


Transfer of Land to Brick By Brick

In the near future the Council is likely to transfer parcels of land in Selsdon to its wholly-owned subsidiary company, Brick By Brick. Brick By Brick are planning to build on these green spaces, despite opposition from local residents. They did a similar thing in the town centre in 2017 so Cllr Helen Pollard requested details of the previous land transfer for Heathfield Gardens so she could give Selsdon residents an idea of the process. Cllr Pollard is often asked about timings and thought this would help clarify the situation. It should be noted that there was vehement opposition from local residents to the development at Heathfield Gardens, but the Labour Council went ahead regardless.

A Freedom of Information Request was submitted to the Council on 2nd November. The deadline for a reply passed on 29th November and, as yet, Cllr Pollard has *not* received a response.

Hawthorn Crescent - Development on Green Space

Since the Council unveiled plans to build on the green space at Hawthorn Crescent, there has been strong opposition from local residents. The Council nevertheless proceeded with a consultation event which gave details of the plans for the buildings that would be built on the area of grass in the Crescent. Local residents are trying to save the grassed area, not only because it is a valued green space, but also because it is the site of a Second World War air raid shelter. The shelter could accommodate around 100 people and, after the war, was an area where children played. Local residents are keen to protect this precious heritage asset and potentially unearth it in the future. We wait to hear whether the Council will abandon their plans to dig up the shelter in order to sink the foundations for buildings.

So, it's a cause for concern if the perpetrators do come down to Selsdon and Forestdale area as that is what they were doing a couple of months ago. So, do take this advice on board especially if you own a hybrid car. Or pass on the information to someone you know that owns a hybrid car.

How the theft works:

A catalytic converter is located in a box on the exhaust pipe under a car. In order to steal it, thieves slide under the car and use high-powered cutting tools to detach the box from the pipes around it. The metals are expensive and includes metals such as palladium, rhodium, and platinum. The thieves sell the converters for a couple of hundred per piece, depending on the size of the converter and the current rate on the metals inside it. It could cost you up to £2000 to replace a catalytic converter, and it is illegal to drive your car without one.

What we advise:

- Parking your car in a garage overnight
- Ensuring your car is parked to make accessing the catalytic converter harder
- Trying to park in a location that is well-lit and overlooked
- Installing CCTV to cover where your car is parked
- Marking your catalytic converter with a forensic marker, which can make it harder to sell on by thieves

If you own one of the above makes, look to speak to your manufacturer about in a "Catloc", a device which makes it harder for thieves to detach the catalytic converter from the bottom of the car. You should also register your converter and mark it with a forensic marker, which will make it harder for thieves to dispose of. Visit securedbydesign.com for more details.

Warlingham walk and spot the wildlife!

If you like to get into the countryside for a walk it is worth remembering that we in Selsdon live on the border of Green Belt! If you are worried about getting lost on one of the many footpaths around the area start with an established trail. If you have a Smartphone I can recommend "ifootpath.com". This free app has one walk in our area. "The Horseshoe Warlingham and Farleigh Trail". You can either print the map in advance or follow it 'live' with your phone as you go.

It takes you in the direction of Selsdon (great view of the back of the hotel), past 'The King's Wood' (spot the deer) through part of Farleigh Golf course (spot the Skylarks), past riding stables (spot the



.. you get the idea), past 'The Harrow' and back. It has some short climbs, kissing gates and some stiles. It would be manageable with children and/or dogs! The approximate time for the walk would be 2 to 2.5 hours. Once you have completed it once you might like to add your own variations and detours.

I hope by now you will have taken part in Croydon Council's public consultation over the proposed revisions to the recently agreed 2018 Local Plan. "Due to be adopted in 2022, the review will update the vision and strategy for Croydon's growth up to 2039 and set out how the council will continue to deliver much-needed new homes, jobs and community facilities." Our Council's further review is in response to meet Mayor Khan's declared requirement for more housing. Our open spaces and Green Belt remain at

risk of development and in last month's Gazette I described the measurable benefits of Trees in improving our health.

