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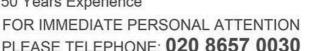

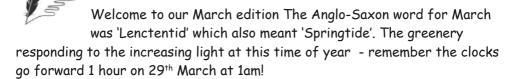

# **SRA NEWS 'n' VIEWS**

### <u>Planning</u>

Brick by Brick, the council-owned building firm, held another meeting for residents to comment on the plans to build 8 three bedroom terraced houses on the green space in front of Hawthorn Crescent. Plans have not been submitted but should be sometime in March. The SRA feel this is an unsuitable development on this site and will object to the plans based on the most recent drawings available to us. *Croydon have recently had their housing target reduced by the London Mayor so we feel the need to develop such small sites is now unnecessary.* Should you wish to look at the present proposed plans they are on the Brick by Brick website.

### Houses of Multiple Occupancy (HMO)

Private houses have previously needed no planning consent to change from a private dwelling to a HMO but now they will need planning approval from the council. This can only be good news for the borough.

### **Annual Subscription**

This is due in June and this year we will be printing details in the Gazette to enable you to set up a standing Order or pay online. # **COUNCILLORS' NOTES**

#### **SELSDON PEDESTRIAN CROSSING**

Many readers will use the pedestrian crossing at the junction of Old Farleigh Road/Farley Road/Addington Road/Selsdon Park Road. This is a busy junction with complex light sequencing for drivers and pedestrians. The roads are all very busy much of the time and quite a lot of traffic turns right from each of the roads - without the benefit of a filter light system to ensure that right turns can be undertaken safely.

A number of residents have had near misses when crossing the road from

After waiting for the green man to show which should have indicated that the road was safe to cross as far as the central refuge, vehicles turning right out of (northbound) Old Farleigh Road turn towards the pedestrians crossing the road.

Please be careful when crossing the road at this junction.

We have raised this issue with Transport for London (TFL) but so far there has been no commitment to change the junction. We will keep trying to find a way to make this area safer.

#### **HAWTHORN CRESCENT**

On 4th February Brick By Brick held a consultation event about their revised plans to build on the green space at Hawthorn Crescent. They have responded to some of the earlier comments and have:

- reduced the number of houses on the site from 9 to 8
- improved vehicle and pedestrian access
- increased planting

The scheme is slightly better than before but there is still fierce opposition from local residents because, however good the scheme, it still means the loss of a precious green space. The historic air raid shelter would also be lost.

We continue to work with residents to resist this development, but at the moment, it seems the Council and Brick By Brick are intent on going ahead.

#### SELSDON GARAGE SITE

The Selsdon Community Plan consultation is ongoing and we hope residents have taken the opportunity to give views on the future of Selsdon.

In the meantime, there has been some movement in relation to the Garage site next to Aldi. The owners of the site have asked to meet councillors to discuss a new planning application they are proposing for the site. The meeting is taking place on 28th February and we wait with interest to see what their proposals are.

#### **COUNCILLOR BUDGETS**

Each Councillor in Croydon has a 'Councillor Budget' of £8,000 each, to spend on projects that will benefit residents in their ward. This can include borough-wide initiatives, or very local projects. Here are details of some the projects the local Selsdon councillors have supported in the last year.

High street related projects include support for the *Selsdon Christmas Lights*, the *Selsdon Community Plan* initiative and the first ever *Selsdon Christmas Market*.

On the sporting front, we have help with funding for *Palace for Life Walking Football* at the Monks Hill Sports Centre and *Foundation 47* which runs basketball, fitness and mentoring sessions for young people on Monks Hill.

We have supported the *Friends of Littleheath Woods* with funding for pathways and tools to help the volunteers maintain the woods. Support has also been provided for the *Scouts mobile climbing wall* that goes to many events in the borough.

There are many other projects, but this should give an idea of how we support local events and community groups. If you know of any groups that would like support in the future please get in touch.

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### **SRA Annual report 2019**

#### What does The SRA Committee do?

They meet once a month as a Committee to discuss Selsdon issues and respond and take action where necessary. They also plan special events and community improvements. #### **SRA Activities in 2019**

Lampposts and railings on the High Street were enhanced by <u>floral baskets</u>. The contract cost to the SRA involves not only procurement and placement but also regular watering. Sadly due to the costs involved it may not be possible for future years.

