As our 100th year draws to a close, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have voluntarily contributed their time and effort to help make it a success. I will not name names specifically in case I omit anyone, but we are very grateful to all those who helped with

the research for the historical displays, the displays themselves, the guided walks, 'gardening' of the railing troughs, planters and the Selsdon Community Garden - including the spreading of a large load of wood chips around some new plants there. Celebrations will continue into 2026 – watch for details on Facebook, our website, the Gazette, etc.

Over Wintering of the SRA's Geraniums

Talking of volunteers, it is now the time for me to ask again for help in trying to keep our geraniums from the planters and troughs over the winter, so perhaps we will not have to buy quite so many, next year. We do not hold anyone responsible if the plants don't survive but, if you do have a frost-free place where you could try to keep a few for us, it would very helpful – there are only so many I can fit on my window sill! They need hardly any attention during the winter, so you don't need to be a skilled gardener; just pick off leaves as they die back and give them a little water once every 4- 6 weeks, until they show signs of regrowth in the spring. A spare corner in a sunny greenhouse, conservatory or porch - or a window sill in a fairly cool room is the only space you need. Please let me know (use 07979 002547, but by text, so I don't delete it as an unknown caller!) if you can take on a few for me.

Christmas Lights and Switch-On Event

The SRA are hoping to round off our centenary year with a new set of Selsdon Christmas lights. They, the electricity and the switch-on event are not funded by the council but only by the SRA funds, augmented by your donations and those from some of our traders. We appreciate everyone's

support but we do usually have a shortfall, so please be as generous as you can when you see a collecting tin or when paying your subs and/or donation. Or you can donate by registering to support Selsdon Christmas Lights on Easyfunding - without paying a penny! They simply pay a small proportion to us, of what you spend with a lot of different online traders including Sainsburys, M&S, John Lewis, Tui, and many others. The pennies do soon make a tidy sum, so please sign up!

The lights will be switched on as usual by Father Christmas as he checks out Selsdon (courtesy of a sleigh loaned by the Sanderstead and Selsdon Rotary Club) to find out if all the children are well behaved before his big delivery night! Anyway, do come along to give him a cheer on Friday 28th November at 5pm and to meet him afterwards. Greenvale Primary School Choir will be singing outside the Village Club from about 4.40pm.

News in the Selsdon Area

Away from SRA activities, we always try to keep an eye on what is happening in our area.

As I write, we have again reported the failed traffic lights to TfL and to our MP in the hope they will be repaired more quickly than last time. The SRA also attend the East Surrey Transport Committee on your behalf and are constantly raising the issues of the 433 buses being turned around short of East Croydon or Selsdon Vale, and the illogical diversions of buses in the Selsdon, Sanderstead & Purley areas, so we hope things might improve. Lastly, to make a change from questions about Birch (we have again been assured there are no asylum seekers there and no plans to house them there), we see that there are plans for Wetherspoons to open a pub at Coombe Lodge. It seems it is due to open on 10th December. We do not know if it is to include a Wetherspoons hotel too which could be why they are opening a pub in a location with no immediate access to public transport to get home. As long as it is an extra location and not instead of our Wetherspoons!

COUNCILLORS' NOTES FROM JOSEPH LEE

SELSDON PARK ROAD RESURFACING

Residents have welcomed the recent resurfacing on Selsdon Park Road, part of Croydon Council's £12.5 million Highways Investment Programme approved in 2024.

The works, which took place near Nos. 191–213 earlier this year, were aimed at improving the road surface and reducing wear and tear. The smoother surface has already made a noticeable difference for local drivers.

ABANDONED VEHICLE ENFORCEMENT

Mayor Perry has taken a firm, no-nonsense stance on abandoned, untaxed and unroadworthy vehicles that blight neighbourhoods across Croydon. His zero-tolerance approach has seen the council issue Community Protection Notices, deployed CCTV, and carry out the rapid removal and destruction of vehicles left for long periods on public roads. For example, in Thornton Heath, vehicles that were unregistered, without MOTs, and blocking parking spaces were removed and destroyed after prior warnings went unheeded. The goal, he says, is to 'restore pride in Croydon's streets' and make sure residents aren't left dealing with rusting cars, blocked parking and antisocial behaviour in their own neighbourhoods.

NEW BUSINESS OPENING ON THE HIGH STREET

We welcome a new business to the High Street, where Dawat Indian & Pakistani Restaurant and Takeaway is preparing to open its doors. Dawat, which already operates several successful branches across London, is known for its authentic Indian cuisine, elegant interiors and warm service. The Selsdon branch is currently being fitted out and is expected to open very soon – a welcome addition that's sure to spice up the local dining scene.

