SRA NEWS 'n' VIEWS

A mixed bag - Selsdon Community Picnic/FSW Open Day, Christmas lights, NHR and Local Green Spaces

I have been asked by Tricia Underwood, the Chairman of the Rotary Club of Sanderstead & Selsdon, which serves South Croydon, to introduce the club to the Selsdon residents. She tells me that they facilitate the travels of Father Christmas around the houses so the children can catch a glimpse of him and hear some seasonal songs in advance of his busy delivery night. The club's other work is perhaps less visible and, possibly, even unknown to the wider community: they liaise with the Selsdon Centre and Contact to learn of those who need some assistance and companionship. They arrange days out for seniors and other local people in need, provide Christmas hampers and have paid for the Selsdon Centre's TV licence from their funds. They are currently negotiating with Sainsbury's and Waitrose to fit a defibrillator on their external walls for emergency use by the general public.

They are now joining with the SRA to help with our two main annual events – the Community Picnic and Fun afternoon (Sunday 8th September 12 - 4pm) and the Christmas Lights switch-on (Friday 22nd November at 5pm).

The Rotarians will be taking over from me the issuing of the sacks, 'eggs and spoons', holding the start and finish tapes for the races and perhaps also providing some other fun things to do alongside the other games organised by the Scouts at the Fun event. This year it is being combined with the Annual FSW Open Day, which will be keeping me busy then so I am particularly grateful for the new source of help. The FSW part of the dual event will have the usual mix of stalls of interest, crafts and bargains plus woodland themed activities, a storytime for children and a guided walk suitable for all ages. It is hoped there will be a dog show this year too but details of this (and times of the walk and storytime etc) are not currently available, so please look out nearer the time for posters on our notice boards as there will not be another Gazette before the event.

We would love to see many more the Selsdon residents (and others from elsewhere too!) attend to prove we do still have a community spirit here.

Referring back to the theme of community in Selsdon, some Selsdon residents were able to revive this in late May when a group of eight ladies met together for a 'catch-up' about 35 years after the last meeting of the local National Housewives' Register group. Yes, we didn't mind being called 'housewives' then - but had formed the group to talk about things other than children and domestic problems! We remembered one meeting was held in 1984 and discussed how near to the novel we had come. It seemed to us at our recent meeting that the social, technical and economic changes in our lives since the inception of NHR were still quite mind-boggling. We would all love to make contact with anyone who was part of the group but who missed this first reunion. Perhaps you have some old photos you could scan and send via the email too? I don't think we are planning to do anything on a regular basis as we all still seem to have various family responsibilities plus all the other interests we have cultivated over the years. Nevertheless, we would like to hear news from everyone and perhaps meet once in a while.

Finally, just to let you know that the SRA has responded to a request from the Council's Spatial Planning team which is now reviewing the local open space aspect of the Croydon Plan. The team has launched a public consultation asking residents and local organisations to provide more evidence to identify any local green space that is felt to be of value to their community (whether as a breathing space, a recreational place or just somewhere green between the houses) and to make a plea for their designation as a

Local Green Space in the Plan so they can be retained as they are now and not developed.

The Council's criteria for a green space gaining Local Green Space designation in the Croydon Plan are that it is reasonably close to the community that uses it, that it is demonstrably special to the local community and that it perhaps holds a particular significance, for example because of its beauty, historic significance, recreational value (including as a playing field), tranquillity or richness of its wildlife and that it is local in character and is not an extensive tract of land.

I am sure we can all think of somewhere like that around here e.g. Foxearth Spinney, Ashen Grove, Hawthorn Crescent and Abbey Road grass areas etc. The deadline for this information to be received by the Council is 15th July so, if you do get this Gazette in time and haven't yet submitted any comments via https://getinvolved.croydon.gov.uk/kms/dmart.aspx?strTab=ConsultationTimeline&PageType=item&filter_SurveyId=571 then I urge you to do so immediately as every response is valuable!