A free 'bring your own' <u>Community picnic</u> was held in conjunction with the Selsdon Wood Open Day in September. The weather was glorious, we were entertained by Soul Symphony Choir, fun games and refreshments from the 2<sup>nd</sup> Selsdon & Addington Scouts and the Rotary. They were also craft and charity stalls to view.

The <u>decorative Poppies</u> returned to the High Street Lamp posts in November followed by the fantastic Christmas Light display.

The SRA organise and fundraise for the eye catching <u>Selsdon Christmas</u> <u>lights</u>. In 2019 this involved the extra cost of replacement wires and new lights which was paid for by the goodwill donations of residents, The

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Townswomen's Guild and some traders and this year as last by a large donation from the 2019 Councillors Community fund.

It was great to see so many people turn up for the <u>Community switch on night</u> (third Friday of November) with special thanks to the Greenvale Primary school choir, Rotary and all the volunteers (churches, schools and local groups) who helped with their time or with donations and of course to Father Christmas! We can no longer close the road but barriers and helpers were in place and the Police altered their shifts to be there for us.

This year Greenvale Primary school craft group helped the SRA by providing homemade <u>decorations for the Selsdon Triangle</u> to increase the festive cheer.

The SRA continues to pay for access to an online planning app designed to summarise the Council Planning site to aid our residents see for themselves in good time what relevant <u>local planning applications</u> have been made. Find the link from the 'About the SRA' page of our website or from <a href="http://www.localplanningapps.co.uk/croydon/sra/anupdate/planningtable.html">http://www.localplanningapps.co.uk/croydon/sra/anupdate/planningtable.html</a> keep checking this and if you can see a problem with an application make your suggestions/objections known in good time. Sensible changes to plans will save a lot of grief later!

Gazette printing costs are covered by the advertising with special thanks to our Advertising Manager Carlo Rappa. Some copies of The Selsdon Gazette were placed online <a href="https://www.selsdon-residents.co.uk">www.selsdon-residents.co.uk</a> during the year.

At the end of 2019 after two years in the post our Editor and web manager Heather Govier had to step down after health concerns. We will have a new Gazette Editor in control for 2020. We welcome your contributions of local stories or news. Paper copies of The Selsdon Gazette are available at Selsdon Library and an archive is also held by the Croydon Natural History and Scientific Society (to which the SRA pays an annual subscription) as well as The British Library. We hope to have a new Web manager or even a new <u>SRA web site</u> available in 2020 with new copies of the Gazette added each month.

#### **Accounts**

A full balance sheet for 2019 will be presented at the next AGM which will be held on 1st April 2020 at St John's Hall, Upper Selsdon road. The continuation of the SRA depends on your voluntary annual subscriptions. It is proposed that this year the subscription rate increases to £5 per household. We hope to encourage residents to pay their subscription using online banking but cash and any other donations are also gratefully received! Thanks to the Treasurers Iris Jones (SRA) and Choi Kim (The Gazette) and to Jeff Bayton who reviews the Accounts.

#### 2019 Local news

Following the change of the Selsdon electoral ward boundaries from May 2018 the Council split Selsdon into two\* – north and south and linked it to other areas with other priorities. The Police followed suit which has meant that the SRA must attend two sets of Police meetings to ensure Selsdon is not forgotten. Selsdon fortunately remains a low crime area. We are pleased to be able to say that the four Councillors who cover the north and south Selsdon wards work together well and take turns to attend the monthly SRA meetings. Councillor Helen Pollard writes the monthly update in The Gazette. \*A few Selsdon roads were taken into the Sanderstead Ward but we still count them as members and they still get The Gazette and our help should they need it.

There were some unwanted attempts by the Council to develop some of Selsdon's green spaces and fortunately most of these were shelved but a few are ongoing and still being resisted!

Nationally 'Climate change' and 'Brexit' were two big ongoing issues of the year and many people were left feeling stressed that so much talk seemed to go in circles. Even at a local level using your consumer choice and political voice can make a difference to the 'bigger picture'.

The Councillors organised a <u>Selsdon Plan day</u> for residents to put forward their ideas for Selsdon and say what they value about the area. The SRA were pleased to see from the collated feedback that the SRA activities mentioned above are valued! Whilst volunteers and funds are available we will continue! We hope to see you at the AGM and hear your thoughts.