A warm welcome in advance to Dawat and best wishes for their upcoming launch. It's great to see new businesses choosing Selsdon as their next home.

CLEARING HISTORIC FINANCIAL BACKLOG

For the first time in years, Croydon Council's accounts have been officially approved. This is an important step in fixing the financial problems the council faced in the past. When the previous Labour administration was in charge, Croydon got into serious financial trouble and even went bankrupt – the only council in London to do so. Large amounts of money were lost on failed projects such as Brick by Brick, and the council's accounts couldn't be signed off for several years.

Since Jason Perry became Mayor in 2022, the council has been working to sort out its finances, rebuild trust and ensure everything is properly managed. Getting the accounts signed off shows that real progress has been made and that Croydon is finally back on track.

MP Natasha Irons' Report Member of Parliament for Croydon East

Dear Selsdon.

Lloyds Bank has announced plans to close its New Addington branch on 14 January 2026. This decision follows the closures of Santander on North End and NatWest on Lower Addiscombe Road and in the Whitgift Centre. As some of you will know, when I pushed for a banking hub in Selsdon last year to improve access to banking services, LINK – the independent organisation that assesses cash access – stated that one wasn't needed because there was a bank in New Addington. But now, that very bank is being shut.

The assessment carried out by LINK was incomplete. It was stopped at stage two after LINK identified nearby cashpoints. However, they did not assess the impact on residents with disabilities, elderly people, small business owners or the time it takes for Selsdon and New Addington residents to travel into Croydon town centre.

It is unacceptable that such an important decision has been taken by Lloyds without a proper impact assessment. That's why I have appealed to LINK, asking them to redo their assessment and recommend that New Addington gets a banking hub. I have also met with Lloyds Bank to raise my concerns and will be meeting with LINK shortly. I'll keep you updated on the outcome of my campaign.

Residents have also been in touch about the Selsdon Garage site on Addington Road. In April, Croydon Council confirmed plans to demolish the existing garage and build a six-storey development with 35 flats and a ground-floor commercial unit. My office was informed that work would begin in August, but this has not yet happened. I have written to the developers for an update and will share details as soon as I receive a response.

I'm pleased to announce that Croydon will benefit from the Government's Inactivity Trailblazer scheme, which will provide targeted support to help more people into work. Unlike traditional employment programmes, this scheme gives local areas the power to design solutions that tackle the root causes of economic inactivity, such as poor mental health, low skills and social isolation.

Support on offer will include help with CV preparation, employer engagement to create job opportunities, mental health and confidence-building support, and initiatives linked to local growth plans.

This is fantastic news for Croydon. It means more people will receive the tailored support they need to rebuild confidence and find meaningful work – especially young people looking to take their first steps into employment.

By the time this column goes to print, I will have hosted my Selsdon coffee morning at Forestdale Forum. I hold these events regularly across the constituency to give residents the chance to speak with me face to face about their local concerns and priorities.



Update from our Local Police

This month the team have been working proactively to carry out hot spot area patrols, tackle anti-social behaviour and to maintain and increase community engagement. Part of this programme has involved working with John Ruskin College, with officers carrying out a knife arch in the morning

between the times students would be arriving at school. This resulted in a quantity of drugs being seized and an offensive weapon being seized as well as one arrest of an individual. Officers have also worked with John Ruskin to tackle theft from the Esso petrol garage, where two individuals were bought in for voluntary interviews. Students have been advised to not enter the Esso petrol garage by their head teacher.

The officers were made aware by a local resident on Met engage about a moped that had been left in a suspicious location for a couple of days. Officers went to look for the moped and discovered it to be stolen. The registered keeper was contacted who came and collected their moped. This was a very good outcome for both the officers and the registered keeper.

While on mobile patrol, officers came across a car parked on a road that appeared abandoned due to the condition that the car was left in. After checks were done on the vehicle it became apparent that the vehicle had no registered keeper and was on false plates. Due to no report being made that the car had been stolen, we got in contact with the council who came to recover and move the vehicle. During these patrols officers have also carried out positive stop and searches of hot spot areas for Anti-social behaviour. This has resulted in drugs being seized and taken off the streets and suitable outcomes have been issued to the individuals involved.

Officers have also worked alongside the Dog Section Unit to carry out a warrant on an address suspected to have a banned breed of dog living there. This warrant resulted in one dog being seized as it was a banned breed.



