



MP Natasha Irons' Report

Member of Parliament for Croydon East

Dear Selsdon,

I hope everyone had a wonderful Christmas and a New Year Celebration.

Thank you to everyone who braved the bad weather to attend my coffee morning on 7th December. It has been wonderful hearing from you about what improvements need to be made to your area, what you like and what I should be focusing on during my time in Parliament. One of the issues that continues to be raised at these events is the limited access to cash and the lack of a bank on Selsdon High Street. I have been in touch with LINK, an independent organisation that monitors access to cash and banking services, to see if there are any new services that could be installed. I am pleased to say that LINK is now undertaking a review of Selsdon High Street and will be assessing if it would be a good location for a banking hub. I will update you with their assessment as soon as I get it.

In Parliament, the government announced £1 billion in funding to support local councils to tackle homelessness. My office has dealt with 164 temporary accommodation cases since July and housing is the biggest issue facing many people in Croydon East. So, it is welcome news that Croydon Council will be receiving £15 million to tackle homelessness. In addition, Croydon Council will be part of a pilot scheme that seeks to end the use of Bed and Breakfasts for temporary accommodation. With 3,214 Croydon residents placed into temporary accommodation last year, this can't come soon enough.

On November 27th, I joined Minister Alex Davies-Jones at Croydon Family

Court to launch a new pilot scheme aimed at tackling domestic violence. The new Domestic Abuse Protection Orders (DAPOs) combine the strongest elements of current protective orders into one flexible order.

A DAPO can:

- Stop someone coming to or near your home
- Decide who can stay or return to your home
- Order the person to attend a behavioural change programme
- Order the person to wear an electronic tag to check they're keeping to the conditions of the order

Victims can apply for an order themselves or a friend or family member can apply on their behalf. To find out more about DAPOs or to get support please visit the government website.

Finally, I have been contacted by residents about the poor performance of the 443 bus route. I have written to TFL who have acknowledged that the service has not been running as it should. TFL are now working with the operator to develop plans to improve the situation.

Good Time for Gardening – January



It's grey! It's dull! Time to seek out some colour in our lives along with signs of warmer, brighter times ahead. All of the following plants/bulbs/shrubs will be showing some colour over the next few weeks. Please remember that the seasons and the weather can be a bit of a moveable feast. Both very cold and warmer temperatures will have

an impact on the garden. At the moment the bulbs all look to be shooting up for early blooming.


- ~ winter jasmine pale yellow, unscented flowers which appear before the leaves;
- ~ silk tassel bush long pendulous catkins;
- hellebores various colours; pale pink, cream, pale green or even deep maroon;
- ~ crocus best planted in groups. These return each year.

- ~ snowdrops **
- ~ camellia very showy blooms and glossy leaves;
- ~ primroses delicately scented;
- ~ viburnum delicate pink, strongly scented flowers
- ~ early daffodils possibly 'February Gold' or 'Tete a Tete'
- ~ winter flowering honeysuckle small blooms with a sweet scent;
- ~ winter flowering clematis evergreen with bell shaped flowers; grows best against a wall;
- ~ winter flowering pansies many different colours and extremely hardy plants.

** RHS Wisley has a self-guided winter walk ... if you can cope with junction 10 on the M25!

If you do visit, go into the Alpine House to see their collection of snowdrops.

Wisley used to hold the National Collection of Snowdrops. Nowadays they are kept behind locked glass doors due to visitors stealing the bulbs!!

Selsdon's Early Costains Housing – Whats in a name? (2)



We have previously seen, back in January 2021, that Costains were fond of naming their new roads in honour of family, local place names and sister projects. It appears that Liverpool celebrated the growing company with its own street.

We readily accept that a property will have a number as part of its postal address with which to identify it. The new occupants of the Selsdon houses in 1925 taking up residence in Queenhill, Byron and Upper Selsdon Roads had no such means with which to identify their

property. They were faced with houses with no numbering system to identify them. The Postal Museum, in their History of House Numbering reveals that allocating and managing house numbers was the responsibility of the Local Authority since 1855. In 1925 Selsdon fell under the control of The Coulsdon and Purley Urban District Council, so it would be they who were to allocate postal numbers to the new houses. That seems not to have happened immediately.

The first committee members of what would turn out to be The Selsdon Residents' Association are listed in January 1926 as residing at 'Newlands', 'Homeleigh', 'St Albans', 'Homestede' and 'Ingle Nook' in Byron Road and 'Lynedoch' in Upper Selsdon Road. The locations of the houses bearing those names are, perhaps, now lost.