### Farley Road - Potholes

Dear Reader, you may remember that some time ago your SRA chased our Council about the poor state of Farley Road, particularly the section between Queenhill Road down to Littleheath Road and beyond. Back then Croydon Council eventually responded that the condition of the road had been inspected and did not meet their 'intervention level' and that no resurfacing, other than reactive patch repairs would be carried out.

Having recently experienced a few 'boneshaker' journeys on the 433 and 64 buses down towards Croydon, dodged the potholes when driving down the road, and after the latest limited nocturnal resurfacing exercise, I thought it time to again check with the Council on their plans for this section of road. This time I enlisted the help of our Councillors Helen Pollard and Robert Ward and they facilitated a speedy response to my query. This is the response from Croydon Council, verbatim:

"Dear Cllr Pollard

Thank you for your e-mail date 14<sup>th</sup> January 2020

In terms of resurfacing of Farley Road, unfortunately the carriageway does not meet our intervention level for resurfacing for the financial year 20/21, our officers have inspected it and whilst it is starting to deteriorate it is safe. At our last safety inspection, a number of orders were raised for localised repairs to be undertaken to the worst affected areas. In turn the condition of the highway had also been captured and confirmed via our condition survey software "As no need for action" prior our to site visit investigation.

In the meantime I have copied the highways inspector for the area, into this email who will be monitoring Farley Road to see if any further localised repairs are required. I am sorry that we are unable to repair every road that some level of immediate or foreseeable defect may be identified however, our Highways team continue to do our best to ensure that repairs, where identified, are prioritised and carried out as soon as practical.

Moving forward you may be pleased to know that Sections of Foxearth Road will be programmed for resurfacing in the next and up and coming months.

Residents will be notified in the usual method via letter drop 2 weeks prior before implementation"

It is not clear from the response just how far the road has to deteriorate to trigger the Councils 'intervention level' and resurfacing is required. So, it appears we will have to wait at least until some time in financial year 21/22 before we can potentially enjoy a smooth and untroubled ride on the entirety of Farley Road.

In the meantime if you should gouge your wheel rim or crack a suspension arm on any of the many potholes, loose manhole covers, dropped gulley gratings or collapsed trenches on your journey up or down Farley Road or, indeed, any of our poorly maintained roads, you may best advised to report it to the Council via telephone on 020 8725 2816 or online via 'My Account', 'Don't Mess With Croydon' or 'Love Clean Streets' on your smartphone or tablet, and our Council may reactively respond to your complaint.

At the risk of adding to the caseloads of our hard working Councillors I would suggest keeping them in the loop with any highway condition complaints that you raise with Croydon Council.

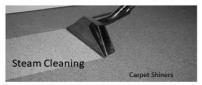

# Mental Health and Wellbeing

Life can certainly get tough at times. Bereavement, social isolation. trauma, physical ill health, poverty, stress, bullying, relationship issues, hormone imbalance and exhaustion are just some of the challenging circumstances that can lead to mental distress. We can all be subject to these at some point in our lives.

It is natural that such negative experiences and challenges without recognition, help and support might lead to unruly thoughts, feelings, behaviours, even physical symptoms that can get out of control. Thankfully the taboo about this is diminishing as more people are being open and sharing their experiences of mental distress and sharing ways to get help and make positive life changes.





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#### Quick self-review checklist

- Mood self-assessment test on NHS website www.nhs.uk/ conditions search 'mental health and wellbeing'. They also have information guides and contacts.
- Support network: Do you have people or known organisations easily available to help bolster you? If not reach out – See a selection of ideas at the end of the article.
- *Physical health*: when was the last time your health and any medication was reviewed? See your GP for a check-up.
- Exercise: Are you getting regular exercise? Known as the 'wonder drug' it is a sure fire way to improve your mental health. Pick something you enjoy but it is possible to exercise too much!
- Sleep: Trouble sleeping? Establish a stable and relaxing bedtime routine avoid stimulants and gadgets close to bedtime. Get worries onto paper.
- Diet: Caffeine, Sugar and Fatty foods can be automatically reached for in times of distress but can actually work against your mood. Be aware and try to eat regularly and healthily to get the necessary vitamins and nutrients needed. (Vitamin D from sunlight)
- Alcohol and Drugs: These addictive products can act as depressants rather than as the intended comfort when in distress.
   Overuse and dependency can delay healing and create new problems.
- Digital technology and social media: Do you spend too much time alone reading stories that are getting you down or anxious? Take or break or turn your worries into positive action.
- Having a break: How regularly do you undertake hobbies, activities and meet people who make you happy? Try local groups and clubs or home visitors see ideas below.
- Crisis?: Spot the signs. Mental distress can appear as physical symptoms. Don't ignore a problem. If you might be near breaking point, if others are putting you in danger physically or psychologically, or you have self-harm feelings and behaviours this must be addressed.

