POSTPONED SRA ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING



Wednesday 6 July 2022 Church Hall, St John the Divine, Upper Selsdon Upper Road Doors open 7.40pm, 8pm start

At the AGM there is a Special Resolution to agree clarifications/ amendments to the SRA Rules (see below for the overview of these changes).

The SRA was formed in 1926. It is not known what Rules / Constitution was agreed by those intrepid and original Selsdonites. More recently our 'Rules' were amended in 2004, then 2014 and subsequently 2018. They have served us adequately up until recently when Covid became part of our lives. Lockdown and shielding were never in the lexicon of those pioneers in 1926; your committee found themselves trying to navigate a new 'normal' with a set of rules which were just not fit for purpose anymore. The decision was taken to adapt the Rules to cover this situation and also, to take the opportunity to conduct a review of all the Rules. The ensuing proposed changes will be put to the vote at our AGM on 6th July 2022.

Main Changes:

- 1. The 'Rules' become 'Constitution'
- 2. 'Chairman' becomes 'Chair'
- 3. The 'Executive' (which was not defined in the Rules) becomes 'Officers and Committee'
- 4. Membership of the SRA more clearly explained Catchment Area and Voting Rights made clear.
- 5. The roles and voting rights of Honorary President and Hon. Vice President(s) are made clear.
- 6. The option to hold meetings remotely is enabled.
- 7. In extenuating circumstances, a smaller quorum of Executive and Committee is enabled to make decisions.

COUNCILLORS' NOTES

GRASS CUTTING ACROSS THE BOROUGH

Since the elections in May the Council has been rebuilding the grass cutting team. The first priority was to get grass cut for Jubilee events that took place between 2nd-5th June. The team now have a schedule in place that will mean all grass verges and parks will be cut by the end of June. This will then be followed by a programme of regular grass cutting across the borough.

THREATENED BIN STRIKE CALLED OFF

Selsdon residents will see their bins collected as usual, as a looming strike has been called off. Workers were threatening to walk out of work for three weeks over "poverty pay".

Now workers employed by outsourced contractor, Veolia, have been offered a pay deal. The strike, involving 100 people, was due to begin on Thursday 16 June for a three-week period.

Employees have now voted to accept the pay offer worth 8.5 per cent as well as an additional one-off bonus of \pounds 750.

HEATHFIELD HOUSE PLANNING APPLICATION

A planning application has been submitted by a special needs school provider to use Heathfield House to provide education for vulnerable young people. The plans would allow the facility to provide a valuable service. However, the plans include fencing around the site that will place some restrictions to public access to the house and surrounding grounds. MAYOR STARTS WORK ON CHANGING THE LOCAL PLAN

Croydon's Executive Mayor is taking forward his manifesto pledge to remove Croydon's planning design guidance (SPD2) and to ensure that any new development in the borough focusses on high-quality design that respects the character of local areas.

Removing SPD2 will mark the start of a reset of planning within the borough, with future design guidance being developed with communities to help protect the character and aspirations of local areas.

MP Chris Philp's Report Member of Parliament for Croydon South

Planning Victories in Croydon at last!

On June 16, the first meeting of the Planning Committee under Croydon's new Conservative Council administration took place. The usual range



of applications were presented, which sought to destroy houses built for families and replace them with flats on Meadow Rise, Coulsdon; the Ridge Way, Sanderstead; and Firs Road, Kenley. A slightly different application for a scheme on Manor Way in Purley was also presented.

Each of these schemes would have been waived through by the Planning Committee in the past without a second glance. Legitimate concerns that such proposals would over-develop the area; destroy much-needed family homes; breach planning policy; and damage the character of our area would have been ignored.

I am pleased that the Planning Committee, now Chaired by Conservative Councillor Michael Neal following May's local elections, afforded the applications the scrutiny that they deserved. After careful consideration, the four applications were all turned down. This is a huge and very welcome change. At last planning policy is being properly applied and residents are being listened to.

