SRA NEWS 'n' VIEWS



2025 - The 100th Year of the SRA

February already, so hopefully signs of Spring (snowdrops, catkins, etc.) are showing by now as the days are getting a little longer! The SRA is busy making plans for a very special 2025 as this year marks our 100th year in operation, with the actual anniversary of the first SRA committee

meeting next January. The SRA is planning exciting events throughout this year, which will keep its committee busy!

Volunteers needed for the SRA Committee 2025/2026

Unfortunately, some of the present SRA committee feel they can no longer give the time necessary for this role, so we urgently need to attract some new members to present themselves for election at the AGM on 26th March. Do you want to help the local community by actively helping us in this way? As well as the centenary celebrations, we have the usual events to plan and manage such as the Christmas Lights Display and Switch-on (Nov 28th) and the Community Event in Selsdon Wood (Sept 7th, tbc). Previously, the Friends of Selsdon Wood organised their Open Day in September, alongside the SRA holding a community picnic and the Rotarians providing games for the children. This year, the SRA have been asked to take over from the FSW and our own, Peter Underwood, is busy making plans. He does need help though! If this appeals to you and you want to become a committee member, please step forward. Contact the SRA via email (mail2.selsdonresidents@gmail.com) and we will reply with any further information you might need to help you make up your mind as to whether or not a SRA role is for you. At the time of writing, it seems we will need at least two new people to volunteer for election to fill committee vacancies.

Selsdon Triangle and the High Street Planters

One of our ongoing tasks is to try to 'beautify' the Selsdon Triangle – the

garden and grass areas between the Sainsburys slip road and the main road. Our Triangle Team of volunteers has worked valiantly on the area on the clock side of the pedestrian pathway for some time. It is now really beginning to look cared for and we hope this will continue. Two representatives of the Triangle Team met the Council Officer responsible for this area on 20th January when he was there overseeing some work to be done that was too arduous for the volunteers alone to do. It has been agreed that this area can be adopted by the SRA as a Community Garden. tended by their Triangle Team, and that the Council will only normally deal with the grass and trees on the other side of the path. It is hoped this acknowledgement of the Community Garden area managed by the Triangle Team will allow the SRA to obtain grants towards the purchase of more plants - and maybe even another bench, if that cannot be financed by the Council. As with the Committee members request above, if you have any comments or queries about the Triangle or anything else in Selsdon, please contact us via our email.

We do, of course, already care for the troughs on the railings and the two planters outside Iceland. One local couple have been very helpful in clearing all the old plants from the planters and topping up the soil with some compost - <u>active</u> volunteering in all senses of the word! The planters and troughs already need some more weeding before Spring/Summer planting so, if you wish to help, then again, please do contact us to offer help.

Transport, Police and Planning Links

The SRA continues to liaise with the East Surrey Transport Committee and Transport for London about the problems with local buses, and with the Police via Ward panel meetings. We also regularly monitor local planning applications which affect residents. Perhaps you have a special interest in these areas and might wish to help the SRA Committee with these – so, another reason for thinking of volunteering your time to the committee? We meet together just one evening a month (excluding August and December) – usually the second Monday – and then deal with anything urgent in-between by email.

Looking forward to a rush of enquiries – please – and the continued support of all our residents!

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Minutes of the Selsdon Residents' Association Annual General Meeting Wednesday 20th March 2024

- 1. There were 68 people present, of whom 11 were SRA committee members
- **2.** Apologies for absence and welcome by our chair, Sheila Childs Apologies: Pam Holden, Jenny Stawman, Phil Roberts, Andy Stranack, Gillian Stotten
- **3. Acceptance of the minutes** of the last AGM on 29th March 2023 was proposed by Sara Bashford & seconded by lan Leggatt
- **4. Matters arising** nothing which wouldn't be discussed as below

5. Police

We were pleased to welcome Sgt. James Morrow, PC Alex Smith & PCSO Alex Warmington from the local police - James apologised for being in plain clothes, but they were on duty as part of a burglary operation until 2am for the next 3 nights, so we were lucky to have them pop in