### Help is out there

- If you are in **CRISIS** contact the Samaritans (call 116 123), ChildLine (call 0800 1111).
- A supportive GP may be able to offer medication, counselling or 'social prescribing' which are activities known to improve mood. NHS 'Walk in' practices and Emergency visitor treatment at any GP practice is available if not registered or away from home.

# MP Chris Philp's priorities for the next Parliament

I am very grateful to have been re-elected as our MP last December, with an increased majority of 12,339. To the 30,985 people who voted for me, I would like to say thank-you for your trust and support, which I will endeavour to repay with continued hard work for our area. I will try to work in all our community's interests, whether you voted for me or not.

I hope that the decisive election result nationally means that we can move on from the divisive atmosphere of the past few years, and come together as a country. The Government has already made national investments that will benefit Croydon. There is funding for 20,000 extra Police Officers across the UK over the next three years. I calculate that Croydon will receive over 100 new officers – an increase of around 15 percent.

The NHS is seeing the largest funding increase in its history – an extra £23 billion (+18%) a year by 2022 starting with £6 billion (+5%) next year. These are after-inflation figures. This means that the brand new A&E at Croydon University Hospital that has just opened and the £12m for a re-vamped intensive care unit there are just the start of the further improvements we will see in Croydon.

Schools are getting substantially more money. This will help all Croydon schools and comes on top of improvement over the last two years.

Extra police, NHS and education funding are things that I hope everyone can get behind.

Locally, I am supporting the resident run campaign for a Directly Elected Executive Mayor (DEM). Currently the council run by a committee and a leader made up of the largest party locally. This means a party can win the town hall based on a few marginal seats in the centre of the Borough. This has a negative impact on the rest of the borough, especially in the south, where many residents feel ignored.

A group of residents' associations from across the Borough wants to fix this by changing the way Croydon is run to a Directly Elected Executive Mayor model – where we directly elect an Executive Mayor. This means all our votes would count equally, and whoever runs the town hall will have to listen to everyone if they want to win. If about 14,000 signatures are collected, the council has to hold a referendum on adopting a DEM. Please go to the Residents' Group's website and donate to their campaign

and/or download their petition sheet (it has to be done on paper). We have around half the signatures needed already, and I will be working closely with residents in this year to get the rest. There is more information at <a href="https://www.demco.org.uk">www.demco.org.uk</a>. This is being run by local Residents Associations and I am fully supporting them.

### Plastic Bags of Dog Poo pollute our environment. (15th Feb by email)

Selsdon Wood's 81 hectares (200 acres), like our oceans, has a problem with plastic contamination. The Forestry Commission and other similar organisations have become concerned about the proliferation of plastic bags of dog poo in the countryside, as they pollute our environment. The main visitors to Selsdon Wood are dog walkers and plastic bags of dog poo are an increasing problem.

After a recent Friends of Selsdon Wood and dog owner's campaign for more bins, Croydon Council increased the number of waste/dog poo bins in Selsdon Wood National Trust nature reserve from 5 to 9. The problem has decreased but it is still significant.

This is despite constant appeals on FSW posters around the wood - to flick the poo into the wood, or place the bags in waste bins, or take them away. One has to query the mentality of those who are too selfish or unthinking to take a little trouble to help our environment. *And who in their right mind hangs their bags on a bush?* And who do they think will remove these plastic bags? The Council has no team for this. It is left to concerned volunteers to clear them up.

I now make another plea to fellow dog owners to remove dog poo from the paths or grass where children, and adults alike, can be contaminated by dog poo with its health risks.



So let's make Selsdon Wood, and all open spaces, a cleaner, healthier environment for everyone to enjoy.

