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#### COUNCILLORS' NOTES FROM ANDY STRANACK

#### EVENTS IN PARKS - HOW THE COUNCIL MAKES SURE THEY ARE SAFE

We are fortunate in Croydon to have one of the greenest Boroughs in London with over 120 green and open spaces. Some parks are used to provide pitches for sports teams, others are areas of amazing natural beauty and other parks, with good public transport links, are used to host events. These events often take place in the summer months and we spread them across the Borough so no park hosts more than 2 or 3 major events a year.

When a promoter contacts the Council to organise an event they are directed to one of the major parks. In Selsdon, Addington Park is identified as one of these event parks. Once an event has been booked it can take up to 48 weeks to organise the event. For large events a Safety and Advisory Group (SAG) is formed; this consists of licensing and events officers, the police and other emergency services working with the organisers to arrange licences for music and the sale of alcohol, agreeing time restrictions, risk assessments, security arrangements and an extensive travel plan for the event. The event, alongside all the supporting documents need to be agreed by the SAG before any event is given the green light. #### **UPDATE ON THE BIRCH HOTEL**

As your local Councillors, we regularly have to deal with rumours that the Birch Hotel site is full of asylum seekers or squatters. We can assure you that there is no truth to these rumours. As your local Councillors, we visit the site on a regular basis and have good relationships with security staff at the venue. We are clear that the site is currently not being used by anyone other than security staff. The administrators who currently control the site, are still working on plans to sell the site to an established operator to secure the historic buildings' future.

#### NEW COMPLIANCE TEAM TO TACKLE THE 'BROKEN WINDOW' EFFECT

A new compliance team has recently been introduced across the Borough. The new team will be street based and will act on local intelligence and data to tackle fly tipping hot spots, deal with abandoned vehicles and tackle anti-social behaviour. They will also check that street licences and waste management arrangements are being complied with and that waste is cleared from private land. They will act to educate residents and

businesses, but will also have the power to issue fixed penalty notices and Community Protection Notices.

# MP Natasha Irons' Report Member of Parliament for Croydon East

Dear Selsdon,

July marked one year since the general election, and it was an opportunity to reflect on some of the work we have done together and what is happening in Croydon East. Such as:

- TFL receiving the money it needs for a brand-new tram fleet for Croydon in the spending review.
- Funding to increase capacity for more GP appointments at Addington Medical Practice and Ashburton Park Medical Centre.
- The expansion of free school meals to all pupils living in households receiving Universal Credit.
- Work on the New Addington Community Diagnostic Centre going ahead.

Before the summer recess, I had the pleasure of highlighting the incredible achievement of pupils and staff at Croydon High School for Girls in The House of Commons. Thanks to the pioneering work of the 'Astrogazers' team, the school is on track to become the first all-girls school in the world to design, build and launch a CubeSat into space following their successful live flight test. A massive congratulations to everyone involved in this incredible project!

Earlier this year, I attended a Forestdale and Selsdon School council meeting with pupils and teachers from local primary schools. They raised serious concerns about unsafe driving in the area and wanted to see measures put in place. I wrote to Croydon Council on behalf of the schools, requesting a road safety review and urging the introduction of a zebra crossing to help deter dangerous driving.

Children and school staff should feel safe traveling to and from school, so I've launched a local campaign calling on Croydon Council to meet with the Selsdon Schools' Council to hear their concerns, to review traffic on Featherbed Lane at the end of the school day to see the issue firsthand and install measures that make it safer for pedestrians. My team and I have also received a large volume of complaints from residents about Pear Tree Farm. I'm working closely with the Environment Agency to take action. They have advised that the more reports they receive from residents, the easier it is to escalate enforcement and allocate resources. If you are worried about excessive waste, dust or fires on the site, please contact the Environment Agency directly. I will continue to monitor the situation and provide updates.

# **Update from our Local Police**

This month has been yet another busy, but productive month for the team, from conducting regular patrols in hot spot locations requested by community members, to knocking on doors to advertise out new platform, MET ENGAGE (see below). The team has also been carrying out regular crime prevention stalls and street drop-ins to engage with the community and to create a police presence around hot spot areas.





We have been pleased by the response, so far, to the introduction of the new communications system called MET ENGAGE. This is a Met wide



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platform for residents to get to know their local officers, help shape how local areas are policed and have direct access to key information and advice. This is a service which will be tailored to the community. This isn't just a platform for us to tell you what we're doing in your area, it's an opportunity for you to tell us what's concerning you most so we can take action on the things that truly matter to you.