What about the other tangible and intangible benefits of trees and green spaces? The Lancet recently published research, which was funded by the World Health Organisation, into Green Spaces and Mortality: Green Spaces were found to have a beneficial effect on health and well-being. Expansion plans at John Ruskin College following recent merger



In February 2019, John Ruskin College (JRC) merged with East Surrey College incorporating the Reigate School of Art under the group name of 'Orbital South Colleges'. The merged College aims to share resources and offer a comprehensive range of core skills, technical and professional qualifications and vocational courses, as well as Apprenticeships ranging from Entry Level up to Degree Level courses (at ESC site) including Degree Apprenticeships. The JRC caters for ages 16+ which includes mature learners and a new Special Educational Needs department. The JRC has a state -of-the- art digital media suite, a professional photography studio and commercial on- site Hair, Beauty and Spa salons. The Health, Care and Early Years Department also has a virtual nursery facility.

There are exciting plans for the new academic year (less than 9 months away). To house a larger number of students, to an expanded range of courses, we've been told that a large new building will be constructed on the front lawn of the 10 acre site. This is planned to begin soon and finish in good time for students entering in September this year (currently enrolling).

JRC origins and evolution- A centenary year

John Ruskin College started life in 1920 as the *John Ruskin Boys' Central School* located in Scarbrook Road, Croydon. In 1935 the school moved to Tamworth Road (see image), and in April 1945 it became the *John Ruskin Grammar School for Boys*. It moved to Upper Shirley Road in 1955, and was retitled the *John Ruskin High School* in 1971 when it became mixed sex. (The Upper Shirley Road site surrounded the Shirley windmill a 19th-century tower mill (see photo). The upper forms transferred to Selsdon Park road to form the present John Ruskin College, (utilising the premises which formerly housed the John Newnham Secondary Selective School). The Shirley school site was demolished in 1991 to become a housing estate (the Windmill was protected and remains).







The school is named after John Ruskin (8 February 1819 – 20 January 1900) who had family links to Croydon. He was the leading English art critic of the Victorian era, as well as an art patron, draughtsman, watercolourist,

a prominent social thinker and philanthropist. He actively promoted art education and museums for the working classes. He wrote on subjects as varied as geology, architecture, myth, ornithology, literature, education, botany and political economy. Today, his ideas and concerns are widely recognised as having anticipated interest in environmentalism, socialism, sustainability and craft.

Selsdon Park Road - a site of education since 1951. (69 years)

The land housing the college was formerly part of Stones Farm, Addington (renamed Heathfield Estate). (See Image of remaining

Heathfield estate land)
Upon this agricultural
land was built an airy and
modern school which
opened in 1951 (the
land surrounding it to
become housing). The
new school was called
The John Newnham
School (named after a



local dignitary) and was a Secondary Selective which became a comprehensive in 1971. It was closed in 1987. The **John Newnham** building was used for a while for training and as offices but was subsequently refurbished and reopened to house the **John** Ruskin College.

There is an active alumnus of both the John Newnham school as well as the John Ruskin Grammar school who connect via the internet for reunions and chat.

The Grass is Always Greener – Early Post War Years.

A few months ago I wrote about the Parr family, our good neighbours in Abbey Rd, and especially David Parr my best mate. David's Aunt Vera was married an Irish Guardsman. Of course his name was Patrick, Uncle Pat to me. I remember him as a giant of a man, resplendent in his war time military uniform.

After the war they lived at West Wickham and Mrs Parr, David, my Mum and I, would get the 64 bus to its then terminus, opposite Featherbed Lane at Addington. We would then walk to West Wickham and back along the Addington Rd.

Now, this is a very busy main road. Then it was a narrow, tree lined

country lane with no pavements and the trees arching over to create a tunnel of greenery. But of course, with few car owners and petrol rationing, there was no traffic to worry about!

Today's road bypasses the old village of Addington, via Kent Gate Way, but our walk took us past The Cricketers pub and the ancient, St Mary's Church.



Then crossing over the bottom of Spout Hill, we continued past the old village blacksmiths. Work horses were still much in use then, for ploughing, milk carts, pulling heavy loads such as delivering coal, brewer's drays, etc. It was fascinating watching the blacksmith at work shoeing the horses in the workshop shown below.

Next came the Addington cricket ground, one of the oldest cricket clubs in England. The club started in 1743 and is still there today. It is the reason for the village pub (as it originally was) being named "The Cricketers."

