COUNCILLORS' NOTES

Protecting our green spaces

The Council has published its plans for green spaces and these will be agreed at the meeting of the Council's Cabinet on 21st October 2019. Many residents put forward suggestions for green spaces that should be protected but sadly, only five in Selsdon have been afforded protection under the current plans. These are:

Ashen Grove – Local natural open space Selsdon Recreation Ground – Town park The Ruffet – Local natural open space Freelands Ave on junction with Tedder Road – Local Green Space Palace Green – Local Green Space

Whilst it is great that some areas now have more protection, it is a shame the opportunity was not taken to protect more green spaces in Selsdon. Suggested areas that have not been given protection as green spaces include Foxearth Spinney and the green space on Croham Valley Road.

More worryingly, the Council is considering the option of dedesignating areas of green belt (i.e. removing green belt status so the land can be developed). Three areas are being considered and these are;

- ▷ Land at Borrowdale Drive/Mitchley Hill in Sanderstead
- ▷ Land at Gravel Hill (behind Monks Hill)
- ▷ Land at Lodge Lane, near New Addington

We will oppose all plans to remove areas of green belt in Croydon. With the increasing number of people living in our borough, green space will become even more precious so we would need more, not less.

Selsdon Community Day

This is being held on 9th November and we will report back on how it goes in the next Gazette. This is the next step towards the development of Selsdon's Community Plan is to <u>gather</u> <u>residents' views on the priorities for Selsdon</u>. The aim is for a first draft of the plan to be published in Spring 2020.

Christmas Market for Selsdon

As mentioned in October's Gazette, we have established that the raised slip road to the north of the high street (Broadway) is Council property and, as such, we can use this space for a Christmas Market. Plans for the market are going well and it is scheduled to take place on **Saturday 30th November 12-4pm**. Look forward to seeing you there!

Editor notes - The following article from your MP refers to 'a group of Residents' Associations' - The SRA is not a part of their DEMOC campaign, believing residents can choose to join and support it individually: as the SRA is a non-political organisation, the committee decided its direct support would be inappropriate.

MP CHRIS PHILP SAYS... End Croydon's planning mayhem

Many of us are in despair at the way Croydon Council's planning committee is granting almost every planning application that comes before it – especially destroying family homes and replacing them with blocks of flats. Neighbouring councils Bromley and Sutton do not do this, and there is nothing in national planning policy that means Croydon has to.

Of course we need more homes for young people – but new flats should be built in town centres and brownfield sites. Destroying family homes, as Croydon is choosing to do, means that there will not be enough homes for future families and it is in danger of changing the character of the neighbourhood.

I totally oppose what the council is doing. So do Residents Associations and thousands of residents. Residents' Associations, local councillors, people living here and I have all tried so hard to make the council listen over the last few years. I have arranged petitions, personally objected to dozens of the worst applications, we have organised demonstrations at the Town Hall and I have met with the council leader repeatedly to plead the case.

But the Labour-run council just ignores us, time after time. They do this because they can keep control of the Town Hall based on just a few marginal seats (called Wards) in the centre of the Borough. So they ignore everyone else, including our area. There is only one way left to fix this.

A group of Residents Associations from across the Borough wants to fix this by changing the way Croydon is run to a Directly Elected Executive Mayor – where we directly elect an executive mayor. This means all our votes would count equally wherever they are cast, and whoever runs the Town Hall will have to listen to everyone across the Borough if they want to win. If about 14,000 signatures are collected, the council legally <u>has</u> to hold a referendum on adopting a Directly Elected Mayor. If the referendum is positive, then the council is <u>obliged</u> to implement a Directly Elected Mayor. Four London Boroughs have done this already. It would work like a mini Mayor of London, but for Croydon.

I am fully supporting this campaign – because changing the way Croydon is run is the only way to make the Town Hall listen to us. Please go the Residents Group's website (detailed below) and donate to their campaign and/or download their petition sheet (it has to be done on paper). When you have downloaded the petition sheet, please get as many of your neighbours to sign as possible and post it back to the campaign at the address they give.

We are all sick of being ignored by the council and watching them ram through planning applications against residents wishes virtually every week. This is now the only way to stop the council doing this. Please join me in supporting the Residents Association's campaign. This is really important because otherwise the Council will just keep on ignoring us all.

SPOT THE STREET CLEANER - A TALE OF INACTION, CONFUSION AND FRUSTRATION

No, relax, not another children's book written by a 'celebrity' or member of Royalty.