COUNCILLORS' NOTES

SELSDON'S GREEN SPACES UNDER THREAT

Croydon Council is proposing to build on green space in Selsdon. They will be transferring a number of sites to the Council's whollyowned subsidiary company Brick By Brick. The plans were approved by the Labour Council on 10th June and they include building the following number of houses/flats on these sites: Freelands Avenue green space – 10 units
Corner of Shepherd's Way green space – 7 units
Farnborough Avenue green space – 15 units
Tedder Road garages – 4 units
Heather Way Garages/Car Park – 4 units
Foxearth Road green space - 18 units
Croham Valley Road (adj no.124) - 7 units
Hawthorn Crescent – 7 units

It is recognised that Croydon needs more homes however building on the precious green space on Monks Hill and Selsdon is not appropriate. Especially when they are not building on derelict sites around the borough like Edgecoombe on Monks Hill.

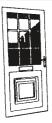

LOCAL PLAN REVIEW - PROTECTING PARKS


It is ironic that at the same time as proposing to build houses on green spaces as outlined above, Croydon is also undertaking a <u>Partial Review</u> of the Croydon Local Plan. This is the framework used when decisions are made by Croydon Council about planning applications.

Local Green Space designation is an extra layer of protection against development for parks and green spaces.

For an area to be identified as a Local Green Space, it has to meet the following criteria from the National Planning Policy Framework:

- it's reasonably close to the community it services;
- demonstrably special to a local community and holds a particular significance, for example because of its beauty, historic significance, recreational value (including as a playing field), tranquillity or richness of its wildlife; and
- local in character and is not an extensive tract of land.

In 2016, as part of the preparation of the Local Plan, the Council tried to gain this extra layer of protection for all of Croydon's parks and green spaces that met the criteria. All were put forward, however, none of them were granted the Local Green Space designation as the Planning Inspector felt there was not enough local evidence to prove how these spaces were special/important to local communities, or that they hold any particular local significance.



You can get involved by completing the survey 'Local Plan Partial Review - Call for Evidence on Local Green Spaces' in the 'Get Involved' section of the Council's website. Select one of the green spaces and tell the Council how you use it and why it is important to you. The Council has highlighted three spaces in Selsdon as shown on the map with the asterisks.

You can also suggest new areas that you think should have this protection.

We will work with residents associations to try and get this added protection for our green spaces.

The closing date for providing this information is 22 July 2019.

THE REOPENING OF THE FAIRFIELD HALLS

September 16th 2019 will mark the end of what has seemingly been a very long journey for the Fairfield Halls. The venue will re-open following extensive refurbishment and will offer up South London's largest arts centre to the borough of Croydon and beyond.

Sympathetically refurbished to its original 1962 splendour, the venue will offer the perfect cultural experience from 10am until midnight daily. The community will be welcomed in to an open and bright new space, The Arnhem Foyer. A full program of free events are planned for the foyer; a series of lunchtime concerts, "audience with..." interviews (Ian Dale of LBC interviews Janet Street Porter, John Snow and Jenni Murray in the first season), community choir, children's music and movement classes, children's band concerts and professional exhibitions (Windrush by Jim Grover Sept-Jan). Where there used to be offices overlooking the foyer there are now the original mezzanines. These mezzanines have been named after the old Davis and Empire theatres and offer a real vantage point. The Sun Lounge sees the original chandeliers replicated and rehung. With a two story drop they add a sense of style to what is now a fully fitted bar and lounge area with seating for over 100.

Across the venue there is a collection of pianos from Sevenoaks Hurstwood Farm, Phoenix Pianos. These fine instruments will have pride of place in the foyer, the new Fairfield Lounge (a customer priority and member only space located on the fourth floor where you can enjoy a private bar, restroom, table service, complimentary

SELSDON AFTERNOON TOWNSWOMEN'S GUILD

I am starting this month's article with a short quotation from the Spring issue of 'Townswoman', the magazine of the Townswomen's Guilds, because it will remind you of who we are. "Townswomen's Guilds was born 90 years ago in 1929. Since then, we have been bringing fun and friendship to thousands, and speaking out on issues our members care about. Not part of TG? We'd love you to join us" and the Selsdon Afternoon Guild meets at St John's Church Hall on the third Friday of the month at 1.30pm.