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## Nature Notes -The Holly & the Ivy

For many years a bunch of berry-covered Holly has been used as a winter decoration in the home. It has the advantage of retaining its form at least through the twelve days of Christmas owing to the waxy evergreen leaves. Before light from electricity or gas became available there was an additional reason for bringing Holly indoors – it was believed to ward off evil spirits. Holly is a dioecious tree with the male and female parts appearing on separate individuals. Both male and female produce relatively insignificant flowers in the spring but by the time the winter decoration is collected the only trees bearing the red berries will be female. As pollination occurs with the help of the wind a few judiciously placed males can serve a larger number of females. However, the initial spread of Holly trees comes from hungry birds swallowing berries and depositing the seeds anywhere in a woodland so that a small forest of Holly trees could be all male simply by chance. The berries are unpalatable in early winter but improve after being frozen so can provide a late winter feast when other food sources might have diminished. Apart from growing from seed the trees have branches which might touch the ground where they have a habit of producing roots and thus expanding the Holly forest, causing the tree to be treated as an invasive species.



Ivy is a climber which can cling to walls or tree trunks and in some cases might be the only thing holding up a small decayed tree, rather like the Strangler Fig in tropical forests which initially uses another tree for support but eventually absorbs most of the available nutrients and causes the demise of the tree. As Ivy retains most of its leaves in winter a tree

supporting a dense covering of Ivy will be at the mercy of winter storms and can be toppled more easily than a tree bare of leaves. Ivy produces black berries and is often complements the Holly used for decoration. Like the Holly berry those on the Ivy need a little frost to make them palatable to birds but then they can be devoured voraciously by birds like Blackbirds in late winter. *Small birds will roost in dense Ivy* and in the breeding season will nest in it (see photo).

It is not only decorative qualities which link the Holly and the Ivy. The Holly Blue butterfly overwinters as a pupa from which the adult butterfly emerges in April (See photo) and May. Eggs are laid throughout May and June usually at the base of flower buds on Holly, though other plants are used. If the emerging caterpillar is on a female Holly it will feed on the developing berries; on a male Holly feeding is on the new leaves at the tips of twigs. New butterflies will be on the wing from late July and the females will now choose to lay their eggs on the



unopened flower buds of Ivy. This second brood produces the pupae which overwinter to begin the cycle again on Holly.

# **Go Swimming**



Swimming is a great way to have fun and get healthy, whatever your age or level of ability. It's never too late to start. We are surrounded by pools but not always in plain sight! So whether you want to go once in a while or regularly there will be one for you.

In Selsdon there are two local *private* pools available for general swimming:

- <u>Croydon High Sports Club</u>, Old Farleigh Rd. A 25m pool for paid club members (out of school hours only)
- <u>Selsdon de Vere Hotel</u> also has a small spa pool for guests and day visitors.

A short distance away from Selsdon are *public* 25m pools easily accessible by public transport. These are good value and as you may

know Croydon council fund *free* swimming in their pools for local over 60's residents if you bring in proof of age and address. Try:

- New Addington. This opened in January this year so should be very bright
  and clean. It is run by the 'Better' group which also runs <u>Purley</u>, <u>Waddon</u>
  and slightly further away is <u>Crystal Palace (Olympic size 50m long!)</u>. Note
  the 'Better' website says they are 'cashless' so worth taking a card to pay.
  www.better.org.uk/leisure-centre
- Alternatively <u>West Wickham pool</u> over the border in Kent has a larger pool (33m) but costs more for entrance.

On the borders of Selsdon there are other local *private* paid members' 25m pools available (only out of school hours):

- Whitgift School Fitness and Wellbeing, Haling Park, South Croydon
- Trinity School Sports Club, Shirley.
- <u>Warlingham School</u> and <u>Thomas More School</u>, Purley also have pools but only available for private swimming lessons not general swimming.

Some **private** gyms in Croydon also have leisure pools but these may be small.

Most of the pools named above have facilities for the less abled, swimming lessons, fun inflatable events and other club activities taking place such as High diving, water polo, water fitness classes, even scuba diving. Some of the pools are part of the NHS GP social prescribing programme too. Find more details online. Perhaps it is time to find that swimming costume and take the plunge?

#### What is a 'Fast'?

Did you eat Pancakes on 25<sup>th</sup> February? Do you know why this tradition started? This is the day traditionally/historically used by Christians as the day to use up all the rich food that would be abstained from during the upcoming Lenten 'Fast period'.



Fast periods are found within many world religions and philosophies. Fasting is temporary and can last for just a few hours or even a few weeks. So what is a 'Fast'? It usually relates to food and a 'fast' is a 'reduction' while 'abstinence' refers to 'refraining from'. Religious Fasts are done for spiritual reasons, as a positive challenge, offering or preparation for an event. It is not intended to be punishing or detrimental to health, obviously there are rules and guidance! Those young, pregnant or in poor health are not expected to Fast.