Delivering for Croydon with new Mayor Jason Perry

In recent years, Croydon Council has not given social tenants the care and attention that they deserve, with residents in places like Regina Road living in appalling conditions. That's why the Mayor and the Cabinet Member for Homes, have begun to visit social accommodation to listen to residents' concerns and have committed to adopting a new Tenants' Charter, developed in collaboration with residents and the Housing Improvement Board. The Charter sets out how the Mayor's administration will prioritise residents' needs and outline the level of service they can expect in the future.

Success: New Fire Remediation Development in Croydon South

I am delighted to confirm that Optivo, one of the largest housing associations in the UK, will no longer be passing on costs to leaseholders relating to fire remediation and interim works – which has severely impacted residents at Cygnus Court and 53 Whytecliffe Road South, as well as other buildings across London. This means that the costs of fixing historic defects will not be passed onto residents, nor will the costs of waking watch and alarm installations.

After many months of lobbying both the Government and Optivo on behalf of residents, I am thrilled that this news has now come. Leaseholders should not have had to go through the mental toil that came with this uncertainty and therefore I trust this news will come as a great relief.

This is a difficult time for many people with prices rising for petrol, energy and food. I am always here to try and support people and I am doing local surgeries in person again. If you or anyone you know wants support, contact <u>sarah.jones.mp@parliament.uk</u>

I am also able to offer tours of parliament again now covid restrictions have been lifted which is great! If you are interested in coming on a tour, please get in touch with me by email. I am also really keen that people know what I've been doing in Parliament and in Croydon. I do a monthly email (which I keep pretty non-political!) which I hopes gives a good account of what I am trying to do on your behalf. If you would like to sign up to it, just let me know.

I have been very active in Parliament recently – leading for the Labour Party on two major Home Office bills in my role as Shadow Policing Minister. The war in Ukraine has obviously taken many of the headlines, but I have spoken in debates across a wide range of issues from the Grenfell fire to the Treasury's response to the cost-of-living crisis. Locally in the part of Selsdon I represent I recently intervened to halt an illegal development. I'm keen to help protect our green spaces and meet regularly with a local environmental group, if you'd like to be involved, please do get in touch. I'm also pleased to see that local police have begun putting on catalytic converter marking events as I know from constituents that there have been a number of these thefts in the Selsdon and Forestdale area.

And after a difficult couple of years, it was such a delight to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee – goodness weren't there a lot of street parties and events! My favourite was a wonderful lunch for veterans, where we were able to celebrate the Queen and those who have fought to protect our country.

Personal robbery is where items are stolen from a person using force or the threat of force. The most common items stolen are mobiles & other electrical items, cash & cheques and tools & machinery.

Protect yourself from street robbery

Here are some useful ways to keep you and your property safe on the street.

- Look confident
- You are less likely to be targeted if you look confident. Move with purpose and try to be aware of your surroundings.
- Know where you're going
- Plan your route and think about what to take with you, especially if you're going somewhere that you haven't been before. Keep to busy, well-lit streets, walkways and paths which are more likely to be covered by CCTV. Only take licensed taxis or minicabs booked by phone or a mobile phone app.
- Hide it
- Keep your mobile phone and valuables out of sight. If you're using your phone, it's more likely to be snatched from your hand as you're not paying attention to your surroundings, so look around you.
- And never leave a mobile, any other device, wallet or purse on the table of an outdoor café, pub or restaurant. Same goes for any jewellery you might be wearing – keep it covered when walking down the street.
- Finally and this is so important to remember if you're threatened with violence, don't risk your personal safety. Property can be replaced, you can't.

Saving Selsdon Wood - part 4

The core group of 5 called the 'Selsdon Wood Preservation Society' were Mr Lawrence Chubb, Miss AM Bonus, Mr MG Sharpe, Mr EA Earl and Miss WM Hudson.

In this final part of the series, we hear of Miss WM Hudson and her extraordinary family.

