COUNCILLORS' NOTES

CROYDON'S SECOND 'REPORT IN THE PUBLIC INTEREST'

In late January Croydon Council's external auditors, Grant Thornton, published a Report in the Public Interest into the refurbishment of the Fairfield Halls.

These Reports are issued extremely rarely, because the threshold to commission them is so high – but that hasn't stopped the current Labour administration being issued with two of them in just 15 months. Croydon is the only Council to have been issued two reports in such a short space of time.

As a result of this Croydon Council was forced to hold an Extraordinary Council Meeting, at which Grant Thornton presented their Report and answered councillors' questions.

During the Meeting which was held on 3rd February, the independent auditors confirmed that:

- The Labour-run Council handed the Fairfield Halls refurbishment contract to their friends at Brick By Brick, without letting any other company bid;
- At no point did they give Brick By Brick a list of things they wanted done, nor did they attempt to properly work out the cost of the works;
- The total cost of the works rocketed to £67.5m, more than double the £30m budgeted. What's more, this huge increase was never agreed by Cabinet or Council;
- No evidence of a Sales Agreement alongside other fundamentally important documents – between the Labour-led Council and Brick By Brick could be found.

Questions raised by Conservative councillors were either shut down or given incorrect and misleading answers and incomplete reports, with details which the Labour administration didn't want us to see, redacted. This whole cover up approach meant that scrutiny and challenge, which could have allowed corrective action to be taken, were completely blocked.

The auditors have described the weaknesses in the council's financial, legal and governance processes and management of this project as "fundamental failings by the council" and it highlights that a significant amount of public money was spent without proper authorisation.



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Having notified the Monitoring Officer of our intention, the Conservative Shadow Cabinet recommended that the Report in the Public Interest concerning the refurbishment of Fairfield Halls, be sent to the Police. Despite the Labour Councillors claiming that they 'fully accepted' the report which labelled their actions as unlawful, every Labour Councillor attending voted against sending the report to the Police. Croydon's Conservative Opposition were, however, determined not to leave the matter there and shortly after the Meeting contacted the Police. LOCAL PLAN CONSULTATION

In January to mid-February there has been a consultation on proposed changes to the Local Plan – the document that determines what can and cannot be built in Croydon. There are some controversial changes proposed to the Local Plan and a summary of the comments from Cllr Robert Ward and Cllr Helen Pollard who represent Selsdon and Addington Village Ward, is below.

The work that was carried out in Selsdon before lockdown, to complete the Selsdon Community Plan, was worthwhile as it has been used in the development of the latest version of the Local Plan. Nevertheless, it doesn't mean that the Local Plan reflects the Selsdon Community Plan, and there are still some major areas where the Local Plan seems to be incompatible with the Selsdon Community Plan.

In the following extracts from the revised Croydon Local Plan, (https://www.croydon.gov.uk/sites/default/files/2022-01/proposed-submission-of-croydon-local-plan-2019-to-2039-tracked-changes.pdf), deleted text is shown as struck through and insertions are in bold italics.

Comment 1: Intensification

Strategic Policy 2 (page 41): Homes

SP2.1 In order to provide a choice of housing for people in socially-balanced and inclusive communities, the Council will apply a presumption in favour of sustainable development of new homes to meet the **future needs of the area**.

Quantities and Locations

SP2.2 In order to provide a choice of housing for people in Croydon,

the Council will seek to deliver $\frac{32,890}{800}$ 37,736(or 2,100 per annum over 18 years) homes between $\frac{2016-36}{800}$ 2019-2039.

Delivering Homes SP1.0C (page 32)

There are residential areas where the characteristics and infrastructure provision have led to the identification of potential for sustainable housing growth and renewal.

- a) Areas of Focussed Intensification are areas where a step change of character to higher density forms of development around transport nodes and existing services will take place in locations where access to local transport and services is good.
- b) Moderate Intensification are areas where density will be increased, whilst respecting existing character, in locations where access to local transport and services is good.
- c) Evolution and gentle densification will be supported across all other residential areas.