Our speaker in April was Angela Young, who gave us an excellent and very moving talk on 'The Able Seaman and Titanic'. The title should perhaps also have included the Aristocrat, as Angela's great grandmother, the Countess of Rothes, known as Noel, was also on board the fated ship, and the two of them met to become lifelong friends. The Titanic was described as 'unsinkable', so when it hit an iceberg in April 1912 there was no panic. But it took some time for the captain to sense the damage and put out an alarm and then it was realised there were only 16 lifeboats. Able Seaman Thomas Jones was responsible for number 8 lifeboat in which Noel found herself and he realised that she knew something about boats and put her at the tiller. He concentrated on rowing away from the liner in case of a suction wave, but it was nearly 8 hours before they realised there was another boat near them. The Carpathia had received their message just 4 minutes before the Marconi room was closed for the night, but the full horror of this terrible accident will probably never be known as many survivors could not speak about it.

Our May speaker could not have been more different, as he was accompanied by a beautiful golden Labrador called Star. His name was Paul Harmon and he was representing 'Guide Dogs for the Blind'. He had lost his sight very suddenly 20 years ago and had existed for 10 years trying to cope with a white stick when a friend suggested getting a guide dog. His first dog was called Spencer, but unfortunately he had to be retired for health reasons and he had had Star for only 16 weeks - but the bond between them was already strong. Suitable dogs go first to 'puppy walkers' who begin their initial training and keep them until they are 13 months old. Then they go for advanced training, which is hard work, when they learn to wear a harness and obey specific commands. Paul feels immensely privileged to have Star and said "One must trust the dog, for he or she is the brains!' Guide Dogs for the Blind was started in 1931 and has no Government finding, relying entirely on charity donations.

By the time you read this we shall have had our June meeting, which was a party to celebrate 90 years of Townswomen's Guilds so I shall write more about this in my next article in October.

QUEENHILL ROAD, THEN AND NOW

The houses in Queenhill Road were built by Messrs Costains in the late 20's and the area was marketed as 'Croham Heights'. The air at our rarified altitude was said to be better for one's health than the pollution of London. This photo would have been taken from the junction of Queenhill and Littleheath Roads, looking south. In the middle distance can be seen the junction with Rylandes Road and then Farley Road. In the far distance is, I think, Mountwood with Sanderstead Plantation behind. Note the timber fences on the left hand side and the low brick walls with concrete posts and chains to the right. The houses were left with plain render or pebble dashing to the bays and upper storey. No bright paintwork other than the white window frames. Incidentally the roof tiles were French.

SELSDON SCHOOL DAYS 1944 TO 1951 – THE THREE RS

In earlier chapters of my memories, I have already written about my very first year at Selsdon School in 1944, and lessons in the air raid shelters whilst flying bombs flew over, or on occasions fell, on Selsdon. Also my second year, playing truant and being punished by Miss Smith in what must have been Class E. So I will continue, starting with Miss Smith who left an indelible mark on my first days at school.

Bear in mind that I am going back some 70 years, so some memories are now a bit dim and I might have got some of the teachers' rolls mixed up.

Like all schools, the day started with the Register. Next we filed out for Assembly in the school hall which doubled as the school gym. This hall was also where we had our inspections by the visiting school nurse, to check the health and nutrition of us children. Could we balance on a beam; did we have nits in our hair; were we being properly fed and cared for by our parents; did we show any indication of T.B. And worst of all, did we need a visit to the school dentist!

The morning assembly was led from the school stage by, was it Nutty Almond the Head Mistress, or perhaps the Deputy Head, either Miss Mead or Mrs Beach?

I obviously didn't pay much attention at school because the only teachers that I have clear memories of, other that Miss Smith, were Mrs Beach (Class B) and Miss Chubb (Class C) because they shared a house in Old Farleigh Rd and I often saw them walking home from school. The only other teacher was Mr Russell who joined Selsdon School much later, when I got to Class A, for which he became the class teacher.

But where was I? Ah, yes! The Assembly.

It started with us all saying the Lord's Prayer, and ended with us all

singing a hymn, accompanied by one of the teachers playing the piano. The most oft sung hymn was "Onward Christian Soldiers", very appropriate as we were then still at war. However, now 70 years later in these multi-cultural times, it would probably result in the Head Teacher being arrested and charged with a hate crime!

Religious knowledge was an important part of our education in those times. And this was the first lesson when we went back into class. Each school day we were read a story, or part of a story from the Old Testament. I can clearly remember Miss Smith reading to us in my second year. In later years, as we learned to read, we children would practise by taking turns to read out loud, short sections of that day's story. This was not easy, because the version of the Bible then in common use was written in formal church language. For example: Thou shalt not kill; For thine is the kingdom; I say unto thee, etc. There were other bits, which we, in our young innocence, did not comprehend – Thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's wife. And, Thou shalt not commit adultery. Nowadays the children see it every week on East Enders! Times have changed.