Continuing our walk through history we would come to the county border and pass from Surrey into Kent. Here on the south eastern side of the road was a bit of Victorian engineering. A large smoke stacked building with a constant thumping as its huge engine

pumped water from deep underground to a water tower on a hillside above. Through windows in the building's walls one could see a large flywheel driving the pump, up and down, 24/7 as we say today. A modern pump house is still there, but instead of coal and steam the quiet motor is probably now electric powered. Those days and memories are long gone, and so are the Parrs. But not forgotten, and in 1950 the next part of this story continued.

Today we hear a lot about austerity and Tory cuts. The doom mongers obviously did not live through the early post war years under the Labour government! Rationing got worse than during the war, not helped by dock strikes and war weariness. By then many had had enough and emigrated to Canada, Australia and elsewhere. Vera and Patrick took the opportunity and the 6 week cruise to Oz, at the special offer price of only£10! Having settled there, their glowing reports persuaded Mr and Mrs Parr to up root with David and Pauline and join the exodus.

Mr Parr worked in the City of London and one important reason for him wanting out, was the appalling daily grind on crowded and antiquated trains to and from London Bridge. He told us this story of his last journey home from the city in 1950. As he crossed over the River Thames he took off his bowler hat and threw it into the river, shouting, "I'm free, I'm free!" Everyone in the commuting crowd thought he was mad. Perhaps he was – mad with exhilaration and expectation!

I have already mentioned the continuation of food rationing. Those that emigrated to Oz were encouraged to send food parcels back to us, half-starved in the UK. For several years Mrs Parr sent us parcels at Christmas and Easter, of tinned peaches and apricots, delicacies which we could not get here in Selsdon. This was preceded by a long newsy air mail letter to my Mum, telling her that a parcel was on its way. The parcels of heavy tins had to come by ship, a six-week voyage. Forewarned, we could not wait for the postman to arrive with these special treats, especially at Christmas time!

The Big Garden Birdwatch helps the RSPB to monitor trends and help understand how birds are doing. Their results will aid experts and law makers in taking steps to protect them. It's easy to take part.

Watch the birds for one hour

Choose an hour between 25 and 27 January to watch the birds in your garden or local park.

1. Count the most birds that land at once

Only count the birds that land in your garden or park, not those flying over. The same birds may land more than once, so you can avoid double counting by recording the highest number of each bird species you see at any one time – not the total number you count over the hour.

2. Tell us what you saw

Every count is important, so don't worry if you don't see anything. Observing which birds aren't around is as important as seeing those which are. Submit your results online at respt-org.uk/birdwatch from 25 January until 16 February or if you'd prefer to send them by post, download a submission form from respt-org.uk/birdwatch. Make sure you post your findings by 11 February.

If you enjoy this you may be interested to know that the RSPB Croydon Local Group also provide monthly illustrated Wildlife Talk and can give special talks to local groups.

23 December, SELSDON'S A LOW-CRIME PLACE; LET'S WORK TOGETHER TO KEEP IT THAT WAY.

I'm writing to address some queries that your readers have made about Selsdon and Forestdale Local Policing Team. The Team is made up of 2 Police Officers and 1 Police Community Support Officer. When on shift we patrol Selsdon and Forestdale regularly, in vehicles and on foot. We know some of the "crime hotspots" in the area that are mainly used for drug dealing and drug consuming. When seen this is where stop and searches take place.

If people tell us of other areas around Selsdon and Forestdale where drug or anti-social behaviour activities are taking place we, as a team, can take measures such as regularly patrolling such an area, in uniform or even in plain clothes operations, to quash the issues. To increase effectiveness in combating crimes, we work alongside both the Sanderstead and Purley Oaks teams who also patrol the area, either with us or on their own.

To help with burglary concerns we can give free Smartwater, which is a burglary prevention tool. To receive one or to get more information please do email me; it's jack.killian@met.police.uk I can visit your home with the kit and give a crime prevention house tour to help you make your home as safe as possible.

We have a phone number: **0208 721 2464**. This is a landline number but it goes through to the mobile phone that I always have on my person when on shift; so you should get an answer. or at least a call back within a couple of days.