Miss Winifred Mary Hudson (26/04/1878-19/05/1973) was in her late forties when she became one of the founding members of the campaign to save Selsdon Wood. She was highly educated and independently wealthy. Her family (three of whom are still recognised online as brilliant minds) came to Birdhurst Road, South Croydon c.1911. As a young woman she studied at Newnham College Cambridge. Winifred's younger sister, Edith Linsley Hudson, studied at Royal Holloway College at that time. Both of these Colleges were the first few places in the UK that women could/were allowed to study at a high academic level though it should be noted they were not allowed to get a formal degree title. At Cambridge whilst only the men were ranked in the Maths Tripos Examination women who took the examination were made aware of their place by being told they were placed between the n^{th} and $(n+1)^{st}$ man or equal to the nth man. In the 1900 exam Winifred was bracketed with the '8th Wrangler' meaning that she had come 8th equal among the First-Class students. (https://mathshistory.st-andrews.ac.uk/Biographies/ Hudson/)

Winifred's sister shares her name with an Edith Hudson, Scottish Suffragette and former nurse who in 1912 was held in Holloway prison and subjected to inhumane treatment including force feeding and close surveillance. I can find no evidence online that Winifred or her sisters were involved in 'the cause' for equality however given that Millicent Fawcett, (president of the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies) was one of the founders of Newnham College and there was a strong connection between Holloway College and the Women's suffrage movement it is likely they were sympathetic.

Her older brother was Ronald William Henry Turnbull Hudson (16/07/1876 – 20/09/1904) considered in his day to be the most gifted geometer (mathematics) in all of Cambridge (see Wikipedia). He died in a mountaineering accident at the age of 28, but his posthumously published book 'Kummer's Quartic Surface' allows access to his work. His obituary in the 'Mathematical Gazette' at the time stated *"The heartfelt sympathy of his large circle of friends goes out to the sorrowing family, to his father, aunt and sisters, who have followed along the same path of knowledge as their brother with no less determination and success".*

Her father was Mr William Henry Hoar Hudson a Lecturer in Mathematics at St John's College, Cambridge and later a Professor of Mathematics at both King's College, London and Queen's College, London. He was also

an Editor of the St John's College periodical magazine 'The Eagle'. Whilst unusual for the era, it was not so unexpected that William allowed his daughters the chance to study as his wife, Mary Watson Turnbull had also studied maths at Cambridge. Sadly, she died in 1882 a few months after the birth of their youngest child and his sister helped bring up the children. He died on 21/09/1915. (He shares his name with another famous person so should not be confused with WH Hudson, Naturalist and supporter of the RSPB.)



Her younger sister Hilda Phoebe Hudson (11/06/1881 – 26/11/1965) was likewise a gifted mathematician, also educated at Newnham College, Cambridge, 1900 – 1903. She sat the Maths Tripos and went one place better than Winifred coming 7th equal among the First-Class students but, as was still the custom, her achievement was still not officially classed. She then worked as a Lecturer and Research Fellow. She published vitally important work with Nobel Prize winner

Ronald Ross on epidemiology and the measurement of infectious disease spread (1916-1917). She joined an Air Ministry subdivision undertaking aeronautical engineering research in 1917, where she did pioneering work on the application of mathematical modelling to aircraft design thereby being instrumental in the success of World War 1 aircraft. She was ultimately awarded an OBE in 1919 and is heralded as a leading light in the mathematical field despite the barriers placed in the way of women at the time. A Good Time for Gardening – July and August

You may be thinking that the heat of the July and August weather will give opportunity for a few weeks away from the incessant 'calling' of the garden. Unfortunately, that isn't the case! Hopefully it will be warm, summer weather, so ponds and bird baths will need topping up regularly and fruit and vegetable plants will need watering. Weeds will be trying to compete with your crops for nutrients and water, so keep on top of these.