It appears to have been fashionable with the aspiring middle class to name one's property in an effort to emulate the grander Victorian or Edwardian Villa. 'The Old Forge' or 'The Old Dairy' presumably would relate to the previous use of the building. 'Glen View' or 'Tree Tops' could be derived from the view from the property. Closer to home we had a grand house called Langley Oaks, down Upper Selsdon Road, which is now remembered in Ridge Langley and Langley Oaks Avenue. No such luxuries in the new Selsdon houses. Our fledgling committee members, bearing in mind that another epithet for the quickly expanding Selsdon was 'The Honeymoon Village', may have been attempting to convey an air of happiness, comfort or anticipation with their Byron Road house names.

It is not known whether some wags decided to amuse their neighbours with these house names:





In my own section of Queenhill Road, there is still to be found 'Lyndhurst' adorning the entrance to a house. Albert Arthur Beach purchased the then new house for £650 on 9th June 1926 and his address was given as at Lawson Road, Southsea, Portsmouth. One wonders what stories are locked up in the saga of moving from a small Victorian terraced property in Somerstown, then a deprived area near the dockyards of Portsmouth, to a new semi-detached 3 bedroom home in leafy Surrey. It would seem that perhaps there were fond memories of Lyndhurst in the New Forest? The present owner is not known to have any such attachments to the New Forest but values the original name plaque as an interesting piece of social history.

A street directory of 1937 reveals that, literally closer to home, my own house was owned by a James Verity and the house was named 'Elgie'. My immediate neighbours' houses were named 'Francoombe', 'Colwyn' and 'Oakley'. By this time the houses also had postal numbers and while these have remained, the names have gradually disappeared. As 'late' as 1966 a letter addressed to the owner of No 1 Foxearth Spur specified 'Derwydd' in the first line of the address. Derwydd is in Carmarthenshire, Wales. There are few house names remaining – a stroll around reveals 'Treetops' in Littleheath Road and 'Northside' on the north side of the road. In Byron Road can be found 'Tregantle' which is also the name of a beach in south east Cornwall overlooked by a 19th Century fort.

Welfare State – Social Protection

After the two World Wars ordinary people of Britain wanted a fairer, better place to live.

The UK Welfare State was introduced to offer social protection and aids to equality such as access to health care, education and income security. As we know the Welfare State is paid for from taxation. It is also reliant on a network of voluntary groups working alongside.



The welfare system has been under some reform and financial strain due to changing societal needs, rising costs, life expectancy and population. This may lead some people in need to think that they do not want to claim "handouts" or other help from an overburdened

system. However, getting help sooner may mean that you then will need less help later. As part of the community, you should have both the opportunity to contribute and know others are there for you.

Do you know what benefits, social protection you might be offered/entitled to?

Some benefits are not restricted to those on a low income. For example, the elderly or disabled who require personal support for day to day living at home are entitled to an 'Attendance Allowance'. Carers might be entitled to an allowance or if missing days of work could claim some replacement NI contributions towards their state pension. These are just two examples.

If you are struggling or in need and don't know what is available to helpthere are voluntary organisations that can help:

Nature Notes from Ted Forsyth – Teamwork

I regularly have three badgers in the back garden in the evening, visiting to investigate the small amount of food I put out for them. They arrive as individuals and initially behave quite calmly. However, once the food supply dwindles beyond a certain point their behaviour changes. They become more selfish, claiming the remaining food for themselves by lying on top of it, or using their bodies to slam into each other. Teamwork is not a term to apply to the behaviour of these animals.



For other creatures – particularly members of the socalled social insects such as ants, termites, honey bees, etc – teamwork is an essential part of their lives. In a hive of honey bees, whether in an artificial hive or in a natural cavity in a tree, the solitary queen bee spends her time pumping out eggs. She is attended by many workers who tend and clean her and supply her with food. They also remove the eggs as they are laid and transfer them to brood cells, created from wax obtained from glands on their bodies, where the hatched-out grubs are reared and looked after until they eventually emerge as new worker bees. Some bees leave the hive in search of nectar and pollen to feed the members of the hive community and will store some of the material in the form of honey which is needed to keep them alive over winter. Hornets will eat honey bees but there are occasions when a number of bees will get together to pile on top of the marauding hornet and might raise its temperature sufficiently to kill it. Each bee can use its solitary barbed sting, which it can withdraw from an insect victim, but in human skin the barb is held fast so the bee is sacrificing its life as the sting gets ripped from its body and the bee dies.