In recent times, a local drugs warrant was issued, resulting in the arrest of someone high up in the county lines drugs chain - another operation lasted 3 nights trying to apprehend motor thieves, which is a main concern in the area

James proceeded to take questions from the floor - he was asked for help with double parking on Addington Road by the food outlets causing traffic issues especially on weekend evenings - advice was sought re pushbikes, electric bikes + electric scooters being used on pavements, creating danger for pedestrians - these would be watched for & warned in the same area - electric scooters themselves not being illegal, but being operated without insurance is - bike-trained police would be engaged to observe & breathalyse, if required

The police, especially Alex S, were commended on their compassion dealing with a burglary at the home of one of the audience in January

The issue of nitrous oxide being supplied & used was mentioned - both these are now an offence, so local sightings would be targeted especially in our woodland areas

Cars appearing to be neglected on our roads without current MOT should be reported via the council website, untaxed cars can be reported as abandoned - the police will only get involved in matters of criminality

6. Treasurer's Report

A copy of the accounts for 2023 had been circulated in the March gazette Iris Jones as Treasurer provided an update:-

Income is up this year by £2500

Subscriptions are up by £720

Out of the 4000 addresses to which the gazettes are delivered, last year only 670 houses paid the £5 for SRA membership, but this year that has gone up to 835, which is great

Donations from the residents were up by nearly £1000

Traders' donations were £548, which is down by £300 from last year We collected £167 from the day on which Santa visited for the Christmas lights turn-on and also collection boxes left at The Golden Ark, The Village Club and the Sir Julian Huxley.

We also received £193 from Easyfunding.

We received £491 interest from the Nationwide Reserve account Expenditure is down due mainly to the Christmas lights being kept for an extra year so at a reduced price

Expenditure stood at £9058

No donations were requested this year

We made a profit of £2962, but there had been a £600 provision made for the electricity bill, but this came in at only £324

There was also a provision of £1000 for the barriers for Santa's visit, which we have had to buy ourselves, but this is a one-off expense

We would like to thank Jeff Bayton for reviewing the accounts and all the people who volunteer to be letterboxes for the subs envelopes.

Sheila thanked Iris for her hard work, & acceptance of the accounts was proposed and seconded. The room voted in favour with none against

8. Editor's report - The Selsdon Gazette

Chris Jones, the gazette editor since April 2020, gave us an update: The gazette team in 2023 consisted of:

Jenny Bradley our Gazette Finance Manager, who invoices our advertisers and pays our printing costs. She also deals with our postal copies Phil Roberts, our Distribution Manager. Unfortunately for us, Phil now has a new job and can no longer do this role in 2024. Any volunteers please? Our thanks go to Phil, who kindly covered the role, since taking over from Wendy Mikiel

Carlo Rappa was our Advertising Manager until September. At the moment Jenny B and I are filling this role

Mark, our printer, who does such a wonderful job, taking my word document and turning it into the booklet, which comes through your door Lastly, our army of unsung heroes, our distributors and deliverers.

This year gazette readers have continued to supply the cover photos for the publication, and these have included 4 wild animals or plants, 4 showing scenes from around Selsdon, a plea for subscriptions in June, designs from children for the Christmas edition, and the Selsdon Contact bus celebrating their 50 years in Selsdon

Regular contributors who I must mention are:-

Our Councillors with their monthly notes, and our local MP, Chris Philp Our local police officers keeping us informed about crimes happening in our area and what we can do to prevent these, Mary Gill has continued to provide her wonderful poems, Ted Forsyth his nature notes and Frederick, Cedric and Sunflower Sid their gardening tips.

My thanks also go to some committee members for putting pen to paper:lan Leggatt for his series about the early days of Selsdon, and how the various housing estates have developed

Janet Sharp has continued to inform us about ivy, flint and getting our affairs in order, and has challenged us to try something new Su Yates has reported on her visit to Birch and the electric cooker called 'The Croydon'

Letters to the editor have informed us about electric cars, the ULEZ scrappage scheme, exemptions for Council tax, the London Borough of Culture events and the boundary changes to our constituencies,

complained about the size of the new postage stamps and their effect on the writing space on a postcard, and complained about the answers to some of the monthly quizzes, as well as inspiring us with memories of growing up in Selsdon in the 1940s and 1950s, and a description of the starlings' murmuration seen in Selsdon's skies.