Officers are still holding different events such as street briefings and 'Cuppa with a Copper' Events. These are all advertised on Met Engage, they happen monthly and we would love to meet you, so please come along to these to meet your local policing team. We are hand delivering letters to individual streets, but everyone is invited to attend these events. We hope these letters will make the invitation more

personal to encourage residents to come along. Details of these events can be found on the Met Police website for each ward as well as Met Engage. These are a brilliant chance for residents to meet their local officers and to raise any concerns they may have.

Good Time for Gardening – November

It's getting colder and wetter as we draw into November. Trees are putting on their autumn displays and winter stems start to come into their own. Here are a list of jobs for you.

- Insulate your outdoor containers from frosts. Use hessian or bubble wrap held in place with garden twine.
- Prevent containers becoming waterlogged by raising them off the ground for the winter using bricks or 'pot feet'.
- Encourage hungry birds into your garden by investing in bird baths and bird feeders.
- Protect roses from wind-rock by pruning them by one-third to half their height. This will stop them swaying in strong wind and prevent roots coming loose in the soil.
- Remove fallen leaves from around the base of any rose bushes which suffered from blackspot or rust this summer, to reduce the chance of reinfection next year.
- Keep planting onion, shallot, and garlic sets. Dig over heavy soils adding organic matter before planting.
- Place a scaffold plank on the ground along the main access route into your plot. This allows access but prevents the soil compacting as you walk across it.
- Stake top-heavy brassica and leafy green plants. Draw up some soil around the base of their stem to prevent wind from rocking the plant and causing damage to the roots.
- Check over your summer harvest of onions and garlic, removing any

- rotting bulbs immediately. Try using onion bags to improve air flow around the bulbs.
- Check stored potatoes and remove any that are rotting. Use hessian sacks to store your potatoes to allow the crop to breathe.
- Plant out currant plants as bare roots this month, while they're in their dormant state. Plant bare root raspberry plants now for a delicious home-grown crop.
- Tidy up your strawberry plants, cutting off any dead leaves and removing runners.
- Prune apple and pear trees anytime between now and February. Don't prune your plum trees now as they will be susceptible to the silver leaf fungus - wait until midsummer.
- Remove the top netting from fruit cages as heavy snow in winter will make it sag.
- Aerate your lawn now before winter sets in. Either use a
 lawn aerator or simply insert a garden fork at regular intervals and lean
 it back slightly to let air in.
- Continue to clear fallen leaves off the lawn to keep it healthy using a light rake.
- Edge the lawn. This is easier to do in the winter months once beds are clear. Lawn edging creates

a neat and tidy appearance and makes maintenance easier throughout the year.

- Reuse spent compost from
- annual container displays as a mulch on your garden beds and borders.
- Sweep up debris and fallen leaves from paths and beds to prevent fungal spores, slugs and snails from overwintering.
- Lift and relocate plants if you need to when they are dormant.



St John the Divine, WW2 Bombing, continued

In last month's piece we saw that Ted Frith records that the bombs which caused severe damage to St John the Divine Church on 26th October 1940 were High Explosive (HE) Oil Bombs. However, oil bombs used



in the first Blitz were only charged with sufficient HE, in the form of TNT (Trinitrotoluene), to ignite the petrol / benzene mix.

A High Explosive Oil Bomb (Flammenbombe)



The diagram shows a large incendiary bomb used by the Germans, known as the Flam 500 (Flammenbombe) There was also a 250kg version.

The Flam 500 was about 1.8m long with a diameter of 0.5m, containing over 150kg of flammable material, an oil incendiary mixture of 30% benzene, 70% petroleum, with a TNT bursting charge.

These bombs were made of relatively thin material so did not tend to penetrate deep into the ground but broke up on impact. Failure was relatively common and the liquid contents would spill without igniting. Due to poor reliability, they were infrequently used after 1940.

There is some confusion around whether the contemporary report of two HE oil bombs is correct. The image, above right, is of blast damage to the Church and, moreover, the nearby Hall is reported as being destroyed in the attack. The Flammenbombe was designed to burst on impact and the report of oil being washed away down the road indicates that not all the flammable liquid ignited. At this time in the Blitz the Nazis were combining High Explosive and Oil bombs in their nighttime raids:

On the night of 20th September 1940 Bennetts Avenue and Langland Gardens in Shirley received 1 HE Bomb and 1 Oil Bomb.

On the night of 22nd September 1940 Coombe Farm received 1 HE Bomb and 1 Oil Bomb.