- Water evergreen shrubs like camellias and rhododendrons thoroughly this month to make sure that next years buds develop well.
- Keep patio container plants well-watered and feed with a liquid fertiliser every fortnight.
- Stake tall or top-heavy dahlias and lilies to prevent wind and rain damage. Dead-head lilies for a better flower display next year.
- Dead-head annual bedding plants and perennials to encourage them to flower into the autumn and stop them self-seeding.
- Trim any lavender plants after they>ve finished flowering to keep them compact.
- The vegetable garden comes into its own in August, with plenty of delicious home grown produce to harvest.
- Water sweetcorn plants regularly and feed with tomato food to get the best cobs. Sweetcorn is ready to harvest when you can pop a corn with your thumbnail and the juices are milky.
- Apply a high-potash fertiliser such as tomato food once fruits start to form on peppers, cucumber and aubergine plants.
- Continue to feed tomato plants with tomato food and remove lower leaves to help with air circulation and prevent disease. Pinch out the

top of tomato plants to concentrate the growth into the fruit that has already formed. Aim to leave 5 or 6 trusses of fruit per plant.

- Pinch out the tips of your runner bean plants once they reach the top of their support. This encourages side-shooting and more beans at a manageable height for picking.
- Harvest French and runner beans little and often to prevent them from setting seed. Pick runner beans regularly to prevent them becoming stringy and to make room for developing pods. Leaving mature pods to set seed can prevent further flowers developing and reduce your crop.
- Keep harvesting courgettes before they become too big!
- Take cuttings of herbs such as rosemary, sage or mint now to bulk up supplies. Put cuttings in moist, well-drained potting compost (one part grit to one part compost) and place in a cold frame. Established clumps of chives can be divided now.

If it's been hot recently, your lawn may be looking a bit sad. Don't worry about this. The Autumn rains will soon make it green again.

Don't feed your lawn with a high-nitrogen fertiliser now as this will encourage lots of lush new growth which is easily damaged by autumn weather.

Lawn growth slows down in late summer so raise the cutting height of your lawn mower to help the grass cope.

If you're planning on laying a new lawn this autumn, prepare the area now to give it time to settle.



Recut any lawn edges. Install lawn edging to make future maintenance easier.

If your lawn is infested by ants, brush out the nests on a dry day. Always brush them away before mowing.

Our adjacent premises is the now derelict building which once was home to Baileys (Selsdon) Garage and more. The postal address of this building is currently 230 Addington Road. What happened to No 228? The Garage, although not a shop in the strictest sense definitely sold products and its history is so generous that I will leave this kingpin of the Selsdon scene for a further, separate, article.



Moving down the road we come to the site of 232 – 236 Addington Road where we currently find Aldi. We are now on the footprint of the former Selsdon Park Farm which we discovered on the Ordnance Survey maps last month. The Aldi building was constructed around 1965, as we can see from a photo of the Good Neighbour, then Stag pub, which stood on the site of the current Aldi carpark.



Photo of The Good Neighbour attributed to 1965 The Good Neighbour, built in 1956, became The Stag in 1983.

The Aldi site was purpose built as a single retail unit at ground floor with open plan office accommodation (Faversham House) on two floors over. The Aldi site has been a supermarket under many guises. The store was originally a David Greig's supermarket. The family business which dated back to 1870 had over 200 stores in the south east by the late 60s. Unfortunately, the death of several family members and resulting inheritance tax imposition forced a sale of the family business to Fitch Lovell and Greig's was rebranded as Keymarket in 1972. In 1988 it became Gateway and then in 1990 it was rebranded as Somerfield. Faversham House above Aldi, Number 232a, was, in 2014, converted into residential accommodation, and now provides some 17 flats with parking on the flat roof above the store.