Also, a special mention to our regular letter writer, Jessica Blake, with her seasonal views on life and her amusing Christmas tale for children

The Gazette has run two competitions for Selsdon's children in 2023 – the Christmas cover competition, and the Make a Crown for the King's Coronation. Thanks to all the children who entered

This year, it has been so good to hear from so many of our local groups in Selsdon. We are truly blessed with so many activities to choose from Please remember that the Selsdon Gazette aims to be self-financing, with our advertisements paying our printer costs, so, if you use one of our advertisers, please tell them where you got their name from, and, if you know of any local businesses or tradesmen wanting to expand, tell them about advertising in the gazette, which is delivered to about 4000 households.

Finally, we always look forward to receiving contributions from local people, so do think of us when you take a photo, encounter problems, solve problems, hear of good deeds or local news and events, or even when you write a poem!

9. Christmas Lights

Linda Morris, our vice-chair, advised that the Christmas lights switch-on this year will be on Friday 29th November, probably with Father Christmas again switching on the lights down the high street to re-create the magic of years gone by. She thanked the local Rotary for providing Father Christmas on his sleigh, and her many stewards, Mike Goss for his sound system, the Village Club for staging this, the Greenvale school choir for singing their carols & the Baptist Church for their free drinks + mince pies

10. Annual Subscription

There was no proposal to put up subscriptions. They would stay at £5 per household for 2024/25, although extra donations would be welcomed. This was proposed by Peter Underwood, seconded by Iris Jones & supported by the meeting

11. Election of Officers and Members of the Committee for 2024/25 Linda thanked Sheila for another year in the Chair – she was happy to

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continue once more, so Linda proposed her, & all in attendance agreed

Sheila thanked the room for her vote, welcomed any ideas or thoughts from those attending, & pointed out that the association would be 100 years old in 2026, which we would hope to mark. She then dealt with the other committee positions

Vice Chair – Linda Morris - Proposed by Sheila. The room voted in favour with none against

Treasurer – Iris Jones - Proposed by Sheila. The room voted in favour with none against

Secretary – Trevor Stotten - Proposed by Sheila. The room voted in favour with none against

The remaining committee members agreed to stand again, bar Ernie Sweeney, who was standing down after many years, as he was moving away – Sheila thanked him, as he had been a font of knowledge, dealing especially with council matters – the committee was proposed en bloc by Sheila & seconded by Iris. The room voted in favour with none against. There therefore remained two posts on the committee to be filled, But Geoff Bailey & Ken Davis put themselves forward, & Trevor would liaise with them

12. Adoption of the Accounts & the reviewer for 2024

Thanks were given to Jeff Bayton for auditing the accounts. He was happy to continue, & was proposed by Iris as treasurer + seconded by Su Yates. The room voted in favour with none against – Jeff was thanked for his care & maintenance of the planters too in Addington Road

13. Any Other Business

We were pleased to see 2 of our local councillors, Robert Ward & Joseph Lee, at our meeting, besides Cllr. Joseph Cummings in the audience – Robert explained that planning had finally been granted for the Selsdon Garage site, so hopefully this would now progress, as it had been derelict since 1997, but now has a new company overseeing matters – there is a library consultation exercise we are all encouraged to take part in online – hopefully Selsdon's library will see increased opening hours as a result – the Love Clean Streets app was again promoted, especially with issues over bin collections – we are also encouraged to use the big belly bins along Addington Road, & support our local litter picks

There was a question about overgrowth covering pavements – the council should write to residents, & resolve in public areas like visibility on street corners + junctions

There was another question about the change in parking meter policy – this is due to 3G coverage being phased out – parkers can pay in local shops, although Selsdon thankfully still allows one hour free parking on Addington Road

There was another question about litter, with extra bins required, especially at bus stops like by Tudor Library & outside Sainsburys – again Love Clean Streets was mentioned to report this, although Sainsburys are meant to maintain the area outside their store

