





MP Natasha Irons' Report Member of Parliament for Croydon East

Dear Selsdon,

This month marked 100 days since the election and the new government has been working on some key pieces of legislation:

- The Renter's Rights Bill which aims to protect both tenants and good landlords from rogue ones. It will make it a legal requirement for hazards like damp and mould to be dealt with swiftly, extend the "decent home standard" to the private rented sector, and end "no-fault" evictions.
- The Water (special measures) Bill strengthens legislation to ensure that water bosses face personal criminal liability and gives the water regulator new powers to ban bonuses if environmental standards have not been met. In addition, the government has secured agreement from the regulator that any money earmarked for infrastructure investment is ringfenced and cannot be spent on bonuses or dividends for shareholders.
- Great British Energy Bill aims to drive clean energy deployment to create jobs, boost energy independence, and ensure British taxpayers, billpayers and communities reap the benefits of clean, secure, homegrown energy.




I had the opportunity to speak in a debate about access to primary healthcare. Since being elected in July, I have been contacted by many families who simply cannot access services like mental health support for their children due to long waiting lists. I was able highlight this in the debate and want to ensure that the current government's mission to reduce waiting lists includes a focus on the delays to health services our young people face. I have also been fortunate enough to be elected on to the Culture, Media and Sport select committee. Before becoming a Member of Parliament, I worked in public sector broadcasting so hope to put this knowledge to good use.

Locally, I enjoyed attending the Finding Common Ground for Climate and Nature in Croydon event which brought together residents from across Croydon as part of the Climate Coalition's National Day of Action. We discussed what can be done both locally and nationally to mitigate the impacts of the climate crisis, and what we can do to protect nature.

In partnership with Age UK Croydon, Citizen's Advice, Croydon Healthy Homes and the Department of Work and Pensions I held a Cost-of-Living advice surgery to provide support and advice to anyone struggling with the cost of living. The event led to some residents finding out that they qualify for pension credit and will be able to keep their winter fuel allowance. To

check your eligibility, please call the Pension Credit claim line on 0800-991-234 or visit the government's online pension credit calculator: www.gov.uk/ pension-credit-calculator.

Finally, we have begun holding mobile surgeries across Selsdon and I have been enjoying meeting many of you on the doorstep. Issues that have been raised with us include planning, street lighting and protecting the future of Selsdon High Street. If we haven't got round to your street yet and there is an issue you'd like to raise, you can book an appointment at one of my in-person surgeries by emailing natasha.irons.mp@parliament.uk.

Good Time for Gardening – November

Winter is on its way, leaves are falling rapidly, and wind and rain are on the increase. Tender plants will need protecting from frost, gales and freezing rain. Move plants into the greenhouse, or into a sheltered spot, but if you can't, it is worth wrapping plants or pots. Remember winter can be a tough time for birds in terms of water and food, so keep supplies well topped up. Clear up fallen leaves - especially from lawns, ponds and beds - ponds are a lovely addition to any garden and can provide a rich habitat for a range of wildlife. Occasional cleaning and regular maintenance are required to ensure water is healthy for fish and other wildlife. In wet weather, raise pots up off the ground on 'feet' or similar to keep the bottom of the pot out of the water and prevent compost freezing.



Plant tulip bulbs for a spring display next year - tulips are amongst the most popular of bulbs, valued for their brilliant flower colours and shapes. Plant in autumn for a show of spring flowers. Choose from a large range to suit the situation. Some tulips persist year to year, some perform less well and are treated as bedding, and replaced every year. 

More jobs for this month

- ~ Prune roses to prevent wind-rock
- ~ Plant out winter bedding
- ~ Cover brassicas with netting if pigeons are a problem
- ~ Insulate outdoor containers from frost bubble-wrap works well
- ~ Stop winter moth damage to fruit trees using grease bands around the trunks
- ~ Put out bird food to encourage winter birds into the garden

Cut leaves off Christmas and Lenten rose type hellebores to make way for the flowers.