However I found the stories of the Old Testament; such as David and Goliath; the Pharaohs, the 7 year famines and plagues of locusts; the flight from Egypt and the opening of the waters of the Red Sea and much more, to be fascinating stories. So much so, that in my adulthood I went to the library to read again this history from ancient times. However it is now written in modern English and no longer had its previous authority and authenticity. So it soon went back to the library virtually unread.

It was probably in Miss Smith's class that we progressed from writing with a pencil to writing with a scratchy pen. Our desks had inkwells and we had blotting paper to soak up the copious ink blobs as we tried to master this new writing tool. Hence my reference above to Miss Smith having left an indelible mark on my first days at school!

Do you remember trying to write with the cheap and nasty, standard school pen? The nib would tear into the paper of the exercise book,

or bend because we were applying too much pressure. No wonder Mr Biró invented the ballpoint pen!

So that is the first 2 Rs, Reading and Riting, which only leaves Rithmetic, a subject at which we were far superior to the children of today. The reason for this is that today everything is "decimalised," multiples of 10. So 100 pence to a £1, and 1000 grams to a Kilo, etc.



We had to learn and contend with 12d = 1 shilling, and 8 half-crowns = £1, or was it 240d = £1? No of course, it was 2 ten bob notes!



A ten bob note = 120d or today = 50p

Then there was 16 oz = 1lb and 112 lbs = 1cwt, and if that was not enough, 12 inches = 1 foot and 36ins = 1yd and 1,760yds to a mile. And that is but a fraction of the numerical quirks of the Imperial system. No wonder we were little Einsteins by the time we sat the 11+.

All this schooling was preparing us to take the scholarship exam, the 11+, in our last year of primary education. It was our gateway to a grammar school. I failed and as a result my Mum and I were called up to see Mrs Almond the Head Mistress. She advised us that the reason I had not passed was because I had flunked the intelligence test paper. No I wasn't stupid, it was because we had no training for it at school, it not being part of the curriculum. Mrs Almond recommended that we get copies of past test papers (which could be purchased) so that I could familiarise myself with the types of questions, and practise them, which I did.

This was my last year in Primary and I then moved onto Selsdon Secondary, and a year later re-sat the scholarship, and now, having mastered the type of questions posed in the Intelligence Tests, this time passed the scholarship. So thus ended my years at Selsdon School, and in 1951, the year of the Festival of Britain, I started the next chapter of my life!

D-DAY SNAPSHOTS - 6TH JUNE 1945

A decade or so ago, the then editor of this Gazette kindly gave space for some personal recollections on Selsdon in wartime. The recent 75th anniversary of D-Day again triggered some strong memories of that time.

For those of us who have the privilege to still be alive, the recall of some of those events remain vivid and indelible. I welcome the opportunity to share some of these with you.

D-DAY SNAPSHOTS - PART ONE

The morning of Tuesday, 6th June was dull and overcast. The previous day had been stormy. In Selsdon, normal business was the order of the day. After nearly five years of war, survival was the key aim. After the trauma of Dunkirk, the fall of France, the Battle of Britain and the Blitz, as well as the capitulation of Singapore, prospects were now brighter. The Yanks were alongside, Rommel's troops had been beaten in North Africa and the Russians were making progress in the East. Italy, however, was proving to be a tough nut to crack.

Following eight months of nightly air raids from September 1940 until May 1941, we lived underground. These raids suddenly stopped on the 10th May, inexplicably. The reason became clear some weeks later when Hitler invaded Russia.

In Selsdon, community life was strong and resilient. Every vacant piece of ground was cultivated to grow fruit and vegetables. Chickens were kept in back gardens and local smallholdings thrived. I cannot recall ever feeling hungry during that time. "Grow Your Own" was the key philosophy.

A friend, Peter Stilwell, lived with his widowed mother in Sundale Avenue, directly opposite Benhurst Gardens. Peter would have been a dead ringer for Harry Potter today, with his metal-rimmed glasses and studious demeanour. His hobby was experimenting with chemicals in his bedroom. Muffled explosions would be heard coming from his room at times and he would appear with a soot-blackened face.