On the night of 5th October, 1940, the Selsdon Park Road area received 2 HE Bombs and 1 Oil Bomb. It therefore seems likely that 'our' flammenbomben were accompanied by 'conventional' high explosive bombs and the damage to our Church and Hall was caused by them, not incendiary oil bombs. Sir Arthur Harris, wartime Head of Bomber Command, wrote after the war: "In the early days of bombing, our notion, like that of the Germans, was to spread an attack out over the whole night, thereby wearing down the morale of the civilian population. The result was, of course, that an efficient fire brigade could tackle a single load of incendiaries, put them out, and wait in comfort for the next to come along; they might also be able to take shelter when a few high explosives bombs were dropping. But it was observed that when the Germans did get an effective concentration, then our fire brigades had a hard time; if a rain of incendiaries is mixed with high explosives bombs there is a temptation for the fireman to keep his head down."

Again, I am indebted to the journals of Ted Frith for the germ of this article. Research into the type of incendiary bombs which were dropped by the Nazis in the Blitz made me query whether the contemporary account was correct. My further investigation leaves me convinced that St John the Divine, on the night of 26th October 1940, took hits of High Explosive and at least one Oil Bomb.

The details of the Germans Oil Bomb are from the excellent **Bombs Away UXO** website. The detailed information regarding local hits of HE bombs combined with Oil Bombs is from the Facebook site 'Croydon at War' which is a highly detailed source of information relating to the impact on Croydon, Military and Civilian, during both World Wars.

The contemporary report reproduced in last month's article, states that the bombing took place 'exactly 5 years after the new church had been consecrated'. However, the Church was consecrated on 17th October 1936. The foundation stone was dedicated on 26th October 1936, 5 years prior to the bombing.



Local people. Local knowledge We recently learned about the death of one of the distinguished sons of Selsdon, Mathew Frith, on 14^{th} August, a sad loss at only 64 years old from a brain tumour. Here Pam Holden pays tribute to him.

MATHEW FRITH, Urban Nature Conservationist

Mathew was the first son of Ted and Margaret Frith of Queenhill Road. Ted, SRA secretary for many years, wrote numerous articles on the history of Selsdon. Mathew also contributed with interesting nature notes.

From his cub-scouting days in Selsdon, Mathew showed a wide knowledge of insects and plants and impressed his young friends and scouters when searching with his butterfly net on cub holidays. Later he discovered a Busy Lizzie during his expedition to Highland Cameroon which bears his name, Impatiens frithii.

During his life Mathew championed the preservation of valuable sites, such as Hutchinsons's Bank, a narrow 35-acre strip in Addington famed for its high diversity of butterflies and moths and a rich selection of chalkloving plants, Woodberry Wetlands in Hackney, and his beloved Croham Hurst where he roamed as a child with his siblings, Penny and Toby. In 2023 he received an MBE for services to the natural environment.



Here are the words from his colleagues at the London Wildlife Trust.

It is with the deepest sadness that we share the news that our dear friend and colleague, Mathew Frith (Director of Research), has passed away after a long illness. Mathew was, in many ways, the heart and soul of London Wildlife Trust. His passion for nature, his commitment to London's wild spaces, and his unwavering belief in the power of community have shaped the Trust into what it is today.

For decades, Mathew championed the idea that London's wildlife and people are inseparable. His leadership and insight have guided countless nature conservation and recovery projects in London and inspired new generations of conservationists. Whether it was creating wetlands like Woodberry, protecting woodlands like Sydenham Hill, or speaking up for urban nature in the face of immense challenges, Mathew approached everything with humility, courage, and a rare generosity of spirit. Beyond his extraordinary professional achievements, Mathew had the gift of making everyone feel valued, listened to, and supported. His warmth, humour, kindness and occasionally grumpiness (mainly at computers) will be remembered so fondly by all who had the privilege of knowing and working alongside him. We are taking time as an organisation to remember Mathew properly and to honour his legacy. We will share details soon about how we will honour Mathew's life, and please do share your own memories of Mathew with us.

Mathew's vision and dedication to London's nature recovery will live on in the work we all do for the wild places he loved, for the forgotten corners of London and for the people he inspired.

The SRA has had several enquiries about the legal use of e-scooters in Selsdon, so I did some research and found this information from the Metropolitan Police.

E-SCOOTERS AND THE LAW

What is the law on e-scooters?

Currently in the UK, you can legally buy an e-scooter, but you cannot ride it on a public road, cycle lane or pavement. The only place it can be used is on private land.