The next litter pick is scheduled for Saturday 8th June to coincide with National Litter-Pick Day

The final point from the floor was to thank the SRA for all they do for the community

There being no further business the meeting concluded at 9.10pm, with time left for refreshments & informal chat

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SRA ANNUAL REPORT 2024

The Selsdon Residents' Association (SRA) was formed in 1926, and so will be celebrating its centenary during 2025, culminating with its 100th birthday in January 2026

The SRA's aim is to advance and protect the interests of the residents of Selsdon. It is run by volunteers on goodwill and funds raised by subscription and donations. Our membership covers about 4,000 households – mainly those in the previous council wards in the central part of what is now a wider Selsdon. The map of the roads covered is on our website www.selsdon-residents.co.uk

The SRA Committee

The annually-elected committee meets together once a month to discuss Selsdon issues. They respond and take action where necessary. It acts as a point of contact for external bodies, can potentially add collective

weight to any individual resident's concerns about the area, and is a useful 'watching eye'. The committee also plans special events and community improvements. Individual representatives will also try to attend council, police, transport and other meetings throughout the year on Selsdon's behalf. SRA news is passed to the community via public noticeboards (by the library and on the high street), social media and The Selsdon Gazette.

AGM 2024

The 2024 AGM was held at St. John's Church Hall on Wednesday 20th March 2024.

SRA 2024 Activities:

- a) Floral displays were again displayed in the troughs attached to the railings outside the shops opposite the Sir Julian Huxley. To save costs, these were planted and watered by members of the Committee especially during the spells of hot weather. The large planters (repainted twice by a caring resident) near Iceland were also tended by members of the Committee. Such jobs will be ongoing, so volunteers to help with this, when the weather improves, are welcomed please
- **b)** The Selsdon Triangle (the planting of the upper section yew trees, beds, shrubs and the clock area) are, with Council permission in view of Council funding shortages, now being maintained by a group of Selsdon volunteers. You may have noticed some work being undertaken to tidy and add to the plants in the area. The council helps with work too onerous for us to manage.
- c) Remembrance Poppies returned to the High Street railings and Selsdon Triangle clock in November. SRA supported a bereaved family who again decorated the clock area in October to publicise Baby Loss Awareness Week. The SRA decorated it for Christmas to complement the lights on Addington Road
- d) The SRA annual fun afternoon was held alongside the Friends of Selsdon Wood on their Selsdon Wood Open Day on Sunday 8th September the games were organised by the Sanderstead & Selsdon Rotary Club the SRA had a stall accepting subscriptions there were also refreshments, guided walks and other stalls. The weather was fine, and there was a good turn-out.
- **e)** The SRA is grateful to have been able to take part in this FSW event since its inception. We hope to be able to facilitate it in 2025, as the FSW can no longer do so.
- f) The SRA organise and fundraise for the eye-catching and unique Selsdon Christmas Lights. We think these are the best in Croydon, but

they come at a price! The costs include not just the lights themselves but the maintenance, storage, placement, the health and safety permissions, the electricity and the cost of the Community Event (posters, safety barriers, the PA system, etc.). This is all funded by goodwill donations of residents, charitable groups and some local traders. To aid this (and capitalise on all the modern-day online purchasing) the SRA are members of 'Easyfundraising' so that, if residents choose to shop online, they can raise a donation with their usual retailers, at no extra cost to them, by using the well-trusted 'Easyfundraising' app or website. Our cause name is 'SelsdonChristmaslights'. Non-residents are also welcome to use this when buying online, but we have also made it possible for anyone who loves the lights to help by donating using online banking – details available via our website too.

g) Community Christmas Event on Friday 29th November – again this year, Milestone switched all the lights on en bloc centrally at 5pm, but Father Christmas still proceeded down Addington Road in his Rotary Club sleigh, before settling into his grotto outside Iceland to speak to and give a lollipop to all the waiting children, the majority of whom seemed to still fervently believe in him! It was the turn of the Selsdon Primary School choir to sing the carols outside the Village Club – which they did with gusto! Again, we decided to continue in the spirit of trying to be more environmentally friendly and not have helium balloons, but Paul Meakin did hand out some of their own – but air-filled. It was great to see so many people turn up - our special thanks go to the choir, Rotarians, Village Club and all the volunteers (churches, schools and local groups), who helped with their time or with donations.