Officers have been conducting house to house visits to make residents aware of this and to help them to sign up to this free and easy to use service. It has been very rewarding for officers meeting residents and discussing their local areas. If you have not signed up to this platform and would like to or would like more information, please go to metengage.co.uk.

Officers were also involved in the policing of Soaked Pineapple X Sandz which took place at Addington Park in collaboration with private security and volunteers. A large quantity of drugs were seized during the security search as people entered the festival.

The team have been carrying out arrest enquires, one of which resulted in an arrest of a suspect through having to knock the door down to gain entry to the property as the suspect was refusing to open the door to officers.

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## **Good Time for Gardening – September**

How to garden with extremes of weather ... possibly the opposite of 'A good time for gardening'!

Extremes of wind, rain, snow, frost and sun are battering the world more than ever and sometimes it may seem an uphill battle to enjoy your outside space, but there are things you can do to weatherproof your garden.



#### **Heavy downpours**

Plants need rain, but we are experiencing more frequent and heavier downpours, leading to flooded lawns and soggy ground. The water displaces air from the spaces between soil particles and plant roots can literally drown, unless they are adapted to growing in waterlogged conditions. Waterlogging

is common on poorly drained soil or when heavy soil is compacted. You may need to provide more support for plants during heavy downpours, and cut back soggy plants if they risk damaging surrounding plants. Take note of where water collects in your garden and plan how to remedy with drainage or move plants to other locations.

#### The power of the wind

Wind doesn't just affect coastal gardens, the same problem can affect exposed gardens, roof tops, balconies, or any areas with a wind tunnel, such as a side alley. Wind can strip leaves and soil of moisture.



Wind can break branches and even whole trunks, which can cause further damage as they fall. Greenhouses and other glass is at risk from flying objects and these objects can end up in next door's garden, so take care to check which items in your garden could be blown around or away, storing them inside a shed or the home when needed. Think about where you will store items before you purchase them. Plants whose natural habitat is by the sea or on a mountain top, have adapted to cope with these extreme conditions. Take inspiration from these types of location, and adapt them for your garden.

#### Jack Frost's about

Frost is the worst enemy of many plants, causing death and destruction. Prolonged periods of frost can cause lasting damage that weaken a plant beyond recovery, and often catches gardeners unaware. If frost is forecast

move pots near the walls of your home to borrow some warmth. A soft, fibrous, translucent material laid over or around plants hastening their growth and protecting them against weather and pests can help. Heavier grades of fleece give about 2°C of protection from frost. It is usually used without supporting hoops. Also, beware of frosts after a warm spell, which can shock a plant enough to kill it, forewarned is forearmed.

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## **SRA Selsdon Heritage Walks**

On a very wet Saturday 19 July, members of the SRA Committee led three walks through Selsdon highlighting the development of Selsdon from a large house on the hill and a farm nearby, to a popular housing estate with a thriving high street and surrounded by some wonderful green spaces. Despite the poor weather, residents turned up for their walks in their waterproofs to learn about the architecture and history of Selsdon Garden Village over its 100 years in existence. We hope to run some more of these walks in the future, but hope for better weather.

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#### The Sanderstead Plantation

I am writing this in the sweltering early summer heat, however, the Plantation provides a welcome, fresher space, with its continuous canopy. The lack of rain to date is a concern to all, and, if it continues the trees will be under considerable stress, causing limbs to drop without warning. On a brighter note, we planted the 100 mixed forest and understorey 1 year old whips in early spring where previous trees were felled, as considered dangerous. The whips were duly staked, this is so we can find and release them when the inevitable bramble takes over. They were provided, courtesy of the Mayor of London, as part of a 'greening' policy.

The group recently held a tree walk within the 21 acre site, identifying various trees. There are a few Turkey Oak specimens, noted for their hairy acorn cups. These may have been planted for ornamental reasons as the timber has no commercial value apart from possibly firewood. Nearby is a Holm Oak (Quercus Ilex), an evergreen oak, the leaves slightly resemble a holly, as the name 'Ilex' would suggest. These, and other identifiable trees such as White Poplar and English Lime are possibly some 200 years old, not to mention Oaks and Sweet Chestnuts of considerable age. These, we believe, could have been planted by the Wigsells. a prominent



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family in Sanderstead from the 1700s onwards until 1919, residing at Sanderstead Court, until it burnt down. Their land thereabouts, extended to the Plantation and from a 1762 map the site appears to have been unwooded with enclosures. It may have been found unsuitable as arable, being high and facing cold north winds, and so planted as a shelter belt and resource for the Court.