Now is the last chance to plant out winter bedding. You could try wallflowers, forget-me-nots, Bellis, Primula, Viola (winter pansies) and other spring bedding plants, planting them into well-prepared ground, or pots of suitable compost.

selsdon residents' association needs your help

In January 1926 the Seldon Residents' Association was formed with the aim of advancing and protecting the interests of Selsdon Residents. It is one of the oldest residents' associations in the UK. 2025 will be the hundreth year that it has been operating.

Costains' Early Years and Ventures in the South. Plans for Selsdon Expansion.

Back in 1865 Richard Costain and his soon to be brother-in-law Richard Kneen moved to Liverpool from the Isle of Man and began as jobbing builders. They had premises at Byron Road, Liverpool, which comprised a joiner's shop and sawmill. Kneen amicably left the partnership in 1888 and Richard's three sons, Richard, William P and John, joined him. Prior to WW1 they were building cottages in Port Sunlight and houses in South Wales. The Great War saw them involved in building army camps, 1,000 houses for steelworkers at Redcar and homes for munitions workers at Sheffield. Post war the firm was involved in building large housing estates for Liverpool and Bootle Corporations but local housing sites were becoming scarce. William P Costain was sent down south to London to scout out expansion potential. He focussed on the rolling countryside of the south of London and, in 1922, settled on Kingswood (Banstead) and purchased a land bank, the Walton Heath Land Company, which had interests in the area. The company Richard Costain & Sons was formed in 1923. By this time the third generation of Costain boys had joined the firm: R R Costain in 1920. (A P Costain was to join in 1928.) The Kingswood venture was focussed mainly on building detached houses on large plots to order with some speculative development comprising smaller dwellings. We do not know what price the Kingswood dwellings were originally sold for but, as an indication, The Times in 1933, May 11th, carried a Costain advertisement for "Distinctive Homes at Kingswood built to owners' requirements, from £1,250 to £5,000". W P Costain had a house built at Woodlands Way in Kingswood and the company later provided a shopping parade, a hall and a golf course for the community. Costains also bought a ribbon of land along the Chipstead Valley from Kingswood to How Lane for 'a development of high density housing'. That seems to have come to almost nought, apart from a handful of houses along Outwood Lane. adjacent to Kingswood Village pictured, left, below:





A short distance away from Kingswood lies Tadworth. Richard Costain and Sons Ltd spotted an opportunity when the Tadworth Court Estate came up for sale in 1924. The manor house and 100 acres of the grounds were sold to The Hospital For Sick Children in 1925 and the remaining grounds developed for housing commencing in 1926. The photo on the right, is of Shelvers Way in Tadworth. The building style and detailing strongly resembles the dwellings which we now see in Norfolk and Arundel Avenues.

Richard Costain and Sons Ltd were a very busy company in the late 1920s and 1930s. As well as Kingswood, Tadworth and Selsdon the company built 1,500 houses at Sudbury, 5,000 homes at Elm Park in Hornchurch and 1,500 at Dagenham. At Cricklewood (1,500 Homes) just south of the A406 and Brent Reservoir, can be found Ballards, Selsdon, Crest, Rylandes, Tadworth and Byron Roads.







Costains' Houses in Liverpool

What might have been?

With their acquisition of land in Selsdon Costains were the owners of Gee Wood, Littleheath and Foxearth Wood. An early plan for Croham Heights proposed a road parallel with the top section of Littleheath Road, running from Foxearth Road between what are now Nos 45 and 47 Foxearth, up into Littleheath Woods and rejoining Littleheath Road at around what is now number 130. This would have added a further 80 or so building plots to their Selsdon / Croham Heights development. There were discussions with the then Urban District Council and a Planning Enquiry held, with the result that Costains agreed to sell their 40 acres of mixed woodland for £5,250 on the basis that the cost was split between Croydon Council, and Coulsdon and Purley Urban District Council with the remaining third share to be funded by Public Subscription. Costains abandoned their planned development and, eventually in 1932 Littleheath Woods was officially opened by Lord

Dickinson, Chairman of the Metropolitan Gardens Association, who had contributed some £700 to the eventual purchase price of £5,700. Littleheath Woods was saved.





E: I suppose that's a good time to ask about inspiration, where do you get the ideas from?