The Committee again took the decision to ask for the Christmas lights to be turned off at 11pm each night instead of midnight, & again to ask that January 1st be the last day instead of 6th January, in an effort to use less power, and thus reduce the costs as much as possible.

- h) Two SRA competitions were held this year via the Gazette: a children's Easter Egg Hunt along the High Street, and a 'Grow the Tallest Sunflower' competition for adults and children. The Mongolian Giant nurtured by Malcolm was the overall winner at a whopping 366cm.
- i) Subscriptions and donations are still collected in cash or by cheques each year via a network of local drop-off 'letterboxes' thanks to all the volunteers offering these points and to our Treasurer, Iris Jones, for dealing with the cash and cheques no mean feat now we have no local bank! However, the SRA now also supports online banking, which is a great help. Please use this if you can to save our Treasurer having to find a bank to pay in the cash; the details available via our website.













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




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- j) The Committee were once more able to hold meetings in person in Selsdon Baptist Church's meeting room. They have waived the hire fee for which we are once more very grateful.
- **k)** During the year the SRA Committee stay in contact with the local Police teams inviting them to attend meetings where possible and attending ward panel meetings when they are held. The SRA membership is now largely split over two Police wards (larger than the SRA area) Selsdon & Addington Village and Selsdon Vale & Forestdale. We are grateful to them for any reports they provide to the committee and the Gazette. The main crimes during the year were again thefts of and from vehicles. We are still, thankfully, a low crime area.
- I) We are fortunate that we can easily get outside to walk or run for exercise. We have placed some ideas of local areas to visit on our website. We hope you have been enjoying some of these, and welcome suggestions of others to add to the list. We hope to receive some finance via the Council's £90000 Shared Prosperity Fund to pay for improved signage & amenities in our area.
- m) The SRA continues to pay for access to an online planning app (updated weekly) designed to summarise the Council Planning site to aid our residents seeing for themselves in good time what relevant local planning applications have been made. Find the link from the 'About the SRA' page of our website, or from http://www.localplanningapps.co.uk/croydon/sra/anupdate/planningtable.html. Keep checking this and, if you can see a problem with an application, make your suggestions/objections known in good time. Sensible changes to plans will save a lot of grief later! The SRA has a Planning Sub-Committee (chaired by Ian Leggatt) to try and review the increasing number of planning applications, and understand the legislation and documentation.

Back garden developments and intensification (with no provision for parking) is an ongoing issue for our Planning Sub-Committee. Please keep your ears to the ground, and let us know if anything occurs of concern with regard to development in your area.

Local developments - The development plans for the derelict site at Bailey's/Selsdon Garage seem to continue with no clear end in sight, but plans have been updated recently, as there is yet another new company leading the project.

The Selsdon Park Estate was sold in 2021 to Birch Hotels, but the whole complex had to close down in November 2023, due to financial liquidity issues within the group. It remains on the market, hopefully still as a hotel / leisure estate at this time, but to date we are unaware of any firm interest.

The grounds remain closed to the public.

COUNCILLORS' NOTES

FORMER SELSDON GARAGE SITE

It is very pleasing to be able to report progress on the former Selsdon garage site, which has been derelict for more than a quarter of a century. Although planning permission was granted in February 2024 the developer still needs to raise funding to finance the development. This has now been supported by a proposal agreed by Mayor Perry for the Council to take on a long lease of the site to support housing needs through increasing affordable housing supply. The development will be delivered by Inspired Structured Solutions who will provide all funding and carry the development risk.

We're still some way from starting work on site, but this is important progress.