150 YEARS SINCE THE OPENING OF THE SUEZ CANAL

On the 17th November 1869 the Suez Canal had its official opening day. Before that time the big tea clippers and other vessels sailing to the East had to travel around the Cape of Good Hope, thus the opening of the Suez Canal made the passage much faster. It is not quite as straight a canal that one may visualise but is around 120 miles long (193 km). It is also broken up by three lakes, Lake Manzala, Lake Timsah and The Great Bitter Lake which also contains the Little Bitter Lake, but it doesn't count as four lakes apparently! The boats wait in the lakes until passage is clear from boats coming in the opposite direction.

The canal was barely 26 feet deep (8 metres) and 72 feet wide (22 metres); and it was 200-300 feet wide at the surface. Although passing places were built around every 5-6 miles of the canal, during the first four years alone there were 3,000 groundings and many collisions. After a time, many boats carried lanterns to try and show where other shipping were, and the canal was frequently closed for dredging and widening.

After a time, it became "One Way"; one sailed out to the East via the canal but had to return via the Cape of Good Hope. The canal has also been closed through wars and disputes on several occasions, but now we have air flight the canal is not quite so important, though many will dispute that fact.

A statue was designed for the canal. It was modelled on an Arab

woman wearing a veil, but although the official opening of the canal was attended by most of the Heads of State and the Royalty of most countries in Europe, the ruler of Egypt "Khedewi Ismail Pasha" became bankrupt and the statue was jettisoned in the name of economy. The statue was huge and was named, "Liberty Enlightening the World". Another more interesting translation was "Egypt Bringing Light to Asia" but the French sculptor had his own enlightening, and when the Egyptians didn't require it after all, he instead offered it to the Americans, as a gift, and they renamed it, "The Statue of Liberty". A fleet of ships was once stranded in the canal for more than eight years. It was at the time of the Six Day War between Egypt and Israel. The Egyptian government blocked either side by mines and scuttled ships; fifteen international ships were stranded in The Great Bitter Lake. The crews were rotated home on a three-monthly basis. Eventually the marooned ships were allowed to leave the canal in 1975. By then only two of the vessels were seaworthy enough to make the voyage under their own power.

There is another strange connection, which may be of interest. We have all heard of Tesco the grocers. It was founded by a Jewish man called Jacob Edward Cohen, the son of a Polish immigrant. According to Wikipedia, "Jack" Cohen, as he liked to be known, bought a consignment of tea for his first shop from a company called T. E. Sheldon and took the first three initials of TES and added the first two of his own name, hence TESCO. The reason these two apparently unconnected facts are mentioned in the same article is because "Jack Cohen" during the first world war was on board "HMS Osmanieh", a passenger and cargo ship, which had been taken over by the Royal Navy as a supply and troopship. It hit a German mine and was blown to pieces, at the entrance to Alexandria harbour, as it was heading for the Suez Canal. A German submarine had laid the mines two days before and no one was aware of it. The "HMS Osmanieh" sunk within seven minutes and 209 people were drowned. A nurse, who found Cohen in the water, helped him stay afloat and saved him. He was 21 and the year date was 17th December 1917. In 1919 he returned to England after contracting malaria and in 1919 was demobilised. That was

the year he then began trading, using his demob money to buy goods for his first market stall; and so Tesco is now 100 years old.

Two events linking 150 and 100 years ago. Both still have input on many lives.

It was a record request show and, typically, the requests came in by letters "read out over the air...to husband John from Jane and Jonny, please play..." a song or tune which brought them together for a few minutes, in heart and mind, at least. And, over there in Germany John would be glued to the wireless set. Being, originally, "Two-Way" both ends could request a play.

One particular joy, to me, was hearing R&B, Blues and other American music, including movie soundtracks. My very first musical memories are of "Hit the Road Jack" and "Millionaire"; Ray Charles and Eartha Kitt, of course.

Meanwhile, in the real world, while requests were read and music played, Sunday lunch was nearly ready.

Three generations of us, and friends, would sit down before the music show had finished. Beer, small beer, cider and pop were poured and we tucked in, chatting. "Family Favourites" finished and, for the next hour or so, the radio was the centre of attention.

Together we'd listen to "The Navy Lark" and the World's Greatest Ever Radio Programme. "Round The Horne".

This weekly routine was wonderful; we laughed so much, sang along with the songs and, when it was over, looked forward to the next episode of Sunday Lunch.