With an unexpected suddenness, a very heavy air raid occurred on the 10th May, three years after the last. We retreated into our very damp garden shelter. Bombs rained down. Over the years, we had developed a way of calculating how far away the bombs were by counting the gap between the whistle stopping and the explosions heard. By 4.00 a.m. the all-clear had sounded and I ventured out. Dawn was just breaking. Calculation suggested that the bombs

had fallen about 2/5ths of a mile away. My heart sank when I found Peter's house and the one adjoining as a tangled heap of wreckage. An air raid warden stood on guard. He was saddened to report that two people had been killed whilst taking refuge in their Anderson shelter.

Then, in the dull morning twilight, I was astonished to see Peter, slouching with hands in pockets. "I knew I should have given up those experiments!" he said. Sadly, we later found that the elderly couple next door, name of Sarson, had perished. They were a highly regarded couple and regular worshippers at St. John's Church.

My sister, Elsie, had been bombed out of her house in New Cross and she, with her family, were now living at the top of Kingsway Avenue. With her two young children, she had taken refuge in an indoor Morrison shelter. The explosions had brought down a pile of soot which had smothered them all. Outside, a large bomb splinter had ripped a huge chunk out of the window-sill to their garage.

This tragic and totally unexpected air-raid had shaken us all.

In common with many of my schoolfriends, I had taken up employment in central London as Croydon was not the commercial centre it is today. My office was in the unimpressive boulevard of Kingsway, just up from Aldwych.

At that time, Central London purveyed a somewhat smoky and sooty grandeur. Not only had the stonework not been cleaned for many a year but the relentless fire-bombing and many smogs had taken their toll. The one exception was the newly opened Waterloo Bridge of which the Portland Stone facade was still pristine. Lunchtime explorations of London took place with a friend. Climbing the 200 or so steps to St. Paul's Stone Gallery, we were amazed by the surrounding scores of acres of devastation which revealed hidden basements that had not seen the light of day for centuries. In high summer, the whole area was carpeted with flowering plants

and shrubs which had sprouted from seeds that had lain dormant for centuries. St. Paul's stood proudly amid this devastation, apparently unscathed. There was further devastation around Holborn Circus but the well-loved department store of Gamages appeared unharmed. Other areas, such as the Inns of Courts, Lincolns Inn, appeared untouched.

Spot checks revealed that about one person in three was in a uniform. This increased to two out of three near Piccadilly Circus. These were mainly Americans who were attracted by the Stage Door Canteen. The Yanks' high quality uniforms led to some resentment from the Brits! Road transport was good and London buses excellent (there were few cars on the road!). The Underground and Tube were extremely good though the main train services were crowded.

That morning of the 6th the radio played quietly in the office which served as a bedroom for those staff on fire-watch. At 9.30a.m. the news spread that General Eisenhower was speaking, announcing the landings in Normandy. This came not as a complete surprise. Many of the women in the office had menfolk in the front-line armed services. News from them had been sparse in recent weeks. Some letters had been intercepted by the censor and blue pencil marks were apparent. Two months earlier, whilst cycling the Kentish Weald, I had come across a convoy of some two miles in length of Sherman tanks parked up between Limpsfield and Crockham Hill and manned by Americans.

By the evening of that June day, we knew that a foothold had been achieved in Normandy although details were short. At least we could relax awhile, knowing that Hitler would be too distracted to bother us with more air raids

We could not have been more wrong.

My sister-in-law had been short listed for a writing prize. Although we had seen her on TV at times she had never done something as amazing as this before. We were so excited for her. The day couldn't get any better than that, surely? Oh, but when things go well it can all come at once in a lovely way too. Just the reverse of bad times when the news goes from bad to worse.

My cousin's wife's a keen ancestor tracer and she had not only discovered a family tree which entwines with ours, but the woman whom I had never heard of was the person who had got in touch to tell us all about herself and her father and grandfather.

Our grandfathers had fallen out and had ceased speaking, but I had known they made up before my grandfather died and was one of the party who went to get the two elderly gents together. The others had been unaware until my cousin's wife remembered

something I had said and took her researching from there - and found the missing relatives! More importantly the woman was delighted to find she had hidden relatives and had written an e-mail telling us all about herself and saying she hoped perhaps we may meet.