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'Lent' is a period of 46 days usually for the majority of March. In the past Lenten fasting and abstinence was strictly dictated and observed by Christian church goers but now it is more an individual choice to reduce or give up certain foods or pleasures for the duration and/or choose to do positive actions. The Lenten fast ends on Easter Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> April.

The Islamic fast of 'Ramadan' this year will begin on 24<sup>th</sup> April and will continue for a month when all eating and drinking (including water) is prohibited from sunrise to sunset.

It is worth noting that the practice of 'fasting' is not limited to religious communities. Self- imposed alcohol or meat free months, intermittent fasting or 'de-toxing' seem to be gaining popularity amongst the general public for particular health benefits. De-toxing doesn't just relate to food either. Conventional wisdom suggests that it takes 28 days to break a habit.

#### A Good Time for Gardening

Writing this early in February, it's a strange time in the garden. Everything appears to be dull and dismal, almost sleeping. I wonder whether gardens hibernate. On a dry day, it's still good to have a wander around the garden just to see what is going on, especially as the weeds don't seem to ever stop growing. Dealing with a few of these as you look around is a great thing to do and stops them becoming too big and crowding out the plants you want to have in the garden.

Until recently everything was so wet and squelched underfoot. The soil has begun to dry out a bit with the drier weather. It is an uplifting sensation to see the groups of gently nodding snowdrops that have appeared. It was whilst looking for the snowdrops that we unexpectedly came across a pot of (very) early miniature iris. Their gloriously vibrant purple colour was a joy to behold. Many other bulbs are beginning to shoot and if the present mild weather continues it looks as if the daffodils will be in bloom this month. Should you drive past Knights at Warlingham, you have not been seeing things – there have been daffodils blooming quite close to the road since mid-January.

Have a look at the trees and shrubs as you walk around. On many of them, there is evidence of the leaf buds beginning to swell. Catkins have been dancing in the breeze on the birch and hazel trees for some weeks. They are such an indication that Spring is on its way. The buds are swelling on camellia bushes and should you have an early flowering azalea, this is possibly already showing colour. With Spring around the corner, we have crocuses, daffodils, hyacinths and so many other flowers to look forward to in the very near future.

What about the vegetable plot? This could also be an area that is resting at the moment. Or, you might have the likes of cabbage, Brussel sprouts, kale, cauliflower etc. growing. This is the time of year to be looking through the seed / plant catalogues and deciding what you plan to grow and where, just ahead of starting the seedlings off in greenhouses and conservatories.

Time also for pruning various fruit canes and trees. Cherry, apple, pear and plum trees benefit from pruning as this stimulates growth, flowering and fruiting. Do this in early Spring and definitely before the tree flowers. Ensure that dead, diseased and damaged boughs are removed. Similarly, prune fruit canes, although do check either the suppliers' instructions or 'Mr Google' as varieties can differ in their optimum pruning times. Generally, all canes that previously bore fruit should be cut to ground level. Other jobs to consider are ensuring that pots and seed trays are clean and ready for use and removing old string and raffia from the canes that were hurriedly thrown into the shed when the deluges of rain began last Autumn.

There has been plenty in the news extolling the health benefits of being outside; be that for a walk, playing with family members in the park or pottering around the garden. It is still early in the year, so when you go outside wrap up warm, making sure that your coat or fleece comes down to the top of your legs – *did your mum used to insist that you kept your kidneys warm?* Muscles are easily pulled, especially early in the gardening season, so a few stretches, to get them ready for the shock of twisting, turning and bending again, won't go amiss. If you can find a sunny corner to work in then you will also begin to help your vitamin D levels from the sunlight. Don't stay out too long, enjoy what you're doing and relish that well-earned long, hot soak in the bath or shower when you come back inside.

The bluebells will be coming along soon too, they don't grow here but I will always remember the bluebell woods. My sister and I both walked to Selsdon School and on our way home through the woods behind the school we would pick arm fulls of bluebells in the spring. We both loved it at Selsdon School and we were most unhappy about moving

to Canada. I look back on my time in Selsdon as very happy days and a good part of my life I hope you do too.