M: All over really, but some I honestly couldn't tell you. One like Mojoe And The Regal Beagle Ball is clearly inspired by the family dogs.

E: How do you write them?

M: In parts mostly, although it varies. Most start with a core idea like Mojoe And The Regal Beagle Ball – a global banquet of all the noble beagles from around the world meeting for a grand banquet, then add a mystery or a pinch of drama and I'm half way there.

E: I think you have been doing some work with local schools? **M:** Indeed, they have been great fun. I realised that Mojoe is such a strong character, a super hero female rabbit, that she could help inspire young people to want to read and write. I did some research into what KS1 covers and came up with a fun lesson plan. We look at sentence openers and 'wow words', then use the ideas to encourage a piece of independent writing.



E: How have they gone?

M: It been incredible, they are so rewarding and fun, the output in terms of the writing has been amazing, plus the teacher feedback has been superb. I have also been privileged to run some sessions in a specialist school in Croydon which were amazing too. Hats off to anybody in the teaching profession, I don't know how you make the magic happen in the classroom every day!

E: I think you have started to develop some merchandise too? **M:** That's right, from one book to two, now we have jigsaws, colouring books and tote bags too, the latter thanks to the wonderfully talented Beth!

E: What is the one thing you have learnt?

M: To be honest, I am learning every day, about marketing, social media and early years literacy, but I suppose the big thing is if you have an idea and something you believe in, go for it!

E: How can people find out more?

M: So, to start, both books are now listed in the Croydon libraries, so

Time to Check your Hot Water Bottles

As the temperatures drop, many of us will be getting out our hot water bottles to warm our colder beds, but they do not last forever. There have been many reported instances of skin burns due to old hot water bottles bursting. But what can you do if you cannot remember when you bought your hot water bottle?

To check the date on a hot water bottle, look for a flower-shaped symbol on the neck or body of the bottle:

- Number in the middle: The year the bottle was made
- Flower segments: The 12 months of the year
- Dots inside: The number of weeks in the month the bottle was made



Look at the example in the photo, the number in the middle is 22 and two segments have dots, so, the bottle was made in the middle of February 2022.

Hot water bottles typically last about two/three years, but the risk of damage increases after that. Old hot water bottles can break and cause serious burns because the rubber or plastic deteriorates over time. With a bottle over two years old, check for other signs of wear and tear, such as thinning around the belly of the bottle, cracks and creases.

Filling Your Hot Water Bottle

Step 1

Check that there are no obvious signs of damage. Cracks and tears can be very dangerous when pouring hot water in.

Step 2

Once you are happy that the hot water bottle is safe to use, unscrew the stopper and pour out any water left in inside.

Step 3

Fill with boiling water that has been allowed to cool down to a safe temperature. Do not use boiling water as this can damage the seams of the bottle and also adds to the risk of burns. It is also important not to use the hot tap water as it may contain impurities which can degrade the bottle. These impurities are removed during the boiling process.

Step 4

Slowly squeeze the remaining air out of the hot water bottle so that the water level rises to just below the top.

Step 5

Now screw back on the stopper making sure it's tight.

Step 6

Finally use a towel or dish cloth to dry the hot water bottle and the stopper.

Step 7


Your hot water bottle is now ready to use!

Other safety points to consider:

Purchase the right hot water bottle for your needs. These days hot water bottles come in all shapes and sizes, and are made from a variety of different materials. For general warmth, a large, traditional bottle might be called for. If relief of sore muscles is the primary objective, a flexible bean or gel-filled bag might be a better option.



Avoid direct contact between a hot water bottle and skin. The correct use is to wrap a cloth around it or place it in a hot water bottle holder. The extra material prevents scalding and also acts as further insulation to keep the bag warmer for longer. They should also not be leaned against or placed anywhere that results in direct pressure being placed on the bag. To warm a bed or sleeping bag, place the hot water bottle (or two) under the covers before crawling in to sleep. It's not safe to keep the hot water bottle in bed while sleeping because of the risk of rolling over onto it and causing it to explode from excess pressure. Never sit or lie on a hot water bottle!