The reason for this is that e-scooters are treated as motor vehicles by the Department of Transport and are subject to the same legal requirement as other vehicles, such as MOT, licensing, tax and insurance. Because they don't always have number plates, signalling ability or visible rear lights, they cannot be used legally on the roads.

What happens if I am stopped by the police?

The police will advise you on the law and may ask you to take your e-scooter home. They may, however, still penalise you depending on the seriousness of the offence. If caught riding an e-scooter, fines you may receive can include:

- A Fixed Penalty Notice for no insurance, with a £300 fine and six penalty points
- A Fixed Penalty Notice for no driving licence, up to £100 and three-six penalty points.

Other offences which may result in penalties include riding on the footpath, using a mobile phone, riding through red lights and drink drive offences. There are some trial areas in the UK where hire e-scooters are available. In the UK, to legally use a hired e-scooter in trial areas, you must hold a valid driving licence (full or provisional with category Q), be over 16, and have insurance (provided by the rental company). E-scooters can be used on the road (excluding motorways) and in cycle lanes, but not on pavements. You also need to follow the safety and rider guidance from the operator, which includes:

- a maximum speed limit often around 15.5 mph, and some areas may have slower "go-slow" zones.
- solo riding. E-scooters are not designed for two people, so riding with a passenger is not permitted.
- no intoxication. You must not be under the influence of alcohol, drugs, or any other substance that could impair your ability to ride safely
- protective equipment. While not always legally required, wearing a helmet is strongly recommended, especially at the recommended maximum speed.

If picked when young (6-10 inches), you can cook them like courgettes or if you let them get

larger you can roast them like a squash. The skin hardens up some as they get larger. They vine like a pumpkin, so have to be given plenty of space. Pauline's weighed in at 3.25kg (7lb 2.4oz) with a length of 127cm (50 inches). Well done!

Nature Notes from Ted Forsyth – Plumage

Feathers are temporary structures which need to be replaced from time to time. During a walk in the woods, you might find a long brown flight feather discarded by a moulting pheasant, then a few moments later be entranced by the brilliant blue pattern on a small feather from a jay. Recent discoveries, particularly in China, show that some dinosaurs grew colourful feathers on their bodies, perhaps used in aggressive displays between males and as an attraction to the opposite sex. It was only much later that dinosaur feathers had anything to do with flight.

The wing of a bird is not rigid like that of a glider but is jointed and allows flexibility – it is, after all, the bird's hand arm. With something like 10,000 species of bird on the planet it is to be expected that there is much variety in how the wings are used.



Birds are never as heavy as they look since their bones are largely hollow. A large bird like a vulture will spend much of its time in the air soaring and gliding from one thermal or up draught to another, so its weight will be supported on relatively stiff wings. A species like a peregrine can also soar and glide as

it searches for a target, but once it has picked out its victim it moves into high speed flapping flight which might end in a spectacular stoop or dive at a remarkable speed. Sparrowhawks and goshawks can also "drop out of the sky" but as they are largely woodland birds their wing and feather structure allows them to fly rapidly through a forest in pursuit of prey. A kestrel, on the other hand, prefers to view its prey by hovering in the air, usually with the help of a breeze. Some terns also hover before plunging to collect their food. A tawny owl is a perch and was

hover before plunging to collect their food. A tawny owl is a perch and wait predator which will watch or listen for signs of movement before pouncing on the prey item which could be a vole, wood mouse, beetle, earthworm or frog depending on the local territory. A barn owl hunts by patrolling in flight over vegetation and has a feather structure including "powder down" feathers which allows it to fly silently – the prey cannot hear it coming and the owl can listen for the squeaks of potential prey.

There are some bird species which do not fly – ostriches, kiwis and penguin for example. Penguins have wings which are more like flippers, being covered in modified feathers, and could be said to "fly" when moving underwater. Kiwi's feathers are so modified that they resemble hairs,

which is convenient for a bird which breeds in holes in the ground and which wanders around amongst vegetation.

The plumage of a small bird is often colourful (chaffinch, bullfinch) to advertise its presence to neighbours or prospective mates, while another may be relatively drab (wren, chiffchaff) to hide it from predators. Dippers hunt by swimming, walking and "flying" underwater so need plumage which is relatively waterproof. Cormorants also hunt while beneath the water surface but can often be seen perched somewhere with open wings as they wait for their plumage to dry.

In the various tropical parts of the world there is a dazzling array of coloured plumages and birds with long tails which are often used in mating displays – but that will have to be a story for another time.