Turns out we have a lot of traits and skills in common. At a time when the relatives are beginning to thin in number it is a blessing to find a welter of new ones.

If anyone reading this is considering doing some ancestor tracing of their own, you too may find a long lost relative or two. Well worth doing if you feel lonely, or just want an interesting job when sitting down.

NATURE NOTES GILBERT WHITE

Citizen science engages thousands of amateur naturalists in collecting data which will later be analysed by professionals. For example, the British trust for Ornithology organises breeding bird surveys (and others) while Butterfly Conservation concentrates on distribution and numbers of butterfly species. There are also less formal arrangements such as the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch and the Butterfly Conservation count of butterflies in gardens.

Gilbert White was a clergyman living throughout the eighteenth century in Selborne (Hampshire) and while walking or riding in the area he made valuable observations of wildlife – he was probably one of the first amateur naturalists. His observations and speculations were recorded in a series of letters to Thomas Pennant, author of the publication British Zoology, and later to the Honourable Daines Barrington, a barrister and FRS. The letters were eventually collected in the book A Natural History of Selborne

White identified and described the harvest mouse and its nest. He also identified the noctule bat. He first separated the three Phylloscopus species of bird – chiffchaff, willow warbler and wood warbler – by initially recognising that they had different songs - then by following the current tradition of shooting specimens which he then carefully described. He also shot and ate a ring ouzel.

Stone curlews and corncrakes were familiar birds but he does not mention the common curlew. Red-backed shrikes (butcher birds) and wrynecks were local breeding birds and great grey shrike was a winter visitor. Large numbers of ring ouzels were seen in autumn and again in spring but he was unsure whether they originated in the north of the country or came from the continent.

He was aware of migration – he had a brother living in Spain who saw many birds migrating to and from Africa over the Straits of Gibraltar – but many times in his letters he insists that

some swallows remain over winter in a torpid state in caves and crevices, and this at a time when the general belief was that birds that disappeared in the autumn hibernated at the bottom of ponds! In support of migration, he knew that many small birds frequently landed on ships at sea during autumn and spring periods.

Despite being an acute observer, relying on his own observations rather than hearsay, he could make mistakes. He confused a wintering grey wagtail with the yellow wagtail which does not remain in this country over winter. He was familiar with the mustelids – otter, stoat and weasel but thought there was one smaller than the weasel – it is in fact the female which is smaller than the male. He thought he had found a new species of water vole but it was a brown rat, which swims readily. The common rat in his time was the black rat and the brown rat had only just appeared in this country.

Phenology plays a significant part in his observations – recording first and last dates of arrival and departure of various birds, dates of nesting, egg-laying and fledging.

As his correspondents were learned men his letters are interspersed with frequent quotations in Greek and Latin.

His technique of careful and repeated observation forms the basis of modern natural history surveys but we now have access to facilities such as binoculars, telescopes, cameras, recordings of bird song, devices which will record and identify bats, etc.

So what are you waiting for? Get out into natural surroundings, observe, and pass on your records!

Although having a full-time job, son Jitesh would be seen standing in for the early weekend shift. Daughter-in-law Helena would be beavering away in the shop more often than not.

Our thanks to them all and we wish them a long and contented, well-earned retirement (from shop duties anyway!). And a warm welcome to new owners, Mr. & Mrs. Shah.

Here is the best I can remember about living in Ingham Road, Selsdon. We moved there in 1943 from York Road and lived in the second house on the left at the top of the hill - it was called Hilltop and I think the number was 36.

We were a family of 6. Father was in charge of the Home Guard Headquarters in Selsdon Road near Baileys Garage. Our mother was an air-raid warden for Ingham Road. I have three sisters - Pat, Elizabeth and Elaine. Our surname was Gosling.

Our dining room was converted into a first aid centre - luckily this was never used. My sister Pat and I used to go round with a baby pram and knock on doors to collect papers and magazines for the war effort and take them to the library to be sorted.

We were evacuated to Pudsey with our mother and returned to Selsdon for VE day in 1945 and we moved from Ingham Road in 1946/7.



I was born in June 1940 at Purley hospital and lived at 37, Abbey Road, Selsdon until May 24th 1950 when my parents, along with my older sister Pauline, emigrated to Australia.