The stalwart band of volunteers (The Partners) meet every Wednesday morning throughout the year, weather permitting, maintaining our plantings, some 2700 so far. I would mention, however, this has been over a 25 year period! We also keep the paths open for easier access. We do hope you will visit this woodland of Special Conservation Importance (Grade 1), if you have not already done so, and enjoy the extensive views as far as the Chilterns and, of course, London on a clear day.

#### Selsdon – A Brief Timeline – Part 2

We saw in the April 2023 Gazette that Selsdon is surrounded by Churches which have a rich and ancient heritage. A look again at Speed's map of 1610 shows the villages of Farleigh, Addington, Warlingham, Woldingham and Chelsham with their Churches.



St Mary the Blessed at Addington and St Mary's at Farleigh date to 1080AD. All Saints at Sanderstead, All Saints at Warlingham and St Leonard's at Chelsham date back to the 13th Century. Selsdon, or any precursor name, is not shown on the map.

These villages which are now overshadowed by the scale of modern Selsdon must have had thriving populations to warrant the fine churches and to pay for their construction, upkeep and the 'Living' of the clergy.

Despite Speed's omission of Selsdon from his mapping it is evident that there was earlier occupation in the area. Local History Records reveal activity going back thousands of years:

Mesolithic (8,000 - 3,000BCE)

A flint axe head was found in Shirley. A late Mesolithic Settlement has been found on the top of Croham Hurst.

Neolithic (3,000 - 1,800 BCE)

A flint arrowhead was found at Addington.

Bronze Age (1,800 – 1,000 BCE)

A hoard of Axe and Spear Heads were discovered in 1914 on the site of Addington Golf Course. A site of a Round Barrow is situated on the top of Croham Hurst.

#### Iron Age:

The route of the current Upper Selsdon Road ran through what is now The Selsdon Park Hotel and connected with Old Farleigh Road near to where Cosy Cottage now is and on to the Sussex Weald via Farleigh and Titsey. A hoard of coins was found in New Addington and one coin in Courtwood Lane. Late Iron Age Cremation Burials (12 – 15) dated to 1st C BCE have been found on the site of Farleigh Court Golf Course Romano / British (43AD – 410AD):

4 Romano British settlements have been recorded locally, one in Kingswood, one at Sanderstead Court, one at Atwood School and one at Farleigh Court Golf Course. The route of a Roman Road is still preserved as a trackway through the eastern side of New Addington.

### Anglo-Saxon (410AD to 1066AD)

During this period, the Manor of Croydon was acquired by the Holy See of Canterbury. The Manor was leased to Ealdorman Alfred and, in his will of 892, he bequeathed some lands, including 'Selesdune', to his wife and daughter. In 964 the Manor of Sanderstead which included Selsdon, was gifted by the then owner, Queen Aethelflaed, to the Benedictine Abbey of St Peter's at Winchester to provide a living and income to the monks at St Peter's.

#### **Medieval**

The Domesday Book of 1086/7 does not record Selsdon as such and there is confusion over whether Selsdon was included in the entry for Sanderstead or Croydon. It is recorded that St Peter's of Winchester held Sanderstead and Archbishop Lanfranc of Canterbury held Croydon. Documents of 1193 and 1283 refer to Selsdon and relate to free work that was to be provided to the Lord of the Manor by his tenants. Selsdon appears to have been considered part of the Manor of Croydon. In 1247 two Knights Templar had a legal dispute over lands in Addington and Selsdon. A Surrey taxation document of 1332 records that 12 persons living in the 'Villata de Selsdone' were to be charged the sum of 17s 3d.

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#### 15<sup>th</sup> Century

Upper Selsdon Road was previously just Selsdon Road but before that, it was known as 'Breechfield Lane' and, in the 15<sup>th</sup> Century, it was described as "Waye going towards Sellesdun". The Archbishop of Canterbury ordered a survey of the lands which Canterbury held in order to check the amount of rent which leaseholders should be paying. The lands which we know as modern Selsdon were farmed by a few families but the 800+ acres recorded would have required more labour than the families could provide without tenant farmers or labourers.