Children and babies should never be left alone with a hot water bottle, and bottles should not be placed directly on a child's skin. For use warming a child's bed, remove the hot water bottle before the child enters the bed to avoid unintentional burns or accidents. Always check the temperature of a hot water bottle to be used with children. Their skin is more sensitive than the skin of an adult and a lower temperature can be more appropriate.

After each use, it's important to empty the hot water bottle and hang upside down to dry. Only once the inside is completely dry should it be folded and stored in a dark, dry location. Exposure to excess sunlight can result in cracks, while storing a wet hot water bottle can result in the growth of mould inside the bottle.

Hot water bottles have been used and enjoyed for centuries. Taking the time to use one correctly can result in a better experience and a longer shelf life for your hot water bottle.

I have recently attended an Open Day at the Croydon Airport Visitor Centre, Airport House, Purley Way and never realised what an important part Croydon Airport played in the field of aviation. London Croydon Airport

London Croydon Airport became Britain's international airport on 29 March 1920. During the interwar period it became one of the world's busiest international airports. It was Britain's sole air terminus for the

establishment of its first intercontinental air routes as they reached out across the globe.



The magnificent terminal building, opened in 1928, set a new standard for air travel. It was the world's biggest and most advanced airport. In 1978, the terminal building and Gate Lodge were Grade II listed.

Where it all started

Croydon Airport's history began during World War I. Formerly known as Royal Flying Corps Beddington Aerodrome, it was rapidly constructed in December 1915 as one of the airfields to defend London from German airship and bomber attack.

During 1918, Beddington Aerodrome became an RAF flying training establishment. National Aircraft Factory No.1 with Waddon Aerodrome was built next door to Beddington Aerodrome, mass producing aircraft for the allied war effort.

At the end of World War I, the two airfields of Beddington and Waddon merged to form Croydon Aerodrome. In March 1920 the temporary London



Airport at Hounslow Heath was closed and operations were moved to the larger Croydon Aerodrome. Britain's first national airline, Imperial Airways, was formed at Croydon in 1924. Imperial Airways was the forerunner to today's British Airways.

World Leading Innovation

The high level of airliner traffic at Croydon Aerodrome saw the need to ensure the safety of airline operations. The unique utilisation of the new radio technology at Croydon gave rise to the British innovation of Air Traffic Control. These techniques were later adopted by other international airports around the world and still underpin the safety of global air travel today.

The First, the Fastest & the Famous

Amy Johnson inspired millions of women around the world with her 1930 record breaking solo flight from Croydon to Australia. In her return, Amy was welcomed by tens of thousands of people.

In 1929, Charles Kingsford-Smith set a record flying time from Australia to the UK landing at Croydon after 12 days and 14 hours. Sydney's International Airport is named after Kingsford-Smith.

International Gateway

Croydon remained the UK's international gateway until the outbreak of the Second World War when the airport became RAF Croydon, a Battle of Britain airfield. It later became the base for the newly formed RAF Transport Command.

Croydon Airport returned to civilian use in 1946 with the return of some international airlines, although by this time Heathrow was designated London's international airport. As other London airports continued to grow the decision was made to close Croydon Airport. The last flight left on 30 September 1959.

Visitor Centre

The Croydon Airport Visitor Centre is a volunteer led community venture and opened in 2000. Exhibition space includes displays in the world's oldest Air Traffic Control Tower in Airport House. Features include interactive displays, exhibits and visual images charting its history.

Even if you, have an ostrich mentality, (no more bad news please or this boat will rapidly sink or rather, my spirit will), the joy of going outside on a wonderful, sunny day that this autumn can sometimes give us, can only cheer one up immensely.

On a day like this, the sunshine is so warm that coats do not seem necessary. All one really needs is a phone to take photos on, to capture the sunshine lighting up the glorious blaze of autumn colour.



Today I walked around Sanderstead Recreation Ground. It has a nice level path the whole way around it. The little Japanese flowering trees appeared to be of three different types as their leaves were in three different colours and they edge what was the old bowling green. The colours of the trees in this park were overwhelming. We expect trees to have yellow or bronze coloured leaves with bits of rust or brown and maybe a flash of

red, but today there were few like that. The number of trees with at least four different coloured leaves on the one tree was unbelievable. ABDUCTION

The disorderly wind tore through the woods, roughly detaching leaves that pranced, aimlessly, in the turbulent air.