The justification for SP1.0C is the need to build 37 736 homes in the borough by 2039 (Policy SP2). However, there is no justification for the figure of 37 736 or indeed any explanation as to why it has increased from the previous 20-year figure of 32 890. This policy therefore fails the soundness test as it appears to be a figure plucked from thin air in order to drive the wholesale change in the character of Croydon.

The last few years have seen some major changes in population as a result of Brexit and Covid19 and yet neither of these factors have been acknowledged in this version of the Local Plan. The net outflow of EU residents due to Brexit is bound to have reduced the expected growth in population in the borough. The increase in working from home due to Covid has seen many families leave London (and Croydon) – where has this been taken into account? Covid has also caused increased demand for homes with gardens – again, no mention of this in the revised Local Plan. These two factors are hugely important when planning for the future and yet they have been completely ignored.

Census data will be published in April/May 2022 and the consultation is being carried out before this important information is available. This is another reason why the consultation should be postponed until the Summer.

Comment 2: Heritage Strategic Policy 4 (page 130): Urban Design, Heritage and Local Character **SP4.1** Development **should be inclusive and** of a high quality **respecting and enhancing** Croydon's varied local character **and heritage assets** contributing positively to public realm, landscape and townscape to create sustainable communities

SP4. Developments will be required to:

- Be informed by the distinctive qualities, heritage, character, identity, topography, diversity, local needs and opportunities of the relevant Places of Croydon;
- b. Preserve and enhance Heritage Assets and their settings, Protect Local Designated Views, Croydon Panorama, the settings of Landmarks, other important vistas and skylines: and
- c. Enhance social cohesion, health and well-being, and
- d. Include well designed spaces for the proposed uses, ensuring any mixing of uses carefully integrates high quality amenity, access and servicing.
- **SP4.15** (page 133) The Council and its partners will promote improvements to the accessibility of heritage assets to allow enjoyment of the historic environment for all.

Intensification Areas

SP4.16 In the locations identified as Areas of Focussed Intensification and Moderate Intensification, high quality developments that increase density and evolve character will be supported. They will be expected to enhance and sensitively respond to positive aspects of existing local character by being of high quality.

The inclusion of Heritage in this section is welcomed.

The section on Page 133 at point SP4.16 is also welcomed, but there is no definition of 'high quality', or 'evolve character', or how they should 'enhance or sensitively respond to positive aspects of existing local character by being of high quality'. This leaves too much room for subjective judgement. In the past many developments have been labelled 'good quality' and granted permission, and yet they have poor design and materials that quickly look scruffy when the development is built. There should be more specifics about quality etc in SP4.16

Comment 3: Intensification Areas
See Delivering Homes SP1.0C in Comment 1
An attempt has been made here to define the types of development that


will be permitted but they are still too vague and will allow poor quality and insensitive developments to be built. Furthermore, there is a contradiction in the change in the character caused by the intensification and the need to 'maintain the local character of the area including any heritage asset'. This tension would not exist if the Local Plan had not set such unjustified high housing targets.

SP4 (page 141) Areas of Intensification

6.7a In order to meet the development needs of the borough, sustainable locations to support sustainable growth have been identified on the policies maps as Focussed Areas of Intensification and Moderate Intensification. Whilst delivering tangible benefits including providing a richer mix of types and sizes of accommodation to suit different lifestyles, policies seek to ensure that development is of a good design, whilst reducing car dependency and promote local economic activity.

Detailed Policy DM10 (page 149): Design and Character DM 10.1 Development should be of high quality, reflecting and maintaining the local character of the area including any heritage assets having regard to:

- a. The area's developmental pattern, layout and siting;
- b. The area's appearance, existing materials and roofscapes, scale, height, massing and density of existing built form and
- c. The heritage assets and natural features of the surrounding area and the Place of Croydon in which it is located.