#### 16<sup>th</sup> Century

1565 - Parish Registers from Sanderstead record the names of people living in Selsdon marrying, giving birth, being christened and dying. The Kempe, Ownstead and Christian families are predominant. The Ownsteads buried two servants, Winifred Nicholson in 1592 and Richard Wells in 1599. A Court of the time recorded misdemeanours carried out in Selsdon: in 1584 John Woodstock was fined 2d for not keeping his fence in a suitable state of repair; in 1595 Thomas Stinte was also fined 2d for a similar offence.

#### 17th Century

John Ownstead died (1600) and the estate was bought by Harman Atwood. The Sanderstead Parish Register records several entries for the Lucas Family in that century:

1632 – Robert Lucas of Sellesden was fined 12d for herding his sheep across the Lords Common;

1639 - Walter and Susan Lucas had a daughter, Mary, baptised 30/9/1639 and son Robert baptised 24/11/1642. Susan died shortly after, perhaps from the birth, and was buried at Sanderstead Church, 12/12/1642;

1649 – John Daniels was convicted of stealing sheep from Robert Lucas;

1679 - Richard and Susan Lucas had a daughter, Elizabeth, baptised 30/12/1679, another child, unnamed, was baptised in 1682 and son, William, baptised 20/9/1687.

### 18th Century

Around 1700 Selsdon Farm, the precursor to The Selsdon Park Hotel, is leased from the Atwoods by the Bowyer family. The farmhouse then passes through several hands until, in 1775 Thomas Lane made additions to remodel it in a mansion style by appointing an Architect to redesign the facade.

#### 19th Century

1804 - William Coles set about improving the mansion and separating the farming element.

1809 – Coles had built Selsdon New (Park) Farm (on the site of our Aldi supermarket) together with 6 pairs of semi-detached cottages and two detached houses along Addington Road. Numbers 240 / 242 survive today. 1810 - Coles was declared bankrupt and the 'Freehold Mansion....newly

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

1899 – Stevens dies and the Mansion, woods and farmland are purchased by a wealthy brewer, Wickham Noakes.

20th Century

1901 - Census records the population of Selsdon at 149.

21st Century

2021 - Census records the population of Selsdon as approximately 20,000\*

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
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It is impossible to accurately compare the population numbers over the two centuries. Current census records are based on the Electoral Ward system. The Wards of Selsdon and Addington Village plus Selsdon Vale and Forestdale incorporate most of what we know as 'Selsdon' but with the addition of areas outside our Selsdon: The Selsdon Residents' Association delivers the Gazette to approximately 4,000 households, some of which are in Sanderstead Ward.

# More Recollections of Selsdon, this time by Daphne or 'Lollypop'

I originally lived in Foxearth Road, opposite the school entrance. My husband and I moved to Norfolk for his job, but my heart was always in Selsdon and so, we moved back to Farley Road, no. 26 and I still own this house.





to Littleheath School at 66 Farley Road. It was a lovely little private school which was held in the house.

Selsdon started as a little village. I fondly remember some of the shops: Monty the Bakers, with his fabulous bread and cakes; Buckingham's, in which the Post Office was housed and Mrs Buckingham stocked haberdashery and clothes; the two fishmongers, the butchers, the Co-op, Sainsbury's, Tudor Library, the Village Club, and the Selsdon Garage, to name but a few. There was also the Barbers with the red and white pole outside run by Mr Hewitt and the shoe shop where I bought my daughter's school shoes. Obviously, the only remaining original shops are Tudor Library and the Village Club.

I wanted a little job whilst Jackie was at school, but I also wanted to be home during the school holidays. I became School Crossing Patrol at the Selsdon Junction, before the traffic lights were installed. I did this job for about 40 years, and became affectionately known as 'Lollypop'. Croydon High School appreciated my being there and I am now classed as ex-staff

and I became a member of their Ivy Link and I have regularly attended events at the school.

Unfortunately, I had a fall in Queenhill Road at the beginning of April this year. I was in Croydon University Hospital for 7 weeks due to complications. The end result is that I am now unable to walk, or even stand independently. My daughter had to find a Nursing Home for me. I have always been a fiercely independent lady who lived on my own until my fall. I am, however, happy in my new environment, Tudor House Nursing Home. Several Selsdon people have visited me, which is lovely.

## Life Admin

Do you feel you need some help to organise your life? If so, creating a personalised list of essential what to do and when (for different time periods) can be very helpful. You can find lots of templates online. Here is a suggestion of some annual tasks to consider.

- Check battery on smoke and carbon monoxide alarms
- External space trim back any plant overgrowth, clean and treat any external furniture, woodwork

#### Vehicle

• Car service, tax, mot, insurance. Oil levels, tyre tread.