Slaves to the tempest, they whirled wildly on their unwilled passage to earth.

Carelessly abandoned, on the woodland floor, they found temporary respite, until the relentless gusts raised them aloft to repeat their Dervish dance.

Finally, as the breathless wind collapsed, they settled in a muddy pool which seized them in its sticky graspheld them fast when the next blast blew destined to decay and to nourish the wood that had spawned them.

Nature Notes from Ted Forsyth – More Autumn Fungi

The wet Autumn has given us a bumper year for fungi so Ted has given us another article about the fungi you might find in our woods. If tempted to go on your own fungal foray, I would advise downloading an identification guide beforehand. Please forward any photos of fungi that you spot to the gazette.

With the increase in rainfall this autumn there has been a surge in the reporting of fungi appearing in various parts of Selsdon Wood. More Beefsteaks, over a dozen, were found this year than in any previous

year. (See photo on right - Sticky and gruesome, beefsteak is a woodland fungus with the disconcerting appearance of a raw cut of meat. It even oozes a blood-like substance when cut!)

Middle Gorse produced Pestle Puffballs and Amethyst Deceivers. A Snowy Waxcap in Stevens Walk suggests that conditions might be right at last for a potential show of several other waxcaps. Waxcaps (see photo on left) are familiar-shaped fungi that are often brightly-coloured with a waxy or slippery-looking





cap. Most years recently we have been lucky if we found one waxcap species but our best year produced 8 or 9. The best places to look are probably David's Crook and the north end of Great Field. They could be joined by Dusky Puffball, Yellow Fieldcap, Brownedge Bonnet, and more.

Sulphur Tufts are widespread and Brick Tuft has been seen regularly. They are gregarious and tend to appear in large groups so tightly packed that the caps are unable to expand. They are saprobic, feeding on dead wood, logs and stumps, most often birch. Sheathed Woodtuft usually appears in Leafy Grove where the various tree stumps are worth examining for a range of species. Noakes Way will usually produce Oak Pin and Upright Coral, and has been one of the areas for Beefsteak. Old decaying Sweet Chestnut husks support the tiny brown mushrooms Rustroemia echinophylla (sorry no accepted common name), but several husks might have to be examined before finding any of the mushrooms. Common Earthballs are found in many parts of the wood but one associated species, Parasitic Bolete, which grows on them, has not yet been recorded in Selsdon Wood, though I have seen

Turkeytail (see photo on the right) is a common bracket fungus. It forms semi-circular caps on stumps and fallen wood. The caps are thin and tough, with very clear, velvety, concentric rings of colour, but there are other species with somewhat similar characteristics. Smoky Bracket looks similar until a piece is turned over to show the smoky grey

them on Croham Hurst and Coulsdon Common.

colouring rather than the white of the Turkeytail. Yellowing Curtain Crust is much brighter with yellowish or orange colouring. Crimped Gill has gills rather than the fine pores of the previous three species, and the gills grow in a distorted pattern. Another species with somewhat distorted gills is Splitgill, which is not usually as numerous as the other similar species.



Lifting a small fallen branch or a piece of bark, particularly if damp, will sometimes reveal Green Elfcups (see photo on the left), the dots of yellow-coloured Lemon Disco, or the white or greyish dots of Snowy Disco or Grey Disco.

Chicken of the Woods is a yellow bracket fungus usually found in clumps on standing or fallen trees in the summer but could still be found now. Other bracket fungi, such as Shaggy Bracket, can be

found as single specimens rather than clumps and are often high up on the trunk of a standing tree.

There are many cap-and-stem fungi which form a close relationship with particular trees and will appear near them if conditions are right – False Chanterelles and various boletes with Larch, Fly Agaric with Birch, many species with Beech or Oak.

Every year we seem to find a new species in the wood. Did we find any on the Fungus Walk on Sat 26 October?