No 238 was originally, back in 1931, trading as Kings. It may have unofficially opened as early as 1927 to cater for the influx of householders flocking to the clean air of Selsdon Garden Village / Croham Heights. Kings was described by a Selsdon Resident, then a little lad, thus: "A narrow forecourt led you from the pavement towards the dingy green painted shop front. The door opened with a loud clang as the sprung bell alerted the Kings somewhere in the nether regions of the shop. It was mysterious and gloomy and smelt of paraffin, tar, old tobacco and pine from stacks of firewood by the wall. Dimly you saw packs of Woodbines, and Craven A cigarettes. You pointed to the nearest box of sweets, parted with your halfpennies and fled to the comparative safety of Addington Road." It appears to have been very much 'a local shop for local people....' The shop remained a general store until around 1970 and was latterly open seven days a week. Perhaps shopping in Selsdon has not changed very much in 50 years??

Here one of our readers warns about planned changes to the ULEZ zone.

Dear Editor

Talking to my neighbours and friends in other parts of London, it seems that many have not heard about the Mayor of London's proposal to extend the ULEZ zones to all London Boroughs. I therefore would like to draw people's attention to the fact that on 29th August 2023, if you do not have a car that is ULEZ compliant you will have to pay £12.50 per day to take it off your drive, drive around Selsdon or park outside your property. Generally speaking, the ULEZ affects pre-Euro 6 diesel cars – those built before around 2016 – and pre-Euro 4 petrol cars - roughly built prior to 2006. You can use the TFL checker tool to determine your vehicle's emission standard status and find out more specific details on how you may be affected.

Nature Notes from Ted Forsyth - Aberrations

Male Blackbirds usually have completely black plumage in which the colour is produced by the chemical melanin. Occasional individuals are seen with one or more white feathers which seem to be related to a diet which has too much artificial food (as supplied by humans). Even less frequently it is possible for the bird's plumage to be completely white when there is no melanin present. In this condition the bird is said to be of leucistic form (which simply means pale).

In Selsdon Woods, and in several other Croydon parks and woods, we have a few Grey Squirrels which are completely white. If the eyes are red, they are true albinos, otherwise the correct description is leucistic. White forms of Badger, Fox, and Roe or Fallow Deer can occur. Seasonal changes to a white version in winter is a different phenomenon and can be seen in Mountain Hares, Ptarmigan, Stoats and Weasels, which will return to the appropriate colouring in summer.

Melanin comes in different forms so it is not always associated with the presence of black colouration. In fact, the bright yellow of young chicks is caused by one form of melanin, and the reddish brown on many feathers is caused by a third kind.

With an excess of the black melanin an animal can appear completely black. One example occurs in the leopard with the all black version known as a black panther. While from a distance it appears a uniform black, closer examination in good light conditions will still show the underlying leopard spots.

The animals mentioned above as sometimes occurring as leucistic forms can also appear in melanistic guise.

Erythrism is a colour variant in which reddish colouration is emphasised, perhaps most commonly in mammals and birds whose normal colouration involves shades of brown.

Xanthochroism is a much less common aberration which involves an unusual occurrence of yellow – think of the wild Budgerigar in Australia in which the bird is usually green but with an occasional individual being completely yellow. Some colours are related to diet. An obvious example is the Flamingo – in the wild it exhibits brilliant scarlet in part of its plumage and in captivity it has to be fed an appropriate diet if it is not to lose its bright colours. As butterflies can be seen in numbers ranging from a few hundred to several tens of thousands it is not surprising that aberrations occur sufficiently frequently so that some are given names. The Clouded Yellow butterfly is normally a vivid yellow colour but the helice variant loses a lot of this colour and in an extreme case it looks more like a white butterfly. In blue butterflies the male is normally some shade of blue but the female is brown. In some aberrations the female can appear in the colouration of a male. The large orangey-brown Silver Washed Fritillary has a valezina variant with very black markings and little colour.



Gynandromorph Red Cardinal

An extreme aberration, which does not appear in mammals but can show up in insects, beetles and even birds, is gynandromorphism in which the complete left half of the body is one sex and the right half is the opposite sex. When the two sexes look very similar, for

example Silver Washed Fritillaries, the result is not too obvious but when there are differences, as with the blue butterflies.