Homes 11.188 (page 184)


An area of sustainable growth of the suburbs with some opportunity for windfall sites will see growth mainly confined to infilling. An area of focussed Intensification has been designated to the east of Selsdon, near Gravel Hill Tram Stop, which is also located within proximity to Selsdon District Centre. This is considered a highly sustainable location, where density residential development and renewal will be encouraged. This is due to its proximity to the tram network and services/facilities within the District Centre. Further an area of moderate Intensification has been designated to the North of Selsdon. This currently a low density residential area, which is considered to have good access to the tram network (via Coombe Lane Stop) as well as local services within Selsdon District Centre. Due to this it is considered a sustainable location for moderate renewal, intensification via new residential development that results in a reasonable increase in the density of the area The more dense eastern and more suburban western area will continue to be distinct characteristics of the area.

Intensification Areas Planned for Selsdon

The area surrounded by half-moons below is area of focussed intensification



The area enclosed by half-moons below is area for moderate intensification.



Comment 4: Green Grid

Detailed Policy DM26A (Page 254): Other Important Green Space DM26A.1 Other important green spaces are identified in the borough that add to character and wellbeing of the residents. These spaces will be protected unless

- An equivalent green space is reprovided as part of any development that allows for the local community to continue all existing lawful use of the Other Important Green Space;
- b. The existing Other Important Green Space is no longer used by the local community so is no longer an important open space; or
- c. Other equivalent green space is available for the local community to continue all existing lawful uses of the Other Important Green Space within the distances set out in Table 9.1b.

This is welcomed but two more green spaces in Selsdon should be designated 'Important Open Space' as per DM26. These are:



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- Foxearth Spinney (adjacent to 70 Foxearth Road)
- Land adjacent to 124 Croham Valley Road Both of these sites are well-used green spaces that have covenants to

prevent development.

Comment 5: Transport

Policy SP8 (page 271): Transport and Communication SP8.1 In order to deliver a transport and communications network capable of supporting growth over the plan period the Council will apply a resumption in favour of development for new transport schemes which meet the requirements of Policy SP8 and other applicable policies of the development plan. The transportation and communications network should support the community, environmental, and economic health of the borough by connecting communities, promoting physical activity through transport, reducing vehicle emissions, and creating vibrancy through foot traffic in the borough's centres. A functioning and accessible network is essential to accommodating growth.

There is no mention of how transport links will be improved in Selsdon, which has poor transport links. Whilst areas near the tram stops have reasonably good transport links, the rest of Selsdon is poorly served by public transport.

Comment 6: Selsdon Intensification

It is hard to see that intensification along the lines described above (see Comment 3) will be compatible with maintaining protecting and enhancing the suburban character of the area. The recent increase in demand for homes with gardens (due to Covid and subsequent increased working from home) is not compatible with these plans.

Comment 7: Selsdon Community Plan

11.186C (page 384) The Selsdon Community Plan (2020) outlines the key economic, social and environmental issues facing the area; as well as sets out the key priorities for investment in facilities, services and infrastructure identified by the local community, as this area is expected to change and grow in the future. A summary of the key issues identified by this are; a need to

protect, enhance and promote use of green spaces (including children's play area); a need to enhance public transport and provide bus shelters, increasing provision of parking near shopping areas, a need to provide new/enhanced community facilities for all ages and sports facilities, a need to limit fast food places and increase variety of other uses to promote viability, vitality of the District Centre. The Community Plan is a key piece of evidence that has informed the content of the Local Plan.


11.186 refers to the fact that the Selsdon Community Plan has been taken into account. If this is the case, then the two green spaces outlined above (Foxearth Spinney and Croham Valley Road), should be protected. The SCP states:

'Improving and preserving Selsdon's green spaces was by far the top priority and included comments about restricting development on green and open spaces. It came out on top not only in an opening question about what people liked about the area, but also in a question asking people to rank priorities for improvement by theme and was mentioned frequently in other questions.'

PERMISSION GIVEN FOR INTENSE DEVELOPMENT AT THE GALLOP

Even under the current Local Plan, the Labour-run Council is approving developments that cram lots of houses on to a plot that previously had only one home.