Back in April of this year your Residents' Association, the SRA, debated at their committee meeting the perceived absence of street cleaning vehicles generally in the Selsdon area. This was prompted by my sighting earlier in the day of one of the Council's little vehicles with the rotary brushes trying to clean the junction of Littleheath and Foxearth Roads. Due to the number of parked cars adjacent to the junction the clean was perfunctory at best. Discussion amongst the committee revealed that most were sceptical that our roads were regularly being cleaned by the Council. I agreed to raise a Freedom Of Information (FOI) request with Croydon Council to find out at what dates the roads in my area were cleaned. The intention was to ascertain whether the roads were not being cleaned or that perhaps cleaning was taking place and no-one on the Committee had noticed. If the former then the SRA would take up the matter on behalf of the residents.

I submitted a FOI request to the Council to 'provide the dates when the following Selsdon roads were cleaned since 1/1/18: Foxearth, Littleheath, Queenhill, Rylandes and Brent Roads and confirm what is the anticipated frequency of cleaning going forward' on 17th April 2019 and received formal notice of receipt from the Council on 26th April. The Council have 20 working days in which to respond to FOI requests. By the 30th May I had not had a response and so in frustration sent a chase email to the Council FOI team. Nil response to that also. I then involved our Councillors and their ministrations still resulted in a silence from the Council until, out of the blue, I received an official response to my original FOI request on 11th September 2019.

"The new street cleansing contract started in March 2018. We

do not hold this information prior to that. Since March 2018 the cleaning schedule has been as follows:

Foxearth Road - Friday 16/03/18 then every 2 weeks following. Last cleansed 30/08/19.

Littleheath Road – Monday 26/03/19 then every 4th week following. Last cleansed 19/08/19.

Queenhill Road (1 to 31) - Wed 28/03/18 then every 4th week following. Last cleansed 28/08/19.

Queenhill Road (30 to 55) - Mon 26/03/19 then every 4^{th} week following. Last cleansed 19/08/19.

Rylandes Road – Monday 26/03/19 then every 4th week following. Last cleansed 19/08/19.

Brent Road - Monday 26/03/19 then every 4th week following. Last cleansed 19/08/19."

There were also additional dates when the roads were cleaned which appear to have been as the result of 'specific requests'. I have submitted a follow up FOI request seeking clarification of the 'specific requests'. This FOI has been acknowledged and the Council expect to send a response by 10th October.

I am not sure whether the commencement of cleaning dates of March 2019 for Littleheath, Queenhill (30 to 55), Rylandes and Brent Roads are typos.

I have submitted a further FOI request to cover the cleaning timetable for all roads within the SRA area. At the time of writing, 19th October, and with one chase up email I have not had acknowledgement of the request.

So, it appears that Foxearth Road is cleansed every 2 weeks with the others at 4 week intervals. There may be ad hoc cleansing as the result of 'Specific Requests'. If you do not see the streets being cleaned or you feel the cleaning is not adequate then we would urge you to please make a complaint to Croydon Council. They would prefer you use their 'Don't

ANOTHER GOOD NEIGHBOUR

It was interesting to read Phil Munton's item in the May edition of the Selsdon Gazette, about his days at Selsdon Primary School. Although we never met we were both living in Selsdon at the same time, so have common memories of those long gone times. It was of particular interest for me to see that one of his best friends at Selsdon School was Simon Noakes. Now that brings back memories!

The Queen's Coronation was in 1952 and was the event at which I first saw a television programme. And I was not the only one!

We had new next door neighbours by then, a young family, the Noakes. Mr Noakes had been an army Captain during the war, out in the Far East, was captured and spent time in a Japanese prisoner of war camp. His souvenir of those dreadful years was a Japanese Samurai type sword. Of more importance locally, was that he became the Captain of Selsdon Cricket Club's Sunday XI. The team's home ground was in Selsdon Rec at the back of our houses.

As a young and affluent couple ahead of the times, the Noakes had a TV set. Being good neighbours they had an open house to watch the Coronation. As you might imagine, it was standing room only to watch this small, flickering screen! At about this time, young Simon Noakes was born. My Mum became their baby sitter, so on several Saturday evenings when Mr and Mrs N were out socialising, I got the opportunity to accompany my Mum next door and watch the BBC News on TV. How exciting was that!

It was some years before my Dad got our first television. This was after the new ITV channel went on air, and which made television viewing more popular, and hence TV sets more affordable. However they were still expensive to buy, and repair, so most would hire a TV. Ours was hired from Forbes

& Co, radio and electrical engineers, with a shop in Addington Rd. It was possibly the popularity of TV hire that caused the demise of Selsdon's other shop, J.H. Radio.

J.H Radio was one of the original shops in Selsdon, before television took off. And as the name implied, it sold and repaired radios, or as they were more commonly known – wireless sets. The shop also doubled up as Selsdon's bicycle shop. In the early 1950s, when new bikes again became available after wartime shortages, I remember standing outside and drooling over the must-have bike of the time, the Raleigh Lenton Sport.