BUS SHELTERS

The removal of bus shelters and the appointment of a contractor by the previous administration who failed to deliver replacements has taken longer to rectify than hoped despite strenuous efforts by the Council. In common with the vast majority of other London boroughs the shelters will now be provided by Transport for London. It is anticipated that 99 shelters will be installed by the end of March 2025. A list should appear on the council website shortly, including which of these shelters will have the countdown feature showing the estimated time till the arrival of the next bus.

WINTER PREPAREDNESS

We are now well into the winter period when we can expect snow and ice, so please be prepared. Be aware that although the council grits the main roads, side roads are not routinely treated. You can find more details on the council website on the page "Road Gritting and Salting".

For residents' use the council has 578 salt bins that are repaired and filled at the start of each winter. You can find where they are on the council website on the same page as mentioned above. If a salt bin is low or empty, please report this on the LoveCleanStreets app.

SELSDON LIBRARY

The library is now open six days a week including Saturday. Current opening hours are 10am to 6pm on Monday, Wednesday and Friday; 9am to 5 pm on Saturday and self-service from 9am to 7pm on Tuesday and Thursday. Last entry is 30 minutes before closing. Do please take advantage of this valuable community facility.

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WASTE COLLECTION CONTRACT

A new street cleaning contract will come into place by the summer. Whilst it's the same contractor, Veolia, it is under a very different contract with improved street cleaning, a new night-time waste and cleansing service, and enhanced waste collection service for flats above shops. The council will also be actively managing the contract to ensure service delivery to residents. These new focuses are going to make a big difference to how our borough looks and feels.

Our monthly surgeries take place in the Jubilee café downstairs from Sainsburys. A private room is available should there be a matter which cannot be discussed in public. The timing is 10am until 11.15am on the first Saturday of the month, except January and August. MP Natasha Irons' Report Member of Parliament for Croydon East

Dear Selsdon,

As mentioned in my last update, I have been looking at how to improve banking facilities on Selsdon High Street. The lack of banking facilities in the area has been consistently raised with me and I agree that the situation is far from adequate.

Having written to LINK, the independent organisation responsible for assessing local banking facilities, they agreed to conduct a review of Selsdon High Street. They have now completed this assessment and are in the process of compiling their findings into a report. I have arranged to meet with them ahead of its publication later this month and will update you on their recommendations as soon as I get them.

In more local news, I am deeply concerned by Croydon Council's plans to cut its Youth Engagement Team. The YET provide vital outreach work in schools, youth hubs and the community. The plans have not been published in full so there has been little to no scrutiny of them by local councillors or any meaningful consultation with the people that rely on this service. I have started a petition calling on the council to allow councillors to scrutinise these plans and for residents to be consulted about the future of youth services in Croydon.

In Parliament, I was fortunate enough to speak in the debate for the first reading of the Children's Wellbeing and Schools Bill. The bill will see the biggest upgrade in children's safeguarding in a generation. It includes a register for children who are educated at home, a crackdown on illegal schools and information sharing between agencies so that it is easier to spot children who are at risk of abuse.



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We have also seen the introduction of the Renters' Rights Bill which will give better protection to both good tenants and good landlords. The bill will see the end to no fault evictions, whilst protecting a landlord's freedom to take a property back to sell it or to live in it. The bill also means that a decent home's standard is applied to the private rented sector and issues like damp and mould will need to be fixed.

News from our Local Police

Currently in Selsdon we have unfortunately seen a rise in robbery offences. All victims have been students of John Ruskin College and the main locations have been the parade of shops by the Co-op and Morrisons, and the alleyway next to the College itself. There has been a total of 5 offences and it is believed that 4 of the offences have been committed by the same suspect. The last offence was on 24/12/24 and the suspect is currently still outstanding so we ask residents to remain alert. The suspect's description is a black male of large build, very tall and on each occasion has been wearing black clothing and a black balaclava

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covering his face. I have tasked the team with a combination of high visibility and plain clothes patrols in the area and we have been assisted by a robbery squad and a proactive uniform task force also completing patrols for us. I have held meetings with the College and the arrest of this suspect remains a priority.

The teams have continued with patrols in the estate opposite John Ruskin College to combat drug use in the main blocks of Middlefield Road and Bellfield Road. We have seen a good reduction in these offences being reported by residents, so the patrols seem to be working well.