At a Planning Committee meeting in January, Labour Councillors voted in favour of demolishing a pair of bungalows and building 9 houses. A representative of Croham Valley Residents' Association and Cllr Robert Ward, Conservative Councillor for Selsdon and Addington Village Ward, spoke against the development. Sadly, these representations were ignored and the development was approved.

Surrey Hills AONB Consultation

I take pride in the fact that London is the world's first National Park City. In Croydon, 10 parks have been awarded the Green Flag Award, a status accredited to



well managed and accessible open spaces. On our doorstep, we are lucky to have large natural spaces such as Farthing Downs, Happy Valley, Coulsdon Common, Kenley Common, and Riddlesdown. That is why I am delighted that the Government's advisor on the natural environment is consulting to expand the boundaries of the Surrey Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty to include these areas.

AONB status for some of our most loved and used spaces would be invaluable in highlighting the respect and protection they deserve. More generally, my concern for our green spaces comes from the shocking loss of 300 hectares of Green Belt land across Greater London since 2017. The Surrey Hills AONB boundary has not been reviewed since 1958 and there have been repeated calls to reconsider the boundary. Including some of our local areas in the AONB could help preserve the natural environment and heritage while providing an opportunity to support people's health and wellbeing through access to nature.

By the time of publication, the public consultation had closed, however, I would like to thank everybody who took part in this very important opportunity for our area.

Dear Residents,

I am leaving my role as PCSO for Selsdon and Forestdale as I am going on to become a Police Constable. It's been a pleasure to meet some of you and to the ones I haven't met hopefully my updates have been helpful to keep up to date with what has been occurring in your local area. Thank you again and hope you all stay safe in the future.

Meanwhile Tina Nash, PCSO for Selsdon and Addington Village, has sent the following advice about catalytic converter thefts and the recent crime figures from 18/01/2022 to 19/02/2022.

Catalytic converter thefts are still a big problem for both wards and the surrounding areas. We are asking residents to please be vigilant. The criminals committing these offences are prepared to use violence against anyone who challenges them. In the last few weeks, Police Officers have been assaulted and Police vehicles damaged when they have captured or attempted to capture these thieves.

If you see or hear anyone tampering with your vehicle, please call 999 immediately. DO NOT attempt to intervene yourself.

If you can, give the operator a description of the suspects. How many of them were there? What were they wearing? Which way did they run? What vehicle did they get into? Did you get a registration number? This information helps Officers while on the way to your call. We are aware of how frustrating these thefts are and how costly they can be to vehicle owners, especially to those residents who we know have been victims more than once.

Shopping in Selsdon, part 1.

We regularly see delivery vehicles touring our streets, whether it's a grocery shop from Sainsburys, Ocado or Tescos or a delivery of an on-line order via DPD, UPS, Hermes, Amazon or even our reliable Postie, and we are told the High Streets are dying. Leaving aside Banking, which our stalwarts at the Post Office in Tudor Library now provide much of, we are fortunate in Selsdon to have a vibrant collection of shops offering a vast variety of services and goods.

What of the intrepid pioneers of Selsdon Garden Village aka Croham Heights? Soon after Planning Permission was granted to Messrs Costains on March 5th 1925 the first of 146 Costain houses in Byron, Queenhill and Farley Roads were being occupied in September of that year. Those original Selsdonians (Selsdonites?) would have been living on a building site with no paved roads, Farley Road / Croham Valley Road did not open until 1926 and there were no Deliveroo apps or static shops to get their daily victuals from. There were Piggeries and Smallholdings down on Selsdon Vale so pork and eggs and 'in season' vegetables would presumably have been readily available but it would be a trek to any shops in Addington or Sanderstead Village or down to South Croydon with no buses to ease the journey. Car ownership was a rarity among the new Selsdonians.

With a foresight that our current development system seems to lack, Costains had the problem in hand though: Planning Permission was granted November 24th 1925 for two blocks of shops in the Addington Road which we now know as 'The Broadway'. The first block of 5 shops, with accommodation over, was opened in late 1926.