Some people I remember from school are Barbara Singleton, Alice Kent, Sylvia Williamson, Jennifer Jacks, Cyril Fisher, Robert Aungier and Peter Latham. I also have autographs from all the canteen staff as we had dinners at school. I remember the day each week when we had ground beef, cabbage and boiled potatoes with the eyes in them. My Mum worked part time at the Selsdon Park Hotel, it always seemed such a grand place, only for rich people. I have lots of memories of Selsdon!"

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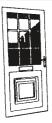
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#### Retirement: How Did I Ever Find Time To Work?

When I retired, a Selsdon friend and former colleague tried to persuade me to join Croydon U3A. I had no idea what he was talking about. 'You'll love it'. But I wasn't persuaded. Two years later, I was worn down and agreed to attend one meeting. That was four years ago, and I am now proud and highly privileged to be the Chairman, as well as running four Interest Groups. As you will surmise, that first brush with the U3A nailed it, or should I say they had me at 'hello'!

The U3A is a movement for third agers who are retired or semi-retired, who love learning new things, who want to make new friends and enjoy themselves. The original name 'University of the Third Age' was based on the French version, but the British founding fathers envisaged a more open model. Instead of being guided by universities and second agers (lecturers and professors), U3As in the UK are led by members themselves. Each U3A is self-run and self-funded to enhance *life-long learning for its own sake* and to *promote well-being* through social contact.

Yesterday I had lunch with six members of our MOTO group (Members On Their Own). 'What did you do when you work?' I asked one of the group. She went on to tell us about her life in the Diplomatic Service, being based in many different parts of the world. Another had been employed developing and making vaccines for farm animals, another worked for the RAF. The discussion reinforced the change the U3A has made on me. I used, to my shame, to be quite dismissive of, and impatient with 'old folk'. Now I'm rubbing shoulders with so many talented people who have amazing amounts to offer and a thirst to learn more, especially about subjects they didn't have time for in their younger lives.

Once someone has joined they can investigate a list of 65 groups, get help to start up a new one, come to monthly meetings with top-rate speakers, sign up for coach trips and so much more. Classes are held in various locations. Groups meet either at somebody's home, or in a room in a local library, church or community centre.

There are 700 of us members in Croydon, running groups from Bridge to Badminton, Languages to Literature, Wine Tasting to Yoga and most

things in between. Our motto *is 'Learn, Laugh, Live'*. There are 1,050 U3As in the UK with around 440,000 members, all actively involved in making retirement something that counts.

#### How to make your lawn green in every sense

I wanted to write this article to get people thinking about how they can make some small changes, big changes and even save money whilst having a nice lawn that is quietly saving the planet.



The areas I want to discuss are: mowing, fertiliser, weed killer, scarifying and irrigation (watering).

#### **Mowing**

I'll start with the most obvious. Moving away from petrol is key. If you've just splashed out on a new petrol mower, then simply mow less often. The rule is no more than  $\frac{1}{3}$  off in any cut. This means you might be able to mow twice a month rather than 4 times. This one is simple and saves you money already.

Alternatively you could be in the market for a new mower. If you have a small lawn that's close to the house go with a cord. You can get good ones relatively cheap and even with a rear roller for stripes.

If you have a larger lawn or one that needs extension leads to get too, why not try a battery? The batteries are a lot better than they were even 2 years ago. My battery mower was £250, the charger was £54 and a small battery (lasts 45min) is £100. That's £404 and it's a wonderful mower. A new petrol can be £500 and better ones are £1000. If you're sensible you can get strimmers and blowers that run on the same batteries.

#### Fertiliser

This has the potential to make a real difference. Over application of nitrogen has a massive impact on green house gasses. A molecule of Nitrous oxide that can be released from the soil is 300 times worse for green house effect than a molecule of CO2. It's easy to go and get some lawn fertiliser from the shop and get it down. You'll have a really green lawn but what else is it doing? So by applying less nitrogen and using the right types is key to reduce this effect.

There is a way of supplementing your fertiliser inputs that will have a hugely positive impact on the soil. There is advice about returning clippings or mulching. You can do this but the worm casts in Winter will be awful. Instead the clippings can be brewed and sprayed back on. All you

need is a bucket, some water and time. Half fill the bucket with clippings, then  $\frac{3}{4}$  fill with water and stir, stir the next day and stir again the day after that. After 3 days the clippings can be separated and the water applied to the lawn.