There was also a good bit of recent proactive work from the team in identifying a vehicle in a public car park

on the Markfield end of Courtwood Road which was seemingly abandoned but on being searched contained several illegal drug substances including Cocaine, Cannabis and Ecstasy tablets. The owner of the vehicle has been identified and interviewed and has admitted to the possession of the drugs. He will now be charged for the offences.

In the upcoming months we have confirmed dates in February where we will be completing an ANPR operation targeting vehicles using the road which have been stolen. We shall be looking to repeat the 'Knife Arch' operation at the College due to the rise in Robberies.



We have noticed that our Team's 'Cuppa with a Copper' events have not been very well attended so we have decided to personalise the events a bit more by personally inviting certain roads across the wards each time. This means the team will be out delivering letters to residents in the hope that the events will be better attended. The aim of the meetings is to have

personal introductions and communications with us as the local policing team so that relationships are formed if any police involvement is required in the future. We only ask that once residents receive their letters, could they make every effort to attend and say hello to the team over a nice hot drink.

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Good Time for Gardening – February

Let's think about those stalwarts of our daily lives, whatever the weather – the house plant. The following plants came under the heading of 'virtually unkillable!' My kind of house plant!!



Snake Plant - doesn't need much water; just give a drink when the soil feels dry, about every few weeks but much less in winter. Thrives in almost all light conditions (though not a windowless room). Greater light is better, but anything is fine. Every now and again - just whenever you remember - give the leaves a light wipe to keep the pores free of dust.

Peace Lily – a pretty tough plant and will usually bounce back from a missed watering. Water only when the top 2cm of soil feels dry. Easy when it comes to light, managing in most conditions, though the plant will flower more in a brighter spot. Absolutely loves humidity. If your bathroom gets lots of light, pop the plant in there, or mist every few days.





Sansevieria, Tough Lady – this plant prefers the soil on the drier side, so only water lightly when the soil feels completely dry. Like other snake plants, as long as there is some natural light, 'Tough Lady' is happy in most light conditions. Keep the striped leaves free from dust by giving them a gentle wipe with a clean cloth every now and then.

Epipremnum, Global Green - Super simple to water. Check weekly and just give a drink if the top five cm of soil are dry. An undemanding plant which will be fine in almost any light. However, the plant will grow quicker in a brighter spot. Loves rooms with lots of moisture, like a bathroom or kitchen. In other rooms, occasional misting will be required.





Parlour Palms - In spring and summer, this plant gets thirsty so check weekly and water whenever the top 2 cms of soil feels dry. Loves moderate to bright light, but direct sun is a bit much. In a very sunny room, move away from the window. Moisture in the air will help keep her leaves green and fresh. This is easily done by misting about once a week.

Devil's Ivy - Super simple to water - check weekly and just give a drink if the top five cms of soil are dry. Not a plant to make excessive demands - fine in almost any light, but will grow quicker in a brighter spot. Loves rooms with lots of moisture, like a bathroom or kitchen. In other rooms, occasional misting will help.

For many years I lived like this, felt virtuous and good, then noticed something was amiss with other people's food.

My fam'ly, neighbours, and my friends were carnivores at heart.

I told them they should make amends – turn veggie for a start.

Then, slowly as my nagging grew, I watched them change their ways, they all became strict vegans too and thus, they earned my praise.

From here, the bit between my teeth, my faith grew deep and strong, I propagated my belief that eating meat is wrong.

At last, I won the heart and mind of everyone on earth - made them see they must be kind - all animals have worth.

You'd think I might have rested then and seen my duty done, no human would eat meat again - my battle surely won.

But cats and dogs along my street, of whom I was quite fond, liked nothing more than eating meat. I had to go beyond.

Carnivores of every type, with two legs or with four, must be subjected to the hype they must eat meat no more.

The cats and dogs were easy prey, their owners understood.

Vegan petfood saved the day and everything looked good.

But dogs and cats eat mice and rats, I could not make them see - that in domestic habitats strict vegans they must be.