Number 8 became B Nash, Greengrocers, sometime later. Number 9, was occupied by W V Taylor, a Fishmonger, in 1930.

It is perhaps interesting to see that some shops have changed name but not function. Possibly supermarkets have rendered the likes of local butchers and fishmongers obsolete and that there is a trend towards personal 'one to one' services on the high street, which supermarkets cannot provide. There is a thesis in there for someone.

Would we see a similar pattern of change or evolution of the high street if we look at the other shops along Addington Road or across the street, and what is the little building adjacent to the second Broadway Block?

A Good Time for Gardening - March



As I write this, the sun is beaming down and there is beginning to be warmth in the rays. Walking around Selsdon, snowdrops, crocus, hellebores, iris reticulata and even a few daffodils are in bloom. Spring is most definitely on its way.

A few jobs to keep the garden looking neat and tidy:

- check garden supports and possibly put a few extra ones in, as March can be a breezy month and tying new growth in can prevent it snapping off
- ~ check that paths haven't become slippery over the winter months
- feed trees, shrubs and hedges with a slow-release fertiliser by lightly forking it into the soil
- ~ prune roses to encourage strong, new growth and give them a feed
- cut back cornus (dogwoods) and other shrubs, grown for their colourful, winter stems, down to their bases, as well as ornamental grasses
- keep an eye out for slugs as the weather continues to warm up. They love soft, new growth on plants and seedlings
- cut the old leaves off hellebores to remove any disease and to make the flowers more visible
- deadhead hydrangeas before the new growth appears. Cut back to about one third of last season's growth
- dig compost into vegetable beds to prepare them for the growing season, covering them with black plastic to keep it drier and warmer in preparation for planting
- ~ feed blueberry plants with an ericaceous fertiliser
- ~ cover strawberries with a cloche to encourage early fruiting
- ~ recut any lawn edges if necessary
- ~ mow the lawn if it needs it, but set the blades higher than usual
- begin weeding as the weather warms it's easier if you remove them whilst they're young
- top dress containers by removing the top few centimetres of soil and replacing with fresh compost

Maureen has kindly written the following article to help us arrange our springtime flowers.

Flower Arranging in the Spring



For those with a love of nature, the annual appearance of buds on trees and plants epitomises the magic of the emergence of spring. After a long cold and dark winter, we are desperate for a bit of colour. This always gives flower arrangers much encouragement to start our spring arrangements.

If you decide to have a go, it is best to use seasonal plant material where possible. First come up with a plan. There are traditional classic ways to create

flower arrangements but any design will do as long as you like it. Various colours can be used, together, or as shades of one colour. Yellow is a classic spring colour and arrangements can incorporate decorations including fluffy chicks or painted eggs etc., many of which can be bought in supermarkets or high street shops. It's possible to be fairly economical with flower arrangements if using supermarket flowers and twigs and garden foliage. You can use whatever comes to hand.

Flowers traditionally used in spring arrangements are irises, tulips,

daffodils and narcissi, but roses and alstroemeria are wonderful for arranging also.

Examples of foliage to be used could be: twigs, ivy, ferns, eucalyptus, pussy willow, catkins and herbs such as rosemary or any other foliage from bushes in the garden. Some supermarkets include a small amount of foliage in their flower bunches for those with small or no gardens. It's always good to use British flowers where possible from a florist but supermarkets do



however sell a wide variety of beautiful flowers from all parts of the world and work out a bit cheaper.

All types of containers can be used such as baskets, dishes (plastic, glass or ceramic) or even wine glasses or teacups. "Oasis" foam, which can be bought from most garden centres is used to support the flowers, although pin-holders, crumpled wire or beads are becoming more popular, being more environmentally friendly. The Oasis must be kept moist to lengthen the life of the arrangement or water poured into the container.

When using spring flowers, it is best to remember that they are grown when the weather is quite cold so it's best to place your finished arrangement somewhere cool.