#### Weed killer

A contentious topic with all the negativity around them at the moment. If you are against them it's important to know the 3 in 1 fertiliser from the shop has weed killer in it. If you don't want them used then the only option for the home gardener at the moment is hand weeding.

#### Scarifying

There are electric models that will do a job but it needs to be done regularly to have any effect. If your lawn has a lot of moss and thatch, especially deep seated thatch a petrol scarifier maybe the way to go. This would be a carbon investment. By getting the thatch under control your lawn will be healthier and thicker which means it'll take in more CO2.

#### <u>Irrigation</u>

With hose pipe bans becoming common every summer it's another contentious one. I'm going to advocate for heavy but infrequent watering. This makes the best use of water. There is plenty of evidence of what just leaving it can do, if it dies it doesn't come back. Rain water harvesting is getting better, using stored rain water is much better for your lawn anyway.

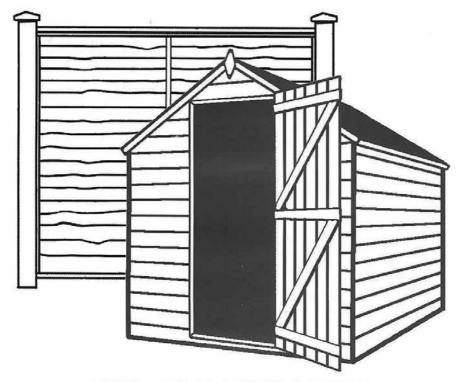
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#### Florida off the beaten track

I've previously written about part of central Florida's Gulf Coast we know well, outside the tourist areas of Miami and Orlando. Its chief attraction is 'Weeki Wachee Springs State Park' in Hernando County. Like so much of Florida away from the usual tourist trail, the Park offers an abundance of wildlife in its waterways and woodlands.

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It's also the home of the 'mermaids' who have been delighting visitors with their performances in the waters of the natural spring since 1947 (not the same ones, of course, but more of that later). You can also paddle a kayak down the crystal clear Weeki Wachee river and see manatees, birds, turtles, and raccoons. (www.weekiwachee.com)

Those who stay a week or more can read about the community's news in *The Hernando Sun*. In 1966 someone had the bright idea of establishing city status for Weeki Wachee, so that 'City of Mermaids' would appear on road signs and thus provide free advertising for the mermaid shows. But here's the thing. Current census data show there are just 12 residents, no elections have been held for years, and the city's 'elected' officials are all employees of Weeki Wachee Springs State Park. As a result, the Hernando County legislature has voted to remove city status and the 1.1 square mile of territory will become the responsibility of the County.

Fortunately, the mermaids will not be troubled by the change and will continue to thrill audiences, young and old, with their performances. All are already experienced divers but have been trained for at least six months for this role, in which they mime to songs and perform graceful underwater ballet to tell the story of 'The Little Mermaid'. They can hold their breath for an astonishingly long time while diving into what are said to be the deepest freshwater springs in the US. In other shows they



demonstrate their skills of drinking and eating underwater – quite a feat (sorry, tail). And unlike the Orlando theme parks it won't cost you an arm and a fin.

In addition to the daily shows given by the young performers, there are monthly reunions of retired mermaids, ranging from 60 to 80 years of age. They defy conventional age and health barriers to perform their graceful routines to delighted audiences. Their zest for life and camaraderie with each other is a joy to behold.

One of the features of living in Florida, and probably most other parts of the US, is the public veneration of the armed forces. Nearly everyone you speak to seems to have a family member in the forces, while the older generation will tell you of being stationed in the UK during World War 2. Many restaurants and retail establishments offer discounts to military personnel and their families. No church service is complete without

expressions of thanks to army veterans and to active servicemen and women for 'keeping America safe'.

We all know that US forces are stationed in Europe, the Middle East, and beyond, and that some are in combat roles. I would not for one moment suggest they should never be acknowledged or that their past service is not appreciated. We owe them a great deal. But here in Florida it somehow seems excessively obsequious and unbalanced. There is rarely any mention of the courage of the police and emergency services, on whom we all depend for protection and support when we need it most.

Finally, a mention of national politics in this year of presidential election: judging from the bumper stickers and the Republican party offices, supporters of the President are in the majority in this part of Florida. We came across a rare exception in the Publix supermarket, where we spotted an individual wearing a T-shirt with the slogan "Donald Trump is a disgrace to America". We shall see!