The large Common (or possibly German) Wasps, which trouble people when they are having a picnic, have a different lifestyle. Rather than return from a foray with nectar and pollen, they bring back insects and caterpillars as food, or they scrape at wooden surfaces and create a papery substance which they use to build their nest in a suitable cavity, frequently in the ground. They also feed upon ripening fruit and can become drunk when the fruit is over-ripe. Each wasp has a sting without barbs which can be withdrawn from the victim and used again. As they do not store food for the winter, once new queens leave on their mating flight, the remaining inhabitants of the colony will die.

The fearsome Hornet looks like a large wasp but is in fact much more docile and is less of a problem if not disturbed. They normally nest in a cavity in a tree or elsewhere. I have had hornets enter my garage through a small gap then proceed to build a nest which eventually reached a size of at least 16 inches (40 cm). Towards the end of the season the queen lays eggs which become males and queens rather than workers. The males and new queens fly off to start a new colony, with the new mated queen hibernating until spring. The old queen and her colony then die. There have been cases recently in the south of England of the yellow-legged Asian Hornet building nests. The nests are usually destroyed when found as these hornets are voracious feeders on Honey Bees and other pollinators.

Teamwork of a different sort is involved in winter when a number of small bird species join together in a mixed flock and forage together

through a wood. A flock could contain a selection of Blue-, Great-, Coal-, Marsh-, or Longtailed Tits, TreeCreeper, Nuthatch (see picture on right), Great and Lesser Spotted Woodpeckers. The movement of the flock at different levels in vegetation might disturb various invertebrates and make it easier for members of the flock to find scarce food.



While predators in UK are usually solitary there are many cases in other parts of the world where that is not the case. Lions and Hunting Dogs in Africa, Wolves in North America, Orcas in the oceans, all hunt cooperatively as their normal way of obtaining food. Some large birds of prey will hunt in pairs to flush out their prey but the classic avian example of cooperative hunting has to be the Harris Hawk of the southern United States where small groups of, possibly related birds, combine to chase their prey on the ground.

Forgotten Croydon entertainment destinations?

Who knew that Croydon used to have supposedly 'Europe's largest ice rink'? A little bit of online research has told me that The 'Imperial Ice Rink Purley' opened 1931 with this boast. Not only could visitors enjoy dance and speed skating, but the rink also hosted exhibitions, carnivals and ice pantomimes and international ice hockey. The Imperial ice rink was forced to close in 1950 because the pipes used for freezing needed replacing and the cost of steel for these was prohibitive so soon after the end of the war. (1)



It then became the 'Orchid Ballroom' – supposedly with the largest dance floor in the UK. In 1962 it was acquired by Mecca. By 1963 it had become a major South London concert venue for live pop music as well as a dance hall. For 10 years it hosted some of the biggest names in the pop music business, such

as Ben. E. King, The Who, Otis Reading, Tom Jones, Jimi Hendrix and Percy Sledge. But in 1973 it closed as a concert venue and morphed into a discotheque/nightclub - first, in 1974, 'Tiffany's', and then as 'Jazz', 'Cinderella Rockerfellas' and the 'Metropole', finally closing as an entertainment venue in 1990. Today the building serves as a health club and gym.(2)

A well-known nightclub in central Croydon that opened in the late 80s and ran for 18 years, was the 'The Blue Orchid'. In its heyday people queued around the block to enter but it closed its doors. According to the same blogger (3), before the



reinvention as 'The Blue Orchid', the venue was 'The Greyhound' from the 60s to the late 80s. It hosted major bands of the day including Thin Lizzy, The Jam, The Ramones, Boomtown Rats, and The Cure.(3)



We also can't forget The Fairfield Halls which opened in 1962 and was also a major live concert venue. It hosted many major bands such as David Bowie, Queen, Elton John and even a live stage recording of a Morecambe and Wise comedy performance. For over 30 years the London Mozart

players were resident too. The fantastic acoustic and excellent sight lines from all seats for both the Concert hall and The Ashcroft Theatre providing a great 'listener experience' and easy access via good transport links. We should remember that we still have The Fairfield Halls, which despite (IMO) poor marketing, is still hosting public shows and events. It is worth making the effort to go out for entertainment! In December, I went to a fantastic Christmas concert in the Ashcroft Theatre by the 'Chineke! Orchestra' which is Europe's first majority Black and ethnically diverse orchestra. Not only was it a great quality event and reasonably priced, but being local, my journey home was easy too!