Easter trees and door wreaths are becoming very popular. An Easter tree can be made using contorted Willow decorated with small painted eggs, sweets or with battery lights similar to a Christmas tree. This can be great fun for kids to help.

For those who would like to have a go at flower arranging this spring, I hope this has given you a bit of a guide and inspiration.



- 2. **Kate Moss** Supermodel. Lived on the borders of Selsdon (both Sanderstead and Forestdale) during her childhood.
- 3. Lord Selsdon Currently Member of the House of Lords. His



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
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- connection to Selsdon is that his grandfather was once a South Croydon MP hence the hereditary title.
- 4. Sir Julian Huxley Biologist and writer, an early advocate of conservation and an influential populariser of science. His connection to Selsdon lies in his public support of the 10-year campaign to create a 'bird sanctuary'. He was a keen bird watcher and was very influential in shaping the modern RSPB. He went on to become the first Director-General of UNESCO (1946) and a founding member of the World Wildlife Fund. As you will know he also has a pub in Selsdon named in his honour!
- 5. **Jacqueline du Pré** World renowned Cellist. Alumni of Selsdon based Croydon High School
- 6. **George Smith** MP, banker and director of the infamous East India Company and great-great-great -grandfather of Queen Elizabeth II. He transformed the Selsdon farm into a manor house, 'Selsdon Park'
- 7. **General de Gaulle** Leader of Free French Army (and later President of France). In outbreak of WWII he first lodged at the Selsdon Park Hotel, and then with a French family (the Boissiers) in Arundel Avenue.
- 8. **Ted Heath** MP (and later Prime Minister). In the early 1970s Selsdon hotel was used as the meeting place for Heath and his shadow cabinet where they wrote their Conservative manifesto promoting a free market economy. They published under the name 'The Selsdon Group' and those choosing to follow these tenets continue the group today though none, then or now, were actually associated with the area!
- 9. **Kirsty MacColl** Singer/Songwriter. She grew up in Beech Way, Selsdon, attending local schools.
- 10. **Susanna Reid** Broadcaster and TV personality. Alumni of Selsdon based Croydon High School.

We thought that Mrs Cullen's (November Gazette) had resolved her problems about a missed bulky waste collection – unfortunately not!

Dear Editor,

Due to the continuing threats and harassment, I am continually receiving

from Croydon Council Tax Department I am now forced to take legal action to end this matter.

I have never received a refund from Croydon Council for the Bulky Waste Collection I paid for in July 2021 but never received.

On 20 October 2021 I was finally sent an email with a photograph taken by the Veolia driver showing my Bulky Waste very clearly standing on my driveway. It proved that the waste had been presented on the correct day, and I believed this would bring this matter to an end.

I decided to remove the amount owing from my council tax payments and I informed Croydon Council of my decision. But I am still being hounded for payment of "overdue Council Tax" and threatened with Court action. I have told Croydon Council repeatedly to take the £52.28 refund owed to me, and pay this towards my 'overdue' council tax.

The Council's incompetence is affecting my credit rating, and its constant harassment and threats are affecting my health. I am almost 70 years old and I have paid my council tax for 45 years with no problems.

I am now forced to seek legal advice, and I will start by making an appointment to meet with the Citizens Advice Bureau. I hope that this meeting will help me build a case against Croydon Council so that I can take you to the Small Claims Court, or even to Croydon Court, to put an end to this matter.

After 3 hours a lovely man came all the way from the Kent Wildlife Service in Uckfield to take the deer. (He arrived quicker than the RSPCA). Sadly, in spite of initially hoping for a good outcome the deer's wounds were too serious and the vet had to put the animal down.

Please, please can I ask all dog walkers in Selsdon Wood to keep their dogs on leads and under control. There are so many people with dogs

using the woods who seem unaware that their dog's natural instinct is to chase and worry deer and the deer often die of fright even if they appear uninjured.

We are so privileged to have these beautiful wild animals on our doorstep visiting our road surely, we can make a small conscious effort to protect their safety. After all, you would be upset and mortified if your pet dog caused the injury or death of a wild animal.