The location of J.H is shown below. It was the last shop at the left hand side of the row. In the 1940/50s Barclay's Bank was only half its present size, the right hand half. To the left of J.H was an area of waste ground with the Air Raid Warden's Post and fire control water tank. Now this waste ground is more shops.

To the right of the bank (now Selsdon Stationers) was Marsh's – a sweetshop, toy shop and tobacconists. As you might imagine it was the most important shop in Selsdon for us young children, especially at Christmas time. More about this in the future – perhaps for the December 2019 Selsdon Gazette!



But returning to our good next door neighbours, the Noakes.

When they first moved in next door, life was still subject to food rationing. Mrs Noakes came from a farming family and on returning from a visit to the farm she brought us back a lovely rabbit. Not a live one, but one for the cooking pot!

It was harvest time and one of the year's best times for a bit of shooting. I had often seen this in Selsdon Wood. During and after the war, the areas of grass land (for example adjacent to the car park at the Farley Rd entrance) were used for growing wheat or perhaps it was grass for horses, still then commonly used for pulling carts.

At harvest time the system was to start off cutting the wheat or grass on the outside edges of the fields, and continue spiralling in towards the centre. In amongst the crops would be rabbits, which at some time would make a run for it. However, around the ever diminishing area of wheat/grass, were the men with guns, waiting of course for some ration free meat! So the rabbits brought to us by Mrs Noakes, and the rabbit stew that followed, were a most welcome gift from our good, next door neighbour.

Heather Govier notes - The Noakes family have an even longer history in Selsdon. In 1899 Selsdon Park and farmlands (the original estate which included the grounds of the Selsdon Park Hotel and Selsdon Wood) was sold to Wickham Noakes, a brewer, under a mortgage that remained until his death in 1923. During this period there was a grand shoot each year in November to mark Noakes' birthday and a gamekeeper, William Westall, was employed to manage the land for shooting. Around this time Ordnance Survey maps show a 'Pheasantry' (where the young birds were raised) on the estate, situated on the western side of Old Farleigh Road, probably close to where Ravenshead Close now lies. One of the paths in Selsdon Wood is named Noakes way in the memory of Wickham Noakes.

NATURE NOTES - How large is a bird's territory?

A walk through woodland in winter will often give the impression that most of the small birds have vanished. There might be small flocks of Redwings and Fieldfares which are "on holiday" from colder climates, or Siskins and Redpolls which have moved from other parts of this country. The first two are thrushes which will feed on berries in the woodland but will also move out to farmland. The second pair are finches, often feeding amongst the treetops, or dangling from birch and alder trees, sometimes in the company of Goldfinches which have gathered in flocks. The local tits - Blue, Great, Coal, Marsh and Long-tailed - also gather in mixed flocks and roam the woodland looking for food. The numbers of local birds are likely to be boosted by birds which have come in from the continent, and the flock can contain other species such as Nuthatch, Treecreeper, Great Spotted and Lesser Spotted Woodpecker and possibly Goldcrests.

Around the edges of the wood there are gardens in some of which there will be bird feeders and it does not take long for the various flocks to discover them. The winter territory often centres on these feeding stations though the birds will still make use of what the wood has to offer. Trying to estimate the number of birds visiting a garden can only ever give a rough figure. I remember reading many years ago of one gentleman who thought he had a few dozen Siskins coming to his garden until he began catching and ringing them – his final estimate was several hundred!

Territory is most obvious when birds are nesting and searching for food for their young. In very early spring the numbers of birds entering gardens to feed might even increase as it becomes less easy to find food in the wood; but as buds burst and caterpillars begin to appear many birds will tend to concentrate more on a territory around their nesting area.

Small birds like tits, Wrens, Dunnocks, and Robins will not

need to stray far from the nest to find food though some will still make use of gardens. Treecreepers have a more specialised diet and will search the bark on many trees to find insects and their eggs, invertebrates and other small prey. Nuthatches, which are happy to hack open nuts when they are abundant, will switch to other prey, possibly competing with Treecreepers for what they can find hidden in the crevices on tree trunks. Bullfinches, which as adults tend to feed on buds, will feed their young on insects and other invertebrates.

Mistle Thrushes, as their name suggests, will feed on mistletoe berries but this can never be a large part of their diet and they will have to forage for food elsewhere, taking berries from rowan trees and others but also feeding on farmland and short grass areas where they will find earthworms. Blackbirds and Song Thrushes occupy territories where there is leaf litter and they can often be found turning over the leaves in search of food, including earthworms, but the Song Thrush has a particular liking for snails which it will take to a hard surface which it will use as an anvil to break open the shell to get at the meat inside.

lackdaws nest on buildings or in hollow trees and will search for food in grassy areas before the grass has grown too long. Alternatively they will fly miles to farmland which has been ploughed and can gather in guite large numbers. A pair of Carrion Crows will nest at the top of a tree, usually well separated from others of the same species, but in winter and early spring they can fly long distances to form flocks of 80 or 90 birds, possibly more of a social gathering than as an aid to finding food. Magpies will form large winter roosts containing hundreds of birds but will disperse over an area to look for food. Though Jays are also corvids they tend to be more secretive, remaining mainly in the wood where they nest and where they collect acorns which they store for later use by burying them singly in various places, hoping to retrieve them when necessary but inevitably leaving some in the ground to produce a new oak sapling.