#### **Finances**

- Ensure all paperwork is filed correctly and accessible
- Prepare and file tax data as necessary
- Review and update all insurances home, health, life, travel
- Review savings and loans can you get a better rate?
- Review pension are you saving enough?
- Make/update your annual budget assess your goals and spending plans
- Review all current subscriptions/memberships

#### Other

- Update/renew important documents e.g. passports, licences, wills
- Plan some outings/trips
- Update your calendar/planner with dates for life admin tasks, for birthdays and anniversaries, planned reunions/parties/phone catch-ups
- Take a day to review your work, where you spend your time, your relationships
- Review personal development learning and skills

#### **ACCENTS**

Accents are the melodies of everyday speech, the rhymes and the rhythms of our roots. Drab homogenisation is costing us dear, for monotony slowly conflates, our whimsical accents and our singular brogues, serendipitous tunes each employs. Could we all speak like chat-bots as their power grows and the music is drained from our voice?

# Nature Notes from Ted Forsyth – Identifying Trees and Bushes

There are many mobile phone apps to aid in the identification of birds, plants, fungi, etc, but there is much joy in wandering without the encumbrance of technology (allowing for some form of camera) to allow your eyes and ears to detect details you might otherwise miss.

Trees and bushes are present throughout the year so you might need to identify them at any season.

LEAF. Conifers have modified leaves in the form of bunches of thin needles to reduce moisture loss when growing in extremely cold winter conditions. The leaves are evergreen, apart from Larch, and are retained through the winter. Holly and Laurel are among a few tree or bush species which have thick waxy leaves which allow them to survive winter conditions. Most of the remaining trees and bushes are deciduous and lose their leaves in the autumn. Leaf shape is important for ID but the arrangement is also important in separating leaves which might look similar. Horse Chestnut has distinctive leaves which grow out from a point like fingers extending from the palm of a hand, while Rowan and Ash produce leaflets which are attached on opposite sides of a twig.

**TWIG.** Winter twigs can be identified by the positioning of the buds. A single black terminal bud on the twig immediately suggests Ash. Other species have brown or green buds, some of which will be single while others can have multiple terminal buds. Horse Chestnut has very sticky brown buds. The buds might appear as opposite pairs on the twig, or might be singles at intervals along the twig.

**FLOWER.** Some arrangements of flowers are distinctive. A Blackthorn hedge in spring will be a glorious display of masses of white flowers. Hawthorn, whether as a hedge or individual tree, produces a similar display but some weeks later. The flowers of Elder form large plate-like arrangements – and they also have a strong sweet smell. A mature Horse Chestnut has flowers in short vertical columns of white but some with deep pink flowers indicate they are of hybrid origin. Some trees are



dioecious, with male and female flowers on separate trees – Holly is an example. On a tree like the Hawthorn the male and female flowers can appear on the same branch. While many flowers are pollinated by insects, the catkins of trees like Hazel produce enormous quantities of pollen which are dispersed by the action of wind, producing clouds of pollen wafting in the breeze in spring.

**FRUIT.** Seeds of some trees and bushes are encased in a berry. Common Dogwood and Wild Privet both produce small black berries. Rowan, Wild Cherry, Hawthorn and others have berries which are various shades of

red. Wayfaring Tree can display berries of green and red at the same time and on the same bunch. The most distinctive berry is that of the Spindle which is bright pink on the outside but opens to display an equally bright orange seed, making the bush visible and recognisable from quite a distance. The maple group – Sycamore, Norway Maple and Field Maple – all produce seeds with two attached wings. Ash has dense bunches of "keys" which are thin containers of the seed. These bunches often remain attached to the branch of the tree during winter and provide food for birds such as Bullfinches. As the name suggests, conifers hold their seeds in cones of various types with the exception of the Yew which has its own arrangement. The deciduous Alder also has its seeds in a type of cone.

**BARK.** The trunk of a mature tree is covered in a more or less distinctive bark which in many cases will be enough to identify the species. Just as young smooth-skinned humans grow into gnarly wrinklies, so do tree barks change as they grow. A young growing tip of a Spindle branch is smooth and bright green in colour but given time to develop it becomes brownish and develops ridges along the branch. A Sweet Chestnut tree has a bark which is grooved but the grooves tend to spiral round the trunk.

A Sweet Chestnut which fell in Selsdon Wood still had enough root cover to keep it alive so the fallen



## A Special Visit from the Mayor!









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