Have I gone mad? No, it is just they are simply everywhere in early spring and summer, and then they develop wings and suddenly fly away in late summer. It is always a pleasure to see a cloud of them go, but now I have seen the first one marching across my patio, I know spring is not far away. Soon I will be cursing them again, especially if I receive several bites at once when I accidently disturb an anthill while gardening. Nature Notes from Ted Forsyth Woodpeckers

Green Woodpecker. This is the largest of the British woodpeckers, and like other members of this group of birds, builds its nest in a hole which it makes in a suitable tree. As it is a large bird it is not surprising that the hole it produces is larger than those of the other species. I have only once, in Richmond Park, watched a Green Woodpecker at work creating its nest hole, though I have seen other completed or abandoned holes whose size and shape suggested they belonged to this species. On the RSPB reserve on the shingle of Dungeness, where there are no suitable trees, the birds nest in holes in telephone poles. The noise produced by this woodpecker is the loud laughing call which gives it the alternative name of "yaffle". It usually feeds on the ground, snacking on its favourite ants, but it will pick at ants foraging on branches and will also eat other invertebrates. There are at least two pairs in Selsdon Wood. Male and female look alike but can be separated by examining the "moustache" which is solid black in the female but has a red centre in the male.

Great Spotted Woodpecker. Most likely of all the woodpeckers to be seen and heard in UK woodland. This species produces the loud drumming on branches during the breeding season. The noise tails off at the end as though the bird is tiring. It also produces a loud "tchick" when disturbed and when the bird is very excited this can be repeated rapidly. Young birds in the nest make a loud chorus of begging calls which can be heard from some distance and thereby draws attention to the position of the nest. The red under the tail of both sexes does not help in identification but the male has a small red patch on the back of the neck. Juvenile birds have a red cap which separates them from the adults. Feeding on almost anything, they readily visit bird feeders, but have the unfortunate habit of raiding the nests of tits, particularly when built in artificial nest boxes. I would guess there are at least 20 pairs in Selsdon Wood.

Lesser Spotted Woodpecker. A sparrow-sized woodpecker which is disappearing from its usual haunts all over UK. At one time I could guarantee to find this species in all the local woods – Selsdon Wood, Littleheath, Kings Wood, Croham Hurst, etc. In the 1970s I was involved in the BTO attempt, using thousands of volunteers, to create an Atlas of Breeding Birds in Britain and Ireland which was eventually published in 1976. At one point I was asked to take over the survey area from another volunteer who was unable to continue. This involved New Addington so I began my new survey by walking up from Kent Gate Way through

Rowdown Woods. After about 100 metres I found a pair of Lesser Spotted Woodpeckers at their nest. Elsewhere I have seen birds dangling from the very tips of thin branches. Like its larger relative it drums on branches but the noise is all on one note and lasts about 50% longer so that it is possible to separate the two species just by listening to the drumming. I have only once heard the very quiet "tchick" call but the more common call is a ringing "kee, kee, kee". There is no red under the tail of either adult but the male has a dull red cap.

Wryneck. In past centuries this relative of the woodpeckers was a common bird in the summer but it is most likely to be seen during migration nowadays as birds from the continent pass through on their way to Africa. Seen at close range it is a marvellous mixture of greys, browns, black and yellow which gives it a camouflaged appearance when seen on the ground where it spends much of its time in search of ants. It nests in holes but is unable to produce its own and will frequently make use of an abandoned woodpecker nest hole. My encounters with this species have usually been in September when looking for migrating birds. I have seen them at Minsmere, Dungeness, Portland Bill and most frequently at Church Norton near Pagham. A possible exception to the migrating sightings occurred when I attended a Field Studies Course at Kindrogan in Perthshire. Having settled in, we went for a walk to explore the local area. A bird which rose from the vegetation and landed on a bare branch was a Wryneck. This was at a time when the species was believed to be breeding in Scotland.

Habitat destruction will always be a problem but possibly a warming climate will allow some of these birds to return to previous breeding haunts.

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
