
