Will My Gas Boiler Be Banned?

Most UK homes still use gas boilers to generate warmth. But, given around 30% of UK carbon emissions are created by heating buildings, is there a greener, cheaper, more efficient, and environmentally friendly way for us to stay warm through the winter?



On a cold rainy day in the middle of December, returning to a warm home or enjoying a hot shower is something many of us take for granted - but could it soon be under threat? In as much as 80% of UK Homes, this warmth is thanks to gas boilers. The challenge is that heating systems are responsible for as much as 30% of UK carbon emissions and, the most likely alternatives are

currently either very expensive or, in many cases not practical. So, with a national target of reaching net-zero by 2050, we need to find a better, greener approach.

So how can we reduce the emissions from heating our homes while keeping the future options both practical and affordable?

Making our homes more efficient

Making our homes more efficient has two main steps, choosing the energy source we are going to use and making sure we get as much out of the energy source as we possibly can. The answer to the first will be a mix of Hydrogen boilers and heat pumps, both are great and have their distinctive selling points. Heat pumps are great for new builds and homes with a bit more space while Hydrogen boilers will be by far the least disruptive to our current system and should allow many flats in large town centres to keep 'traditional' combi boilers.

The bigger problem is that the UK housing stock is so diverse it's impossible to have one strategy which will suit us all. New builds are built practically airtight and let very little heat out and in while, older style properties will be the exact opposite and often have very little insulation if any at all, and the buildings are peppered with tiny cracks and holes known as adventitious ventilation which loses around 7kWh of heat an hour.

Ban on gas boilers in new builds from 2025

As we can see, designing new homes with efficiency in mind is a lot easier than retrofitting a hundred years later. Because of this the Government has banned new builds from utilising natural gas from 2023 and at the time of writing the CBI have advised that if the UK is to meet its target of net zero emissions by 2050 then no boilers burning any fossil gas should be installed in UK homes by 2035 - that's a big statement! New builds seem to have leaned towards heat pumps and district heating using heat interface units to give individual flats greater control over their own usage.

Older homes – more of a challenge

There are roughly 27.5 million homes in Britain where things get more complicated. Retrofitting greener heating can be expensive and impractical, The Committee on Climate Change has calculated that it would cost an average of £26,000 to convert each UK home to a lowcarbon heating system and that's before you consider the lack of space in many of the converted, older properties or their abysmal levels of insulation and their tendency to hold heat like a sieve holds water.

Heating by hydrogen

Hydrogen is believed by many experts to be the best retrofit option which causes the least disruption to the current way we heat our homes and allows consumers to keep the familiarity of a gas boiler and controls. When Hydrogen is burnt it only produces water, with no carbon dioxide and gas boilers will only need minor changes to run on Hydrogen, you can also mix natural gas and hydrogen together, rather than having to make a full switch.

The Verdict

While the traditional gas boiler will certainly have a role to play for some time yet, its days as top dog in the heating industry are undoubtedly numbered.

Unfortunately, when it comes to its successor there is no 'one size fits all answer. It will take a mix of Heat Pumps, Hydrogen, and better built / better-insulated housing.

Cross-party collaboration will be needed to give industry clear guidance so installers and companies can invest in training and upskilling and all of us will need to do our part to affect small changes in our day-to-day lives.

What can you do now?

Even if you can't immediately swap to a 'green' fuel there are lots of small things you can do every day to be more efficient and reduce your Carbon footprint. These include relatively cheap fixes like low energy lightbulbs, dual flush toilets, and using carpets or rugs over wooden floors. We can insulate our homes and fit double or triple glazed windows, we can make sure we turn off electrical appliances like TVs or Computers and take the plug out of the wall, we can fix the dripping tap and walk instead of drive. All these relatively small and easy things can add up and help reduce tons of emissions over time.