I grew up to the sound of the wireless. It was a major factor in the construction of a zeitgeist in which I'm not alone. I once heard the actor Robert Lindsay, famously "Citizen Wolfie Smith", on Desert Island Discs. He described his young Sunday lunches almost exactly as I have, mine. He's a little older and he grew up in the Midlands. The fact that Sunday lunch was exactly the same in his house is an illustration of how much more we shared a common experience in those days.

The Missing Part is good BBC Radio. It could bring us all together in fun, laughter, enjoyment and appreciation of others, and all at the same time; every week.

Helping families create a sustainable future

Before you start

Remember this needs to freeze. So play it safe and make it a day or so before you want it.

Ingredients: 10 strawberries, half a tsp lime zest and 100ml lime juice. (I used three limes to get that much juice.), 175ml water, 112g sugar, 50ml white rum.

- 1) Pop your sugar and water in a pan over a low heat so the sugar can dissolve. (This will only take around minute.)
- 2) Then stick that into a jug with your lime zest and juice, rum and chopped-up strawberries. (I like to leave a couple strawberries for decoration at the end.)
- 3) Let it cool down before you pour the mix into a container that won't leak.
- 4) Now just stick it in the freezer. All you have to then is give it a stir every now and again.
- 5) Once it's frozen, it's ready to serve. If it's frozen completely solid, then just break it up with a fork. I think it's a nice touch to put a strawberry on the edge of the glass if you want to look like you're making a bit of an effort.
- 6) All that's left is to serve and enjoy.

Easy Rice

It grows simply, is harvested simply, and is simple to cook

Here are two quick and simple ways to cook rice. One is "quick and dirty", the other works for kitchen table or dinner parties. Let's start with that:

Steamed Saffron Rice

1 cupped palm-full of Basmati rice per person (big hands have bigger frames to support, and the opposite, usually; it's a ratio that works, and is easily adjusted with practice). 1 saucepan with lid, preferably heavy but always the right size for the meal.

4 black peppercorns

2 cloves

Tiny pinch of nutmeg

A pinch of good salt

Dessert spoonful of butter

1 thread of saffron OR level teaspoon of turmeric

NOTE: the only essential ingredients are rice, butter and saffron or turmeric. Saffron is delicately flavoured and costly, so perhaps it's best saved for lightly spiced dishes.

Method

Put the rice in a large sieve, run cold water through it till clears. Let it drain.

Whatever size saucepan that you need to use, it is very important that you don't use too much water at this point. About half an inch deep is all. Put your thumb in, nail down; if the water comes halfway up to the first knuckle from the nail, it's good. About 1.25 cm, I'm told. Bring the covered pan of water to boil and remove from heat Add the butter and turmeric (or saffron and optional ingredients, too). Stir and return to heat. Add the rice and stir gently until it starts to boil. Immediately reduce the heat to minimum and cover.

Do something else for 15 minutes. DO NOT LOOK! DO NOT LIFT THE LID! If the heat is too much, and the lid is too light (I have this) it starts "spitting"; move the pan a little off the gas and change its position occasionally.

Time's Up

Remove from heat.

Uncover and fluff the rice up with a fork.

Serve. Eat.

Enjoy the rice and savour the compliments, too

<u>Notes:</u> Occasionally, with this method, a little dry skin of cooked rice is attached lightly to the pan. After removing the rest, simply put some cold water in the pan, cover and leave 5/10 minutes. The residual grains come off easily.

Also, I only use Basmati rice. Buy a good-sized bag and you'll save more money than you might have thought.

Standing on my head with a hand behind my back rice

1 cupped palm-full of Basmati rice per person

A little butter or olive oil

1 uncovered saucepan of appropriate size with plenty of water A pinch of good salt (not a good pin...)

1 decision – you can rinse the rice now with cold water, or at the end with boiling water)

Method

Bring the water to boil, then stir in the salt and butter

Add rice, stir and let it simmer, stirring occasionally, for about 10 minutes Meanwhile, boil a full kettle of water

YOU MUST now try a grain or two. It will take a few tastes, maybe, but you'll know when it's done.

Remove rice from heat, drain immediately with a large sieve Rinse with boiling water from the kettle.

Drain

Serve. Eat.