We fitted muzzles to the dogs and bells to feline pets. Now birds would hear these greedy mogs and fly like feathered jets.


Then I surveyed the wider world and saw, with sinking heart, I'd many battles yet to fight - the pets were just a start.

Out in the wild – the wolf, the fox, the lion and the shark, wolves, hyenas, owls and hawks all left their bloody mark.

I boldly went where few would dare to Serengeti's plain. I lectured lions in their lair, I tried hard to explain.

But lions could not be reformed by anything I said. They had no wish to be informed and one bit off my head. Here Ted tempts us out for a walk in Selsdon Wood spotting all the different varieties of fungi to be seen.

Nature Notes from Ted Forsyth – The Gorses in Selsdon Wood



The Gorses is a significant section of woodland encircled by the East Gorse and West Gorse paths and divided by the Middle Gorse path through the middle. Originally there was a large area of Larch where Tawny Owls could be seen roosting in the winter and where Crossbills would stop for a brief visit at the end of June. Despite the use of the Gorse name, there were very few visible pieces of Gorse in the area. After the Larch trees were felled and much of the scrub was removed, it was not long before it was obvious that the local soil held a hidden bank of Gorse seed along with seed from many small trees such as Birch and Sycamore.

Gorse seedlings were soon appearing all over the cleared area, making The Gorses name more appropriate but eventually causing us to start removing some overgrown Gorse to open the area up and to reduce potential fire risk.

The tree stumps remaining from the felled Larches began to support fungi and we quickly recorded Turkeytail, Clustered Bracket, Sulphur Tuft and Southern Bracket. The appearance of mushrooms anywhere in the woods is very dependent on the weather throughout the year but in some

years we have found False Chanterelle, Slippery Jack and others on the grassy part of Middle Gorse. While clearing vegetation we have frequently piled the cuttings within the woodland, and the resulting decaying pile has produced Coral Spot, Candlesnuff, Crystal Brain, while nearby have been Dead Moll's Fingers, Green Elfcups and Parasols.

Farther along the path, through the woodland, there are open areas where Amethyst Deceivers appear, and several log piles which have produced Purple Jellydisc and Beech Jellydisc. Among the leaf litter between the trees, we have seen Upright Coral. Towards the end of the path several boletes have appeared.

Halfway along East Gorse is the gate to Baker Boy Lane where we have seen Splitgill, Peeling Oysterlings and White Knights. Opposite this area by the edge of the path a few Wood Blewits occurred and the nearby ground often has a few Common Earthballs. Towards the end of East Gorse there are log piles where Crystal Brain has made an appearance.

West Gorse has two parts. The first part is open with grassy edges and occasionally has members of the Russula group of Brittlegills. There was once a specimen of Hen of the Woods at the base of a tree near the path. The second part of West Gorse, from Linden Glade to the Farleigh Border path, appears to be the most productive for fungi. In one edge of the path,

we have found Crested Coral growing while the other end of the path had an unidentified Cup fungus. Along the length of the path there have been frequent records of Leafy Brain and Dead Moll's Fingers, and a single record of Velvet Shield. There is usually a Beefsteak somewhere and Chicken of the Woods sometimes appears among the trees. Scarlet Elfcup has appeared once. Yellowing Curtain Crust appears annually. Common fungi like Candlesnuff, Sulphur Tuft, and King Alfred's Cakes are all found here.

Between Middle and West Gorse there is another area of Larch which is not easy to enter but there are several Larch stumps which often display specimens of Yellow Stagshorn which grow on decaying conifer wood.

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The Linden Glade pool attracts insects which in turn bring in several kinds of Bat. The nearby trees hold roosting and nesting Tawny Owls, and the area provides a territory for Stock Dove. Where Middle Gorse and Leafy Grove meet both Blackcap and Chiffchaff hold territories. The elusive Weasel has been seen scampering across Middle Gorse.



As many fungi produce profuse quantities of fungal spores it is probable that the air is full of them and in the right conditions spores from other sites might fall into the woods and germinate to produce species we have never previously recorded. The possibilities are endless so keep looking for new species!

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