They feed on a huge range of items including voles, mice, shrews, small birds, earthworms, beetles, frogs – whatever is available in their particular area. Barn Owls will nest and roost in farm buildings or in large hollow trees and will hunt over several hundred square metres to find their mammal prey. Little Owls tend to hunt from a perch from which they will drop on to their small prey on the ground and will return to the same nesting and roosting area which can be occupied for many years by a succession of birds.

While the Tawny Owl rules the woodland by night the Sparrowhawk takes over during the day. Its territory can occupy the whole wood, including nearby hedgerows, and garden bird feeders are not exempt from their attention.

In general a bird's territory is determined by a combination of the bird's size, its method of feeding, the type of prey items, and whether it has special feeding requirements (e.g. Treecreeper on tree trunks) or is able to feed on a wide range of food, and the type of local habitat (coniferous woodland, deciduous woodland, mixed woodland, the presence of fields and hedgerows).

Croydon's recycling - finally an answer!

As you saw in our last edition, back in June I asked the Council what happens to Croydon's plastic recycling after it's been collected. I have now had a response (with thanks to Cllr Helen Pollard for chasing on my behalf). It seems to be good news!

Croydon is part of the 'South London Waste Partnership' which take 80% of the collected Plastic to a special recycling facility run by Veolia in Kent where it is sorted by hand and by machine to separate the types of recycling. Lasers then sort the plastics by colour and type (there are over 50 different types of plastic). These different types of plastic are baled then sent to various processing places, some in the UK, some in the EU. The plastic is then shredded, melted and reformed into pellets for re-use. According to the SLWP website (slwp.org.uk) "every end destination is visited, audited and accredited by Veolia to ensure the materials are fully recycled". The other 20% of Croydon's plastic goes to other UK re-processors to sort and sell on. I sent another email to Croydon asking if the 20% is also audited and been assured that by the Council representative that "All of our waste has a full audit trail and is sent for re-processing within Europe."

I was also told my idea mentioned in the Gazette last month for bigger signage for the 'charity re-use area' at the recycling centres or even allowing volunteer charity representatives to aid the process, "has been forwarded to the Lead Policy and Promotions Manager to look into and action".

I have set up a contact point for the next 3 months. It will be a trial 3 months, once a month for an hour I will be setting up shop in Coughlans Bakery, Featherbed Lane, Holmbury Grove, CRO 9AR. I will be there:

You can come visit me and chat about anything you like. Crime prevention advice, report any crimes, suspicious activity or anything worrying you. If after the 3 months we feel it's not having the impact we would like or there is no interest we will stop. But hopefully this will just be another way to meet some of you face to face and just engage with you more.

Motor vehicle crime in general is a problem right now, be that number plate theft, catalytic converter theft or theft of the motor vehicle itself. So, do keep an eye out around your local areas, keep valuables out of sight and keep us up to date with any suspicious activity you see.

To prevent your catalytic converters being stolen my advice would be to park in well-lit areas, watch out for people working under cars especially at night time and I suggest etching your registration number into your catalytic converter as a deterrent. This is because some scrapyards ask for proof of ID meaning they couldn't sell on your catalytic converter.

To prevent number plate theft (used to rack up speeding, parking fines and steal petrol/diesel from the petrol station etc.) you can buy and install screws that will make it harder for them to be stolen, which I would highly recommend.

Hope this is helpful for you.

Recipe - Speedy soup

If the weather gets cold and wintry this'll give you a warming hit of heat.

2 whole fresh chillies (but really it's down to how spicy you want your soup), splash of oil, 2 sticks of celery, 1 onion, 2 ½ tsp cumin, 400g tin of chopped tomatoes, pinch of sugar, 400g tin of chickpeas, 600ml stock (it's up to you which type you use), lemon juice from half a lemon, 2 tbsp. chopped parsley.

- Finely chop your onion, celery and chillies. It's up to you whether you take the chillies' seeds out, leave a few in, or (if you're feeling brave) leave them all in. (I take most of them out, but I'm not too particular about it so I don't mind if a few strays find their way in.)
- 2) Fry that all in a big pan with a bit of oil. It doesn't need to brown it just needs to soften.
- 3) Once everything's soft, sprinkle in your cumin and keep frying for around a minute.
- 4) After that throw in your tomatoes, sugar, chickpeas and stock.